


Figure 1: General location (Scale 1:25,000)

### Summary

In May 2008 ASC Ltd carried out a watching brief at 3 Fisher Road, Bishop's Itchington, Warwickshire as a condition of planning permission for the construction of a new garage. No archaeological finds or features were observed during the watching brief and the impact of the development is considered to be low. The site appears to have always formed a parcel of land used for small-scale agriculture or market gardening.

### 1. Introduction

1.1 In May 2008 Archaeological Services and Consultancy Ltd (ASC) carried out a watching brief at 3 Fisher Road, Bishops Itchington, Warwickshire. The project was commissioned by Mr Simon Tagg-Wilkinson, and was carried out according to a brief (Stocks 2008) prepared on behalf of the local planning authority (LPA), *Stratford-upon-Avon District Council*, by their archaeological advisor (AA), the *Museum Service* of *Warwickshire County Council*, and a project design prepared by ASC. The relevant planning application reference is 07/01829/FUL.

#### 1.2 **Planning Background**

This watching brief was required under the terms of *Planning Policy Guidance Note* 16 (PPG16), as a condition of planning permission for the development of the site.

#### 1.3 Archaeological Services & Consultancy Ltd

Archaeological Services & Consultancy Ltd (ASC) is an independent archaeological practice providing a full range of archaeological services including consultancy, field evaluation, mitigation and post-excavation studies, historic building recording and analysis. ASC is recognised as a *Registered Archaeological Organisation* by the Institute of Field Archaeologists, in recognition of its high standards and working practices.

#### 1.4 Management

The assessment was managed by Karin Semmelmann BA MA AIFA, and was carried out under the overall direction of Bob Zeepvat BA MIFA.

#### 1.5 The Site

#### 1.5.1 Location & Description

The site is located in Bishops Itchington, in the administrative district of Stratford-upon-Avon, Warwickshire (Figure 1). It is situated in the centre of the village, on the north side of Fisher Road and is centred on National Grid Reference SP 3893 5781 (Figure 2). The site lies within the probable extent of the medieval settlement of Bishops Itchington (Warwickshire Historic Environment Record MWA 9046).

The site comprises a sub-rectangular area of land, currently occupied by a detached house and garden (Figure 2).

#### 1.5.2 Geology & Topography

The soils of the area comprise the *Evesham 2 Association*, namely slowly permeable calcareous clayey soils (Soil Survey 1983, 411b). The underlying geology comprises Jurassic and Cretaceous Clay (BGS, Sheet 201).

The site lies at approximately 115m above Ordnance Datum and slopes gently downwards from northeast to southwest.

#### 1.5.3 Proposed Development




Figure 3: Proposed development, monitored areas shown in red (Scale 1:100)

The proposed development is for the construction of a new garage on the east side of the existing house (Figure 3).

### 2. Aims & Methods

#### 2.1 *Aims*

As described in the brief (Section 3), the aims of the watching brief were:

• To obtain an adequate record of any archaeological deposits or finds disturbed or exposed by work associated with the development

#### 2.2 Standards

The work conformed to the project design, to the relevant sections of the Institute of Archaeologists' *Code of Conduct* (IFA 2000) and *Standard & Guidance Notes* (IFA 2001), and to the relevant sections of ASC's own *Operations Manual*.

#### 2.3 *Methods*

The work was carried out according to the brief (Sections 3 & 4), which required:

- Archaeological monitoring of all groundworks. Ground reduction within the footprint of the new building and for the new access was undertaken using a wide, toothless ditching bucket
- Investigation and recording of all archaeological contexts and artefacts disturbed or exposed
- A programme of sampling of appropriate materials for environmental or other scientific analysis.

#### 2.4 *Constraints*

As no archaeological features were observed during the watching brief, no environmental sampling was carried out.

### 3. Archaeological & Historical Background

3.1 The following section provides a summary of the readily available archaeological and historical background to the development site and its environs. The site lies within an area of archaeological and historical interest, and has the potential to reveal evidence of a range of periods.

This section has been compiled with information from the Warwickshire Historic Environment Record (HER) and the Victoria History of the County of Warwick (Salzman 1951).

#### 3.2 **Prehistoric & Iron Age** (before AD43)

Little is known of the area during the prehistoric periods. The only prehistoric activity recorded in the area is a group of three possible round barrows (burial mounds) c.2km southeast of the site (HER 806). These are located on a hill known locally as 'coffin hill'.

3.3 **Roman** (AD43-c.450)

During the Roman period the area was some distance from the main centres of occupation, which was focused on the small town of Chesterton, 5km west of Bishops Itchington. Chesterton developed on a major Roman road, now known as the *Fosse Way* (OS 1979), which linked *Corinium* (Cirencester) with *Ratae* (Leicester). The only evidence of Roman activity in the village is a group of Roman coins discovered *c*.1km southwest of the site (Salzman 1951).

#### 3.4 *Saxon* (c.450-1066)

Little is known of the early development of the village, which originated during the Saxon period. Bishops Itchington is mentioned in the Domesday survey (1086), where it is referred to as *Icetone*. The land was held by the Abbey of Coventry and was valued at  $\pounds 12$  (Williams & Martin 2003, 653).

#### 3.5 *Medieval* (1066-1500)

The village developed during the medieval period and was granted a market in 1259 (HER 9046; Slater 1997, fig. 57). The development site is in the medieval core of the village. The presence of earthworks on the west side of the village (HER 4929) suggests that the area of medieval settlement extended further to the west and that the settlement subsequently contracted. A second shrunken settlement is present c.1.km south of the site, centred on Old Town Farm (HER 6181) where a number of earthworks are interpreted as medieval or post-medieval fishponds (HER 6183). Areas of medieval ridge and furrow cultivation strips are present in the fields surrounding the village.

#### 3.6 **Post-Medieval & Modern** (1500-present)

The present street layout of the village had largely been established by the early 19<sup>th</sup> century. The first edition Ordnance Survey map shows the High Street and Fisher Road, but Station Road was constructed later in the 19<sup>th</sup> century, to provide access to the railway station, which was situated north of the village.

The site is situated c.100m northeast of the village church (HER 623). A church is known to have stood on the site since the medieval period but the current church was constructed in 1872 to a design by Ewan Christian (Pevsner & Wedgewood 2003, 214). It is a Grade II Listed Building.

### 4. **Results**

- 4.1 Between 13<sup>th</sup> and 15<sup>th</sup> May 2008 three visits were made to monitor the groundworks for a new double garage and associated access.
- 4.2 Footing trenches were excavated to a depth of between 1m and 1.50m below the existing ground level. The ground within the footprint of the new garage was reduced by up to 0.30m using a toothless bucket. The hedge was removed using a toothed bucket and the ground level for the new access was reduced by up to 0.25m with a toothless bucket.
- 4.3 Dark brownish black silty clay topsoil overlay the site to a depth of up to 0.50m. Below this was mid yellowish brown silty clay subsoil with occasional inclusions of large, roughly shaped sandstone and smaller blue lias boulders, concentrated in the southeast corner of the footing trench. The natural strata, stiff mid yellowish brown clay, was observed at a depth of 1m below existing ground level (Fig. 4).
- 4.4 Fragments of glazed pottery of probable 18<sup>th</sup> century date were observed in the topsoil, and the client reports frequently finding clay pipe stems whilst gardening. No other archaeological finds or features were observed during the watching brief.
- 4.5 A tree in the southeast corner of the site had caused minimal ground disturbance and its roots did not extend beyond the topsoil. The hedge boundary to the northeast of the site had also caused minimal ground disturbance within the topsoil.



### 5. Conclusions

- 5.1 No structured archaeological work had previously been carried out in Bishop's Itchington. This watching brief therefore provided an opportunity to investigate the history of the village.
- 5.2 The existing building on the development site is one of the earliest buildings in Bishop's Itchington. Information supplied by the client indicates that the house may be timber-framed, it could therefore be of medieval or post-medieval date. The existing building is shown on the 1<sup>st</sup> edition Ordnance Survey map of 1886 (Fig. 5).
- 5.3 No archaeological features were observed during the watching brief and the only archaeological finds were occasional fragments of pottery in the topsoil. These fragments of pottery were glazed and clearly of 18<sup>th</sup> or 19<sup>th</sup> century date.
- 5.4 The site appears to have always formed part of the garden of 3 Fisher Road, also known as Fern House. The house may have medieval origins although it is equally likely to be later.
- 5.5 *Confidence Rating*

The excavation of footing trenches for the new garage and ground reduction for both the garage and the new access were monitored. Weather conditions were favourable and no factors hindered the watching brief. A high confidence rating is therefore attached to the results.
