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


Figure 1: General location (*scale 1:25,000*)

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Summary

During early 2008, an archaeological watching brief was carried out at Old East End House, East End, Furneux Pelham, Hertfordshire, as a condition of planning permission for the development of the site. No archaeological finds or features were observed during the watching brief, and it is unlikely that the development will have a significant affect on archaeological remains.

1. Introduction

1.1 In early 2008 Archaeological Services and Consultancy Ltd (ASC) carried out a watching brief at Old East End House, East End, Furneux Pelham, Hertfordshire. The project was commissioned by Jane Crossley, and was carried out according to a brief (Tinniswood 2007) prepared on behalf of the local planning authority (LPA), East Hertfordshire District Council, by their archaeological advisor (AA), Hertfordshire County Council Historic Environment Unit, and a project design prepared by ASC (Barclay 2007). The relevant planning application reference is 3/06/2027.

1.2 Planning Background

This watching brief was required under the terms of *Planning Policy Guidance Note* 16 (PPG16), as a condition of planning permission for the development of the site.

1.3 Archaeological Services & Consultancy Ltd

Archaeological Services & Consultancy Ltd (ASC) is an independent archaeological practice providing a full range of archaeological services including consultancy, field evaluation, mitigation and post-excavation studies, historic building recording and analysis. ASC is recognised as a Registered Archaeological Organisation by the Institute of Field Archaeologists, in recognition of its high standards and working practices.

1.4 Management

The assessment was managed by **Karin Semmelmann** BA MA AIFA, and was carried out under the overall direction of **Bob Zeepvat** BA MIFA.

1.5 The Site

1.5.1 Location & Description

The site is situated in the civil parish of Furneux Pelham in the county of Hertfordshire. It is located to the west of Furneux Peham and to the south of Stocking Pelham, at NGR TL 4483 2783 (Fig. 1). Access to the site will be from the road to the north of the house. Services plans have not been provided.

1.5.2 *Geology & Topography*

The soils of the area comprise the Hanslope Association, which consists of "Slowly permeable calcareous clayey soils. Some slowly permeable non-calcareous clayey soils. Slight risk of soil erosion." This overlies a geological base of chalky till (Soil Survey 1983; 411d). The site lies at a height of c.115m OD.

1.5.3 Proposed Development

The proposed development is an extension to two sides of the house (Fig. 3).




Figure 2: Site plan (*scale 1:1250*)

2. Aims & Methods

2.1 *Aims*

As described in the brief (Section 3), the aims of the watching brief were:

- To ensure the archaeological monitoring of all aspects of the development programme likely to affect archaeological remains
- To secure the adequate recording of any archaeological remains revealed by the development programme
- To secure the analysis, conservation and long-term storage of any artefactual/ecofactual material recovered from the site
- To provide an adequately detailed project report that will place the findings of the monitoring and recording of the development programme in their local and regional context.

2.2 Standards

The work conformed to the project design, to the relevant sections of the Institute of Archaeologists' *Code of Conduct* (IFA 2000) and *Standard & Guidance Notes* (IFA 2001), to the Association of Local Government Archaeological Officers East of England Region *Standards for Field Archaeology in the East of England* (ALGAO 2003), and to the relevant sections of ASC's own *Operations Manual*.

2.3 *Methods*

The work was carried out according to the brief (Section 4), which required:

- Soil and overburden stripping under archaeological supervision
- The inspection of the sub-soil for archaeological features, deposits and artefacts
- The rapid investigation and recording of any archaeological features or deposits
- Sub-soil stripping under archaeological supervision
- The examination of foundation trenches, etc., and the subsequent recording of any exposed archaeological remains
- Rapid examination of spoil heaps for archaeological material
- A programme of post-fieldwork analysis, archiving and publication.

2.4 Constraints

The footing trench along the northern side of the house was excavated without archaeological supervision, and was shored up with wooden boards before it could be properly photographed due to the risk of subsidence.

3. Archaeological & Historical Background

- 3.1 The following section provides a summary of the readily available archaeological and historical background to the development site and its environs. The site lies within an area of archaeological and historical interest, and has the potential to reveal evidence of a range of periods.
- 3.2 The site is situated within an area of considerable historical significance, and also lies within the designated Area of Archaeological Significance 411. This area includes the historic hamlet of East End. The house itself is a Grade II listed building of 17th century date.
- 3.3 Evidence of prehistoric activity has been found in the area, with the discovery of a bronze hoard at Furneux Pelham. This could be an indication of Bronze Age settlers in the area (Munby 1977).
- 3.4 The village of Furneux Pelham goes back several centuries. The church of St Mary has 13th century origins, and Furneux Pelham Hall is a 16th century building (Pevsner & Cherry 1977).

4. Results

- 4.1 Apart from the footing trenches located to the north of the house (Section 2.4), all the footing trenches were excavated under archaeological supervision. All the footings for the main building were between 0.4m and 0.6m wide, and between 1.7m and 1.9m deep. The footing trench for the new conservatory was also 0.4m wide and 1m deep.
- 4.2 The stratigraphy was the same throughout the site. Before the excavation of the footing trenches began, the area was reduced by a uniform 0.75m, leaving *c*.0.3m of subsoil *in situ*. The stratigraphy within the footing trenches across the site comprised *c*.0.3m of mid brown subsoil over *c*.0.6m of natural yellow chalky clay, which in turn overlay *c*.1m of reddy orange sand (Plates 1 and 2). In the area of the new conservatory, the footing trench just reached the top of the sandy layer (Plate 3).




Figure 2: Proposed development plan (scale 1:100)

5. Conclusions

- 5.1 No archaeological finds or features were observed within any of the footing trenches. The topsoil and subsoil on the site were largely free of any manmade inclusions, suggesting that the existing development may have been the first on the site.
- 5.2 Although significant archaeological features were not observed in the trenches, the existence of individual isolated archaeological features away from the trenches cannot be specifically excluded. Given the rural location of the dwelling, it is possible that a former cesspit or soakaway exists in the vicinity, but the findings of this watching brief indicate that they are likely to be positioned some distance from the house. It is unlikely that the proposed development will have a significant impact on archaeological remains.

5.3 *Confidence Rating*

The watching brief was undertaken in generally clear, dry conditions, and full cooperation was received from all parties involved. The only departure from the requirements has been outlined above (Section 2.4).

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

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
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
