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


Figure 1: General location (scale 1:25,000)

Summary

In April 2011 a watching brief was undertaken at Chestnuts Farm, Weedon, Buckinghamshire. The investigation was required in advance of construction of a tennis court. No significant archaeological features or artefacts were observed. The gardens of Chestnut Farm showed significant signs of landscaping which could go some way to explain the absence of archaeology on this site.

1. Introduction

1.1 In April 2011 Archaeological Services and Consultancy Ltd (ASC) carried out a watching brief at Chestnuts Farm, Weedon, Buckinghamshire. The project was commissioned by Jonothan Holmes, and was carried out according to a brief (Rouse 2010) prepared on behalf of the local planning authority (LPA) Aylesbury Vale District Council, by their archaeological advisor (AA), Buckinghamshire County Archaeological Service, and a project design (Rouse 2010) prepared by ASC. The relevant planning application reference is 10/01593/APP.

1.2 Planning Background

This watching brief was required under the terms of *Planning Policy Statement 5* (PPS5), as a condition of planning permission for the development of the site.

1.3 Archaeological Services & Consultancy Ltd

1.4 *The Site*

1.4.1 Location & Description

The development site is located in the district of Aylesbury Vale, within the parish and village of Weedon, at NGR SP 8161 1805 (Fig. 1).




Figure 2: Site plan, watching brief area outlined in red (scale 1:1250)

The site comprises a roughly rectangular area of garden, accessed by a driveway on the southern side of Aston Abbotts Road. Chestnuts Farm is located to the west of the development site (Fig. 2).

1.4.2 *Geology & Topography*

The soils of the area are likely to belong to the Aberford Association, which are characterised as *Shallow, locally brashy, well drained calcareous reddish clayey soils over mudstone, shallow on steeper slopes. Associated with similar non-calcareous fine loamy over clayey soils. Slight risk of water erosion* (Soil Survey 1983, 511a). The underlying geology is likely to comprise Quaternary Princes Risborough sand and gravel (BGS, Sheet 237).

1.4.3 Proposed Development




Figure 3: Proposed development (not to scale)

The proposed development comprises construction of a tennis court (Fig. 3).

2. Aims & Methods

2.1 *Aims*

As described in the project design (Section 3), the aims of the watching brief were:

- To ensure the archaeological monitoring of all aspects of the development programme likely to have an impact upon archaeological deposits.
- To secure the adequate recording of any archaeological remains revealed by the development programme.
- To secure the analysis, conservation and long-term storage of any artefactual/ecofactual material recovered from the site.
- To provide an adequately detailed project report that will place the findings of the monitoring and recording of the development programme in their local and regional context, having made reference to the relevant regional research agendas, and through cartographic, documentary and other research.

2.2 *Standards*

The work conformed to the requirements of the brief, to the relevant sections of the Institute of Archaeologists' *Standard & Guidance Notes* (IFA 2001) and *Code of Conduct* (IFA 2000a), to English Heritage guidelines (EH 1991), and to the relevant sections of ASC's own *Operations Manual*.

2.3 *Methods*

The work was carried out according to the project design (Section 3), which required:

A continuous watching brief (*i.e.* archaeologist present during all works which may affect archaeological remains) was undertaken during groundworks (footing and service trenches, reduction of levels, landscaping).

2.4 *Constraints*

This watching brief was carried out without deviation from the agreed methodology.

3. Archaeological & Historical Background

3.1 The following section provides a summary of the readily available archaeological and historical background to the development site and its environs. The site lies within an area of archaeological and historical interest, and has the potential to reveal evidence of a range of periods.

This section has been compiled with information from Buckinghamshire Historic Environment Record (HER) and other readily available sources.

3.2 **Prehistoric- Roman** (before 600BC-c.450AD)

The early history of Weedon is not well understood, although this may be due to a lack of fieldwork in the area, rather than a lack of activity. Fieldwalking to the south east of the village recovered worked flints dating to the Neolithic and Bronze Age, although the assemblage was not deemed to be significant (HER6128). Roman pottery was also recovered during fieldwalking surveys (HER5040, 6128), but not in large enough quantities to suggest occupation, although an additional find of Roman metalwork within the village, dating to the late 3rd century, suggests at least some activity in the area (HER1921).

3.3 Saxon (c.450-1066)

There is no direct evidence for Saxon activity within the village, but it has been suggested that the name Weedon suggests a sacred Saxon site, probably a temple (HER1764).

3.4 *Medieval & Post-Medieval* (1066-1900)

There are a number of earthworks within the village which are interpreted as house platforms, house closes and hollow ways which may date to the medieval or post medieval period (HER0370, 4071), some of which are located close within the boundaries of Chestnuts Farm (HER5041). It is likely that these represent the former extents of the settlement at Weedon.

Historical records suggest there was a medieval-post medieval manor known as Wedon or Wedon-in-the-Vale from as early as the 14^{th} century, probably on the site of the Lilies, *c*.0.6km to the north west of the development site. A further manor house and dovecote are recorded *c*.0.5km to the south of Chestnuts Farm (HER1763).

Located c.0.7km to the north west of the development site, to the north west of the main village, is an area of earthworks which are thought to be an enclosure bank and ditch, with other less distinct features in adjacent fields. This area of earthworks has been interpreted as a Civil War fort (HER2375).

The Historic Landscape Characterisation survey of Weedon records the historic core of the settlement to the northwest of the development site, centred on the High Street and Stockaway. The area of Chestnuts Farm, and the fields to the east are characterised as pre $18^{th} - 19^{th}$ century irregular enclosures.

3.5 *Modern* (1900-present)

During the modern period the layout of Weedon has remained largely unchanged, with just a few extra dwellings constructed within the core of the village.

4. **Results**

4.1 *Introduction*

The ground was reduced in the area of the proposed tennis court over two days, using a mechanical excavator fitted with a 1.8m wide toothless bucket under continuous archaeological monitoring (Appendix 1).

The uppermost soil horizon was removed first, following the slope of the field (Plate 1); two fragments of medieval pottery were recovered from this layer (Plate 2). In the underlying subsoil; no archaeological features or finds were noted. The natural clay was exposed directly below this and no archaeological features or artefacts were observed or recovered. The spoil heaps were visually inspected for finds and scanned with a metal detector, but no artefacts were recovered.

In order to create a level area for the tennis court, the site was to be terraced into the slope at the north end, and built up at the south end. Once it was established that no archaeological features were cutting the natural strata this process of levelling was able to commence.

4.2 *Stratigraphy*

- 0-450mm Topsoil and turf (100): Dark grey-brown friable clay silt with moderate small sub-angular stones and chalk fragments.
- 450-800mm Subsoil (101): Dark-greenish-brown friable clay silt.
- 800-1300mm Natural (102): Mid yellow- grey, consisting of firm clay.

4.3 *The Pottery* (Plate 2)

4.4 *Earthworks*

The site (Plate 3) and its surroundings (Plate 4) displayed clear signs of past landscaping and levelling. A hollow-way transverses the site from southwest to northeast (Plate 5), and a possible house platform is visible in the foreground of Plate 4. It is possible that these features relate to former settlement, or to landscaping.

5. Conclusions

The watching brief did not reveal any archaeological features or artefacts on the stripped areas: the soil profile encountered on the site is typical of an undeveloped rural site, and suggests that little or no disturbance has taken place prior to the present development. From the presence of possible earthworks in the vicinity, including a hollow way, and the recovery of medieval pottery from topsoil on the development site, it is possible that archaeological evidence, notably of medieval date, could survive in the surrounding area.

Confidence Rating

The work was undertaken in dry weather with good light conditions, and full cooperation was received from the client and machining contractor. Accordingly, a high confidence rating is attached to the results of the watching brief.
