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


Figure 1: General location (scale 1:25,000)

Summary

During July and August 2007 Archaeological Services and Consultancy carried out a watching brief at 10 Castle Hill Avenue, Berkhamsted, during the initial groundworks for an extension. Archaeological remains of Iron Age, Roman and Medieval date have been recorded in the area, but on this occasion the only archaeological remains observed comprised a cut filled with modern bricks, interpreted as possible wall footings, dating from the early 20th century. The archaeological impact of the development is considered to be negligible.

1 Introduction

1.1 In July and August 2007 Archaeological Services and Consultancy Ltd (ASC) carried out a watching brief at 10 Castle Hill Avenue, Berkhamsted (NGR SP 9935 0833 Fig. 1). The project was commissioned by Mr and Mrs Rollit, and was carried out according to a project design prepared by ASC, and approved by Mrs Kate Batt of the Heritage and Environment Section, Hertfordshire County Council (HES). The relevant planning application reference is 4/02819/06/FHA.

1.2 Planning Background

This watching brief has been required as a planning condition under the terms of *Planning Policy Guidance Note 16* (PPG16), in response to proposals for the construction of a two-storey extension to the house.

1.3 *Location*

The site is in Berkhamsted, in the administrative district of Dacorum, Hertfordshire (Fig. 1). It is on the northern side of the town, on the east side of Castle Hill Avenue and is centred on Ordnance Survey National Grid Reference SP 9935 0833.

1.4 *Description*




Figure 2: Site plan (scale 1:5000)

Access to the site is from Castle Hill Avenue, which runs to the southwest of the site (Fig. 2). The development site is surrounded on its remaining three sides by houses and their associated gardens. The site currently comprises par of the ground floor storey of the existing house, set within a large garden. A number of services cross the site, between the road and the existing building, outside the area of the new extension.

1.5 *Geology & Topography*

The soils of the area comprise the *Charity 2 Association*: namely flinty fine silty soils over chalk (Soil Survey, 1983). The site is within the valley of the river Bulbourne on the north side of the valley, and lies at an elevation of c.112m OD.

2 Aims & Methods

2.1 *Aims*

As described in the project design (Section 2), the aims of the watching brief were:

- To ensure the archaeological monitoring of all aspects of the development programme likely to affect archaeological remains
- To secure the adequate recording of any archaeological remains revealed by the development programme
- To secure the analysis, conservation and long-term storage of any artefactual / ecofactual material recovered from the site.

2.2 Standards

The work conformed to the project design, to the relevant sections of the Institute of Archaeologists' *Code of Conduct* (IFA 2000) and *Standard & Guidance Notes* (IFA 2001), to the Association of Local Government Archaeological Officers East of England Region *Standards for Field Archaeology in the East of England* (ALGAO 2003), and to the relevant sections of ASC's own *Operations Manual*.

2.3 *Methods*

The work was carried out according to the project design (Section 2), which required:

- Soil and overburden stripping under archaeological supervision
- Inspection of sub-soil deposits for archaeological features
- The rapid investigation and recording of any archaeological features/deposits
- Sub-soil stripping under archaeological supervision
- Examination of any service and foundation trenches and the subsequent recording of any exposed archaeological deposits
- Rapid examination of spoil-heaps for archaeological material
- A programme of post-fieldwork analysis, archiving and publication

2.4 Constraints

The new services for the extension reused the existing service trenches. It was therefore agreed, on consultation with Kate Batt of the HES, that these did not need to be monitored.

3 Archaeological & Historical Background

SMR = Hertfordshire Sites and Monuments Record

3.1 General

Berkhamsted is an area of considerable archaeological and historical importance (Birtchnell 1960; HCC 2004; Page (ed), 1908) and this has been recognised by *Hertfordshire County Council* by the designation of much of the town as an *Area of Archaeological Importance*.

3.2 Prehistoric (before 600BC)

A large bank and ditch, known as Grim's Ditch, runs along the south side of the Bulbourne Valley. It may have been a boundary ditch between tribal territories. Settlements of Neolithic to Iron Age date were discovered south of this ditch during the construction of the A41. It is likely that there were other settlements in the area. (HCC 2004)

3.3 Iron Age (600BC-AD43)

Evidence of a settlement dating to the Late Iron Age, or early Roman period was found during the building of Bridgewater Middle School in 1974. This settlement included four iron working furnaces and several cremation burials. (HCC 2004).

3.4 Roman (AD43-c.450)

It is likely that the area of the modern Castle Hill Avenue and Bridgewater Road was occupied during the Roman period. Evidence of Roman occupation was revealed during the construction of the houses on Castle Hill Avenue during the 1930s (SMR 12193). Roman pottery dating to the 1st and 2nd centuries AD has been found on Bridgewater Road (SMR 6071 and 6803), and it is likely that a Roman pottery kiln was situated in the area west of Castle Hill Avenue.

3.5 Saxon (c.450-1066)

The manor at Northchurch, to the west of Berkhamsted, probably had Saxon origins, and the site lies within the extent of the estate of Northchurch (HCC 2004).

3.6 Medieval (1066-1500)

The site lies outside the medieval borough of Berkhamsted, but is situated c.200m west of Berkhamsted Castle, an earth and timber 'motte and bailey' castle built soon after the Norman conquest of 1066 (HCC 2004).

3.7 Post-Medieval (1500-1900)

There is no known evidence for post-medieval activity in the immediate vicinity of 10 Castle Hill Avenue. The focus of settlement remained south of the river until the 20th century.

3.8 Modern (1900-present)

A house built in the 1930s previously occupied the site. Much of this house has been demolished to allow the building of the extension.

4 **Results**

The excavation of foundation trenches on 18^{th} July 2007, and on 1^{st} August was monitored. The foundation trenches were excavated by mini-digger with a toothed bucket. The main external foundation trenches were 1m wide and between 0.6m and 1m in depth. The internal foundation trenches were 0.5m wide and 0.5m in depth.

A layer of topsoil of between 0.1m and 0.4m in thickness overlay a mid reddish brown flinty clay subsoil, which extended to 0.8m below the highest point of the existing ground level. This overlay the light greyish white chalk bedrock, which was excavated to a depth of 1m below the existing ground level.

The only archaeological feature noted was in the east section of the easternmost foundation trench, and did not extend into the trench. This was a 0.5m deep cut filled with modern bricks and a loose, crumbly dark brownish black soil. This may be the remains of a wall, or perhaps a disused drain.




Figure 3: Plan of existing building, showing location of new footings (in red) and of possible wall (in blue).

Most of the foundation trenches followed the line of the foundations for the original 1930s house (Fig. 3), although some extended beyond this.



5. Conclusions

No archaeological remains earlier than AD1900 were observed. It is likely that the construction of the house in the 1930s would have impacted upon any features present. The foundation trenches were mostly excavated through disturbed ground, limiting the potential to observe archaeological remains. It is unlikely that large quantities of significant archaeological features or artefacts are present in this location, as the main focus of settlement in Berkhamsted remained south of the river until the late 19th century. The development took place over a limited area and is unlikely to have had a significant impact on any such archaeological remains.

The watching brief was undertaken in generally sunny weather and conditions for the watching brief were good. Full co-operation was received from the contractors and a high confidence rating is attached to the results of the watching brief.




