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


Figure 1: General location (scale 1:25,000)

Summary

Between November 2011 and November 2013 an archaeological watching brief was carried out at St Mary's Church, St Mary's Road, Ealing, Greater London, during re-ordering of the churchyard. The project uncovered a number of grave monuments including the full exposure of two burial vaults, one of which belonged to the Keene family, dated to the 18th century. Relatively high quantities of disarticulated human remains were also unearthed in concentrations that were possibly originally disturbed during extensions to the church. Two brick walls once thought to have formed a boundary or part of a pathway were also exposed.

1. Introduction

1.1 Between November 2011 and November 2013 Archaeological Services and Consultancy Ltd (ASC) carried out a watching brief at St Mary's Church, St Mary's Road, Ealing, Greater London. The project was commissioned by the Vicar and Churchwardens of St Mary's Church, and was carried out according to a project design prepared by ASC (Semmelmann 2012), and approved by Greater London Archaeological Advisory Service, archaeological advisor (AA) to the local planning authority (LPA), London Borough of Ealing. The relevant planning application reference is P/2011/1633.

1.2 **Planning Background**

This watching brief was required under the terms of the *National Planning Policy Framework* (NPPF), as a condition of planning permission for the development of the site.

1.3 Archaeological Services & Consultancy Ltd

1.4 The Site

1.4.1 Location & Description




Figure 2: Site plan (scale 1:1250)

The site is located on the east side of St Mary's Road in the London Borough of Ealing and is centred on NGR TQ 1773 7975 (Fig. 1). The churchyard surrounds the church of St Mary, and is subdivided by a footpath to the east of the church which joins Church Lane to the south with St Mary's Road/Ranelagh Road junction to the north (Fig. 2).

1.4.2 Topography & Geology

The eastern end of the church stands at approximately 28mAOD with the ground rising gently from south to north to the west of Robert's Alley. The geology is likely to consist of made ground overlying Lynch Hill gravels, which in turn overlies the London Clay (BGS Sheet 270).

1.4.3 Proposed Development

The development proposal includes re-paving works, planting of new trees, shrubs and bulbs, new seating including a large timber and stone bench to the east of the church; new low wall to be built along the footpath to the east of the church, new railing to be installed along the north side of Baillie's Walk; new pathway to be laid in a circular route around the eastern graveyard; creation of a memorial garden for the internment of ashes to the far east of the church; like-for-like repairs to walls and monuments and associated works (Fig. 3).

2. Aims & Methods

2.1 *Aims*

As described in the project design, the aims of the watching brief were:

- To determine the extent to which human remains survive in the affected area
- To determine the presence of any remains of earlier buildings
- To record newly revealed burial vaults and graves
- To signal, before work proceeds, the discovery of an archaeological find for which further action is required
- To provide a report and ordered archive on the investigation

2.2 *Standards*

The work conformed to the project design, to the relevant sections of the Institute for Archaeologists' *Standard & Guidance Notes* (IfA 2008a & b) and *Code of Conduct* (IFA 2010), to current English Heritage guidelines (EH 2006), and to the relevant sections of ASC's *Operations Manual*.

2.3 *Methods*

The work was carried out according to the project design, which described:

- A continuous watching brief on the removal of monuments
- A continuous watching brief on the ground reduction in highly sensitive areas or where a significant amount of overburden was removed
- A continuous watching brief on the excavation of foundation trenches for the new wall and stone bench
- An intermittent watching brief on shallow ground reduction
- Investigation and recording of all archaeological features that were revealed

2.4 *Constraints*

The works were carried out with in line with the project design and with full cooperation of the client, and no constraints were encountered.

3. Archaeological & Historical Background

3.1 The following section provides a summary of the readily available archaeological and historical background to the development site and its environs. The site lies within an area of archaeological and historical interest, and has the potential to reveal evidence of a range of periods.

An assessment of the churchyard and its monuments was prepared by ASC in 2010 (Semmelmann 2010), which is summarised below.

3.2 *Medieval - Modern* (1066-present)

The church of St Mary the Assumption, as it was known in 1446, can be traced back to at least 1127 when the Bishop of London gave the Great Tithes to Canon Henry for the maintenance of St Paul's cathedral school. In the late 14th century the church comprised a chancel, nave, north chapel or Little Ealing aisle and a chapel dedicated to St Anne. It probably also had a bell tower as one is mentioned in 1490 as being in need of repair.

The building as a whole was often in need of repair and by 1675 was in such a poor state that services were held elsewhere for a while. By 1725 the church was again in such disrepair that it was deserted in favour of a timber building. It subsequently collapsed in 1729. Six years later the foundation stone for a new church designed by J. Horne was laid and services commenced in 1740.

Despite being given land to extend the churchyard in 1681, it had become full again by 1807. A series of initiatives were subsequently implemented to provide more burial space; part of the churchyard was raised to allow for more burials and by 1839 the churchyard had extended into Churchfields. However, the problem had not been satisfactorily addressed and in 1852 the churchyard was extended into the Rectory Garden. To further address the situation a Burial Board was established for Ealing and Old Brentford in 1858 and a new cemetery was opened on an 8 acre site east of South Ealing Road in 1861.

Two years later Old Brentford parish was established, but by this time St Mary's Church had become too small and unsightly and S.S. Teulon was commissioned to redesign and extend the building. Between 1865 and 1873 the roof was raised, a new chancel added and new window tracery, stained glass windows and buttresses were inserted. In 1887 the vestry was extended. The church continued to expand as the lynch gate was erected in 1908, a new chapel was dedicated in 1920 and the vestries enlarged in 1935. The extension to the south was constructed in 1959 and enlarged as a parish centre in 1977-78 (*ibid*).

Major restoration programmes took place in 1955 and again between 1988 and 2003.

The earliest maps of Ealing date from the mid 18th century. Rocque's map of 1746, although lacking in detail, shows the church and its yard within a much smaller area than at present. In the following century greater detail of the site was shown; William Tress's plan of 1839 shows that the eastern churchyard was still part of the Rectory garden. However, the church had acquired part of Churchfields, which is where the Vicarage now stands. By the time of the 1865 Ordnance Survey the church had

acquired part of the Rectory garden. From then until the 1970s the boundaries of the churchyard remained static. Throughout this time some alterations were made to the layout of pathways at the southern end of the site, and the burial area was encroached upon by extensions to the church, such alterations are depicted in the ordnance survey maps of 1865, 1896, 1914, 1959.

4. **Results**

- 4.1 The project initially required the height of the burial vaults beneath the chest tombs at the southern end of the western cemetery to be lowered. This entailed hand probing and test pitting that was carried out in 2011 to obtain level data, which in turn was used when redesigning this part of the cemetery (Fig. 4).
- 4.2 Archaeological monitoring of the ground works was carried out in 2013. For descriptive purposes, the project has been divided into the eastern and western cemetery of St Mary's Church. The western work entailed the removal of stacked monuments, ground reduction for a new pathway spanning around the eastern side of the church, restoring and lowering of a number of grave monuments, and the excavation of a footing trench for a new wall. The eastern work entailed the monitoring of new footpaths, planting of trees, removal of monuments, and the footings for a new stone and wood bench.

Generally the site stratigraphy comprised c.0.15m max depth of topsoil, underlying which was the cemetery soil. This consisted of mid-dark brown soft silty clay with frequent small sub-angular stones.

Throughout the works in both cemeteries a number of monuments needed to be moved to allow for the new alterations. These monuments are highlighted in red on the archaeology plan (Fig. 5). A number of monuments also underwent repairs and levelling, primarily at the southern end of the western cemetery. These monuments are highlighted in orange on the archaeology plan (Fig. 5; Plates 1 & 2).

4.3 Western Cemetery

4.3.1 Stacked Monuments (Fig. 5)

A number of stacked monuments were present along the southern boundary wall in the western cemetery: these were individually recorded and removed from site. The details of those monuments are presented in Appendix 3. This area also contained fragments of grave kerbs, sides of tombs, body stones and bricks.

Thirty-five monuments were recorded within the six stacks, and a further two monuments found near to stack 1 with well preserved inscriptions. The majority of the monuments were in a poor condition (16) with surface weathering, a build up of algae, and surface cracking, followed by fair condition (9), fair-good condition (6), good condition (4), and poor-fair condition (2). A variety of styles were present, ranging in date from the 18th-19th century. The most common style were grave slabs (15) that included one coffin-shaped grave slab, followed by side-stepped headstones (12), headstone frags (4), pedimented headstone (1), curved headstone (1), rounded footstone (1), pedimented footstone (1), side-stepped footstone (1), and an unidentified fragment (1). FabricS comprised sandstone (21) and limestone (16) that included an example of Reigate limestone. Two of the monuments were decorated, a fanned decoration (mon.18), and a cross decoration (mon.20).

4.3.2 Ground Reduction (Fig. 5 &6; Plates 3-5)

The ground was reduced to a maximum depth of c.0.3m in advance of a new pathway around the eastern side of the church. The excavations uncovered a number of grave monuments, body stones, brick wall segments and a concentration of disarticulated human remains adjacent to monument 176. The ground reduction also partly exposed the underlying vaults of a number of chest tombs at the southern end of the area (Plates 6-8)

Body Stones 259 & 260 (Fig. 5; Plate 9)

The ground reduction exposed two in-situ body stones (259 & 260) orientated E-W (Appendix 3). They were both made from limestone and had no inscriptions. Body stone 259 lay above the ground reduction level, and therefore was relocated, whilst body stone 260 was left undisturbed.

Burial Vaults 261 & 262 (Fig. 5; Plates 10-42)

Towards the southern end of the ground reduction area two brick-built burial vaults were exposed, that lay above the ground reduction level. In order to make way for the new pathway the vaulted arch for each vault was removed, after which a concrete lintel was placed over the top to protect the contents of each vault.

Vault 261:

Vault 261 was orientated E-W. It measured $c.2.81m \log_{10} c.2.84m$ wide and c.0.79m high and was constructed with red unfrogged bricks ($c.215 \times 95 \times 60mm$; L×W×D) set in lime mortar in Stretcher bond. The roof comprised curving brickwork, forming a vaulted roof. At the west end of the vault was a rectangular entrance, either side of which was stepped brickwork, and the entrance was blocked by a limestone slab with no inscription (Plates 10-15).

Vault 261 contained five coffins (Plate 16), three of lead [268-270] and two of wood [271-272]. These are described as follows:

Coffin [268]:

Coffin [268] was placed along the northern side of the vault on the floor (Plate 17 & 24). It measured c.1.72m long, c.0.5m max wide and c.0.4m deep, and was made of lead with a wooden lid. The coffin was decorated with a rectangular metal coffin plate fixed onto the coffin lid. Gold paint had been applied to the surface of the plate and a black painted inscription. The plate read: *Mrs Ann Martha Keene Died June 14th 1778 Aged 52 Years* (Plate 18).

The coffin lid was also decorated with a double row of copper-alloy studs around the edging. At the four corners of the lid (two at the top and two at the bottom) further studs formed a diamond shape, and along the coffin studs formed a triangular shape. The coffin was surrounded by further pieces of wood with the same studded decoration which suggests that originally wood had been present down the sides of the coffin as well.

The coffin was in a poor-fair preservation state. The lid was partly degraded around the head and lower body, exposing the legs of the individual. The lid had also moved forward, and the lead coffin itself had partly collapsed inward. An adult female skull was found at the top end of the coffin on the floor. The skull was originally thought to have been within the coffin. Movement had occurred to the body as a result of the coffin starting to collapse inward and the decaying of the wooden lid, thus causing the skull to fall onto the floor. Next to the skull a hair comb was found, that appeared to be tortoise shell (Plate 19 & 20).

Coffin [269]:

Coffin [269] was adjacent to coffin [268], and was placed on top of a square brick plinth in the centre of the vault (Plate 21, 24 & 27). The coffin measured c.1.78m long, c.0.5m max wide and c.0.41m deep, and was made of lead with a wooden lid. The coffin was decorated with a rectangular lead coffin plate fixed onto the coffin lid. An incised inscription was visible surrounded by an embossed design of roses and leaves and a bird centrally placed at the top of the plate. The plate read: *Mr Rich Keene Died June 29th 1791 Aged 63 Years* (Plate 22).

The coffin lid was also decorated with a double row of copper-alloy studs around the edging. Along the inner row of stud's iron diamond shaped decoration was present and badly corroded (Plate 23).

The coffin was in a fair-good preservation state. The wooden coffin lid showed signs of decay at the bottom end but still remained intact. The coffin itself had begun to collapse inward towards the bottom end, and holes in the lead were present at its base. The copper studs had started to turn a green colour due to corrosion.

Coffin [270]:

Coffin [270] was adjacent to coffin [269], and was also placed on top of the brick plinth (Plates 25, 27 & 28). The coffin measured $c.1.91m \log_{10} c.0.47m$ max wide and c.0.47m deep, and was made of lead with a wooden lid. The coffin was decorated with a rectangular iron coffin plate fixed onto the coffin lid. The plate was badly corroded and could not be read. Traces of an oval design originally holding an inscription were visible and surrounded by an embossed design of roses and leaves (Plate 26). The coffin lid was also decorated with a double row of iron studs around the edging.

The coffin was in a poor preservation state. The coffin lid was badly decayed and the studs and coffin plate corroded. The coffin itself was bulging out along the sides and holes in the lead were present at the coffin base. A hole in the vault roof was found directly above the coffin, which had greatly contributed to the poor condition of the lid, allowing water to enter the vault and fall down onto the coffin [270].

Coffin [271]:

Coffin [271] was adjacent to coffin [270] and placed on the floor (Plate 28-30 & 35). Overlying this coffin were the remains of coffin [272] (see below). The coffin was made from wood and badly decayed and fragmented. Fragments of coffin lid were observed with the double row of copper-alloy studded decoration. Copper-alloy decorative plates and coffin handles were also seen, which would have originally adorned the sides of the coffin (Plate 31). Amongst the fragment of coffin, parts of the individual were visible; an adult female skull and her lower legs could be seen. There had been some movement to the body. The skull was facing to the right looking south and the right leg was supine, whilst the left leg was on its left side. The hole found in the vault roof had also greatly contributed to the decay of this coffin, and further

disturbance had also occurred due to the collapse of overlying coffin [272] (see below).

Coffin [272]:

Coffin [272] was also adjacent to coffin [270] and overlying coffin [271] (Plate 28, 29, 32 & 35). The coffin was made of wood and badly decayed and fragmented. Fragments of coffin lid were observed with a double row of copper-alloy studded decoration (Plate 33). Copper-alloy decorative plates and coffin handles were also seen, which would have originally adorned the sides of the coffin. One coffin handle also had a piece of wood with the decorative metal studs attached, indicating that the studded decoration was also originally down the sides of the coffin (Plate 34). A coffin plate was found with no visible inscription. An upturned plant pot was also found on top of the coffin plate. Amongst the fragments of coffin, parts of the individual were visible; an adult male skull, pelvis and legs could be seen. The skull was facing to the right looking south, and the pelvis and legs were turned onto their left side. Once again the hole in the vaulted roof had also contributed to the decay of this coffin.

Vault 262:

Vault 262 was orientated E-W (Plate 36). It measured $c.2.45m \log_{100} c.1.45m$ wide and c.1.8m high and was constructed with red unfrogged bricks ($c.220 \times 100 \times 65mm$) set in lime mortar in Stretcher bond. The roof comprised curved brickwork, forming a vaulted roof. Access to the vault was at the western end; here a gap was seen in the side wall of the vault containing decayed wood fragments that may have originally acted as some sort of access, the details of which are unknown (Plate 37). Vault 262 partly butted up to monument 263 to the south.

The vault contained a single small lead coffin [273] for a child placed directly onto a brick built floor (Plate 38 & 39). The coffin is described as follows:

Coffin [273]:

Coffin [273] was placed along the southern side of the vault (Plate 40). The coffin was made from lead with a wood surround for decoration. It measured c.0.8m long, c.0.28m max wide and c.0.25m deep. The coffin itself was fairly intact, although the top had started to come away from the left side. On top of the coffin were fragments of a highly corroded metal coffin plate with slight traces of an embossed flower decoration, but no writing was visible. Fragments of wood with a single row of metal studs were found on top of the coffin, and around the base and up the corners of the coffin (Plates 41 & 42).

Grave Monuments [263] [264] [266] (Fig. 5 & 6; Plates 43-45)

The ground reduction also exposed the base of a number of grave monuments, at the southern end of the area, all of which stayed in situ and undisturbed. The brick work would have originally formed part of a grave monument on top of an underlying burial vault. The monuments were all rectangular in shape and orientated E-W. They are described as follows:

Monument 263:

Monument 263 was located to the south of vault 262 and was also butted by the vault. It measured c.1.8m long and c.0.85m wide. It was constructed with a double row of red bricks ($c.230 \times 100 \times 65mm$) set in lime mortar in Stretcher bond (Plate 43).

Monument 264:

Monument 264 was found to the west of monument 174. It measured c.1.8m long and c.1.05m wide. It was constructed with a single row of bricks (c.230mm long and c.110mm wide) set in lime mortar in Stretcher bond (Plate 44).

Monument 266:

Monument 266 was partially exposed to the south of monument 263. It measured c.0.98m wide. It was constructed with a double row of red unfrogged bricks ($c.220 \times 100 \times 65$ mm) set in lime mortar in Stretcher bond (Plate 45).

Brick Walls [265] & [267] (Fig. 5 & 6; Plates 46-49)

The ground reduction area also exposed two brick wall at the southern end of the area. They are described as follows:

Wall [265]:

Wall [265] was adjacent to the southwest corner of the parish centre lounge. It was orientated SW-NE and then curved round to a north-south direction. The wall was constructed with a double row of red bricks ($c.220 \times 110 \times 65$ mm) set in lime mortar in Stacked bond (Plates 46-48).

Wall [267]:

Wall [267] was adjacent to monument 173. It was orientated E-W, and measured c.1.87m long and c.0.21m wide. It was constructed with a double row of red bricks set in lime mortar in Stacked bond (Plate 49).

4.2.3 Wall Footing Trench (Fig. 5; Plates 50-52)

Along the eastern side of the ground reduced area for the new pathway, a footing trench was mechanically excavated to accommodate a new wall. The footing trench was c.0.5-0.85m wide and c.1m deep, and was cut through cemetery soil. The trench exposed two rectangular grave stones with no inscription or decoration. Each stone measured c.1.82m long, c.0.64m wide and c.0.07m deep. The trench also contained three concentrations of disarticulated human bone, filling five large bags; that were encountered from c.0.2m below the ground level (BGL). Amongst the remains a number of iron coffin handles were also found. Two different styles were noted; a squared shape handle and a more curved handle. The handles ranged in length between c.150-180mm.

4.4 *Eastern Cemetery*

4.4.1 New Pathway Footing Trench (Fig. 5; Plates 53-54)

A footing trench was mechanically excavated to accommodate a new pathway to be laid in a circular route around the eastern cemetery. The trench was <0.1m deep, cutting into the topsoil. Nothing of archaeological significance was observed.

4.4.2 Stone Bench Footing Trench (Fig. 5; Plates 55-56)

A footing trench was mechanically excavated to accommodate a curved stone and wood bench at the western end of the eastern cemetery. The footing trench was c.0.8m wide and c.0.95m deep. The stratigraphy comprised c.0.15m deep of topsoil, underlying was light-mid brown soft silty clay with frequent small-medium sub-angular stones, c.0.35m deep, overlying cemetery soil. Nothing of archaeological significance was observed.

4.4.3 Tree Planting (Plates 57-58)

Tree planting was carried out in concentrations within the eastern cemetery. This entailed the shallow hand excavation of a series of holes <0.5m deep. Nothing of archaeological significance was noted.








Figure 4: Test pits and probing levels (*scale 1:100*)




Figure 5: Archaeology plan (*scale 1:300*)

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


Figure 6: Exposed monuments and wall segments at the southern end of site (*scale 1:100*)

5. Conclusions

The project entailed the recording of the stacked monuments. These monuments provided a continuation of the various monument styles found throughout the cemetery during the churchyard assessment in 2010. The monuments dated to the $18^{\text{th}}-19^{\text{th}}$ century, and were thought to have been displaced due to extensions and alterations made to the church and churchyard which have encroached upon the burial area.

The excavations identified a number of unknown grave monuments, mainly at the southern end of the western cemetery. The monuments consisted of two body stones, two burial vaults dated to the 18^{th} century, and three monument bases thought to have underlying vaults. The identification of these monuments has aided in establishing a more complete cemetery plan.

The two burial vaults that were fully exposed provided a good example of burial customs in the 18th century. Vault 261 contained three decorated lead coffins and two degraded wooden coffins, belong to the *Keene* family. The construction of the vault, and the decoration of the coffins points to a high status family. Vault 262 contained a single decorated lead coffin of unknown name or date which was comparable to those found in vault 261. It is thought that vault 262 also dated to the 18th century and once again the vault and coffin would suggest that this individual came from a wealthy family.

Two sections of brick wall exposed at the southern end of the western cemetery were most likely associated with earlier boundaries or pathways.

The project uncovered a number of concentrations of disarticulated human remains, primarily deriving from the footing trench for the new wall. It is likely that these remains were initially disturbed during extensions to the church, and reburied. Little scientific information can be gained from disarticulated remains, and such finds are to be expected within a cemetery that has been used for centuries.

Confidence Rating

The works were carried out in good site conditions, with full co-operation of the client, and with no constraints. The result, therefore, are given a high confidence rating.
