## Description of works.

Archaeological monitoring was undertaken by South West Archaeology Ltd. at the request of Mr & Mrs Ellis Smith (the Client) prior to the construction of a garage. The work was carried out in accordance with a Written Scheme of Investigation (WSI) approved by DCHES and the work was undertaken by B. Morris.

An area of c.  $60\text{m}^2$ , corresponding to the footprint of the proposed garage, was stripped to the surface of the subsoil by a tracked, mechanical excavator using a 1.2m wide toothless grading bucket under archaeological supervision.

The development was taking place within the garden of Dale Cottage, a low, two-storey stone-rubble cottage (probably originally two cottages). Beneath the turf was layer (101), 0.25-0.4m thick and comprising a soft, dark greyish-brown clay silt garden soil with common sub-angular to sub-rounded stones <30mm. This layer contained frequent sherds of 19<sup>th</sup> century pottery and occasional 18<sup>th</sup> century pottery, as well as occasional fragments of cinder and (sawn) animal bone. This overlay layer (102), c.0.25m thick and composed of soft, mottled mid greyish-brown clay silt. This contained frequent sub-angular blocky stones <30mm, occasional charcoal flecks and fragments, and occasional pottery. A few sherds dated to the post-medieval period (North Devon type), but this layer also produced obviously 19<sup>th</sup> century pottery (industrial slipware etc.). The subsoil varied slightly across the site, but was mainly composed of a mid brown loose silty matrix containing abundant sub-angular to sub-rounded blocky stones avg. 30-50mm but frequently larger, up to 120 or 150mm in size.

No archaeological features were identified cutting into the subsoil, but it was clear that some 19<sup>th</sup> or 20<sup>th</sup> century rubbish pit(s) had been dug to or into layer (102) in the south-west corner of the garden.

No securely stratified finds were recovered, but a small assemblage of mainly 19<sup>th</sup> ceramics was retrieved. The ceramics assemblage contained 34 sherds (399g) and was dominated by 18<sup>th</sup> or 19<sup>th</sup> century white refined earthenwares (20 sherds, 153g), with 1 sherd of 19<sup>th</sup> century North Devon ware (23g) and 1 sherd of bone china (1g). It also contained some 18<sup>th</sup> pottery: 6 sherds North Devon ware (123g), 2 sherds of North Staffordshire/Bristol Yellow slipware (7g) and one sherd (handle) from a Mottled ware tankard (26g). Only three sherds of post-medieval North Devon ware were recovered (66g). In addition, it is of note that only one clay pipe stem fragment (2g) was recovered. A representative sample of this material was retained.

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


Fig. 1: Location of site and excavated area.
