


Figure 1: General location (scale 1:25,000)

Summary

In June 2007 a watching brief on was carried out at 6 Castle Hill Avenue, Berkhamsted, Hertfordshire, during the excavation of footings for a conservatory on the east side of the existing house. The foundations were about 1m deep and 0.5m wide and cut through reddish-brown subsoil down onto and partly into the underlying natural chalk. Apart from the buried foundations of a path or patio no man-made features or artefacts were observed.

1 Introduction

1.1 In June 2007 Archaeological Services and Consultancy Ltd (ASC) carried out a watching brief at 6 Castle Hill Avenue, Berkhamsted, Hertfordshire (NGR SP 9934-0835: Fig. 1). The project was commissioned by Skyview Conservatories, and was carried out according to a brief (Batt 2007) prepared on behalf of the local planning authority (LPA), Dacorum Borough Council, by their archaeological advisor (AA), of the Historic Environment section of Hertfordshire County Council, and a project design prepared by ASC (Barclay 2007). The relevant planning application reference is 4/00609/07/FHA.

1.2 Planning Background

This watching brief has been required as a planning condition under the terms of *Planning Policy Guidance Note 16* (PPG16), in response to proposals for the construction of a conservatory.

1.3 Location




Figure 2: Site plan (scale 1:5000)

The site is in Berkhamsted, in the administrative district of Dacorum, Hertfordshire (Fig. 2). It is on the northern side of the town, on the east side of Castle Hill Avenue and is centred on Ordnance Survey National Grid Reference SP 9934 0835.

1.4 Description




Figure 3: Proposed development

The site of the proposed conservatory lies on the centre of the east side (rear) of the existing dwelling (Fig. 3), overlooking an established lawn, flower beds and shrubberies.

1.5 Geology & Topography

The site is situated on gently sloping terrain falling away to the east. The soils of the area comprise the *Charity 2 Association*: namely flinty fine silty soils over chalk (Soil Survey, 1983). The site is on the north side of the valley of the river Bulbourne, and lies at an elevation of c.112m OD.

2 Aims & Methods

2.1 *Aims*

The aims of the watching brief were:

- To ensure the archaeological monitoring of all aspects of the development programme likely to affect archaeological remains
- To secure the adequate recording of any archaeological remains revealed by the development programme
- To secure the analysis, conservation and long-term storage of any artefactual/ecofactual material recovered from the site.

2.2 Standards

The work conformed to the project design, to the relevant sections of the Institute of Archaeologists' *Code of Conduct* (IFA 2000) and *Standard & Guidance Notes* (IFA 2001), to the Association of Local Government Archaeological Officers East of England Region *Standards for Field Archaeology in the East of England* (ALGAO 2003), and to the relevant sections of ASC's own *Operations Manual*.

2.3 Methods

The work was carried out according to a standard brief, which required:

- Soil and overburden stripping under archaeological supervision
- Inspection of sub-soil deposits for archaeological features
- The rapid investigation and recording of any archaeological features/deposits
- Sub-soil stripping under archaeological supervision
- Examination of any service and foundation trenches and the subsequent recording of any exposed archaeological deposits
- Rapid examination of spoil-heaps for archaeological material
- A programme of post-fieldwork analysis, archiving and publication

2.4 Constraints

There were no constraints, other than rain, encountered on this project.

3 Archaeological & Historical Background

- 3.1 The area falls within an *Area of Archaeological Significance* (AAS 21), which covers the historic core of Berkhamsted. The site itself lies between Berkhamsted Castle and the Tudor mansion of *'Berkhamsted Place'*. Between the mansion and the castle a series of prehistoric, Roman and medieval artefacts have been discovered. Whether these are a result of random loss or of direct occupation is not known. Historically, the area once formed part of the medieval hunting park that belonged to the manor and honour of Berkhamsted.
- 3.2 In the medieval period the site lay in a hunting park belonging to the manor of Berkhamsted (Doggett and Hunn 1985). The origins of this park are not certain but there was no mention of it in Domesday Book (Morris 1976). The subsequent history of the castle and Honour of Berkhamsted suggests a royal creation, sometime in the 12th or 13th century. In the early years of the reign of Edward I (c.1272) there was mention of a certain park with deer (Cobb 1883, 18), and it seems that the park had been created out of the 'manorial waste'. The Reverend Cobb noted that 'the boundary fence of the castle park still exist on the common' (Cobb 1883, 19). The original extent of the hunting park was believed to extend across an area of 1,132 acres or 458 ha (Page 1908, 222). In the early 17th century there was an attempt, on the part of the Duchy of Cornwall, to enclose part of the adjoining common (the 'Frith') amounting to 300 acres. This was done for the purposes of improving income from timber (Falvey 1999). Despite local opposition this was successful but a subsequent attempt by the crown to enclose a further 400 acres failed in the face of rioting on the part of the Northchurch commoners (*ibid.*). Nevertheless, by 1627 the park had shrunk to 376 acres (Birtchnell 1960, 20) and by 1650 was 255 acres (PRO E 317 Herts 7). There are other leases of 18th-century date that mention the mansion, its park and other land amounting to 376 acres (HALs 29428). By the mid-20th century the park had shrunk to the point where it was defined by Brownlow Road to the east, by what is now Delhay Rise to the west, and extended almost to the railway line to the south and close to the adjoining messuage of Berkhamsted Place.
- 3.3 By the 18th century much of the park had almost certainly become enclosed for agricultural purpose. The park was sold by the Duchy of Cornwall to the Brownlow estate in 1862 in whose hands it remained until 1924 (Birtchnell 1960, 20).

4 Results

4.1 The footing trenches were dug out on three sides on the eastern side of the house (see cover). They measured approximately 0.5m wide and c.1m deep, enclosing an area 4.5m × 6m (Plate 4). The topsoil varied between 0.30 - 0.45m in depth the latter being where the flower beds were located. The sub-soil was reddish-brown silty clay with surprisingly few flints present. On the eastern side there was a buried concrete raft about 0.12m thick, probably the foundation for a path or patio (Plate 1). Undisturbed natural chalk was encountered at a depth of 0.9m though on the south east side it was only 0.6m below ground surface (Plates 2 & 3). There was no sign of any man-made features or artefacts present.

5. Conclusions

- 5.1 The observations undertaken during this watching brief on the present development suggest that little or no truncation of the site has occurred. This is in contrast to other properties further up the hill, on which a certain degree of terracing has taken place in the past. The soil profile revealed in the foundations of this development appears entirely natural and there were no signs of any man-made features being present. Furthermore, there was no evidence for discarded artefacts either within or adjacent to the present site.
- 5.2 It will be noted from Figure 3 that a small extension to the north east of the corner of the house is proposed. In the light of the observations above and the fact that the area will have been considerably disturbed during previous building work, no further observations were undertaken during this project.


