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


Figure 1: General location (scale 1:25,000)

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Summary

In September 2009 a watching brief was carried out at Cedar Cottage, Village Road, Denham during the construction of a single storey rear extension to the existing cottage. The site has been much disturbed due to services and a former concrete pond and stream. Therefore no archaeological features or deposits were observed.

1. Introduction

1.1 In September 2009 Archaeological Services and Consultancy Ltd (ASC) carried out a watching brief at Cedar Cottage, Village Road, Denham. The project was commissioned by Mr P Williams, and was carried out according to a brief (Alqassar 2009) prepared on behalf of the local planning authority (LPA), South Buckinghamshire District Council, by their archaeological advisor (AA), Buckinghamshire County Council Archaeological Service, and a project design (Rouse 2009) prepared by ASC. The relevant planning application reference is 08/01691/FUL.

1.2 Planning Background

This watching brief was required under the terms of *Planning Policy Guidance Note* 16 (PPG16), as a condition of planning permission for the development of the site.

1.3 Archaeological Services & Consultancy Ltd

Archaeological Services & Consultancy Ltd (ASC) is an independent archaeological practice providing a full range of archaeological services including consultancy, field evaluation, mitigation and post-excavation studies, historic building recording and analysis. ASC is recognised as a Registered Archaeological Organisation by the Institute of Field Archaeologists, in recognition of its high standards and working practices.

1.4 Management

The project was managed by Karin Semmelmann BA MA MIFA, and was carried out under the overall direction of Bob Zeepvat BA MIFA.

1.5 The Site

1.5.1 *Location & Description*

The site is located in the district of South Buckinghamshire, within the parish and village of Denham, at NGR TQ 0429 8695 (Fig. 1).

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


Figure 2: Site plan (scale 1:1250)

The site is located to the south of St Mary's Church, and the churchyard forms the northern boundary of the site. The site is accessed from Village Road, which forms the western boundary of the site (Fig. 2).

1.5.2 *Geology & Topography*

The soils of the area belong to the Park Gate Association, and are likely to comprise deep stoneless silty soils variably affected by groundwater, over

Aeolian silty drift (Soil Survey 1983, 841e). The underlying geology comprises Quaternary Pleistocene and Holocene Taplow gravel (BGS, Sheet 255).

1.5.3 Development

The development comprises the construction of a single storey extension to the existing cottage (Fig. 3).

2. Aims & Methods

2.1 *Aims*

As described in the brief (Section 5), the aims of the watching brief were:

• To identify, appropriately investigate and record any archaeological remains revealed by the ground works.

2.2 Standards

The work conformed to the project design, to the relevant sections of the Institute for Archaeologists' *Code of Conduct* (IFA 2000) and *Standard & Guidance Notes* (IFA 2001), and to the relevant sections of ASC's own *Operations Manual*.

2.3 Methods

The work was carried out according to the brief (Section 6), which required:

- Groundworks to be undertaken with an appropriate machine, equipped with a toothless ditching bucket.
- A comprehensive watching brief to be carried out during the mechanical stripping of top and subsoil.
- Results of the comprehensive watching brief to be notified to the AA and further watching brief visits to be undertaken to monitor other intrusive groundworks if required.
- If archaeological remains are discovered at any stage of groundworks the AA is to be notified.
- Sufficient time to be allowed by the client to allow appropriate investigation of discovered archaeological remains in order that they are dated, characterised and appropriately recorded.
- If unexpected archaeological remains of sufficient significance are discovered an appropriate mitigation strategy is to be implemented, subsequent to agreement with the AA and the client.
- Finds to be collected and recorded as appropriate.

2.4 Constraints

No constraints were identified during the fieldwork, and the work was carried out according to the aims and methods detailed in the project design.

3. Archaeological & Historical Background

3.1 The following section provides a summary of the readily available archaeological and historical background to the development site and its environs. The site lies within an area of archaeological and historical interest, and has the potential to reveal evidence of a range of periods.

This section has been compiled with information from the Buckinghamshire Historic Environment Record (HER) and other readily available sources.

3.2 **Prehistoric** (before 600BC – AD43)

Evidence for prehistoric activity is limited mainly to flint scatters found during fieldwalking (HER5751), or by chance (HER0821 and HER4460). In addition to this, a Bronze Age sword was found in the late18th – early 19^{th} century, c.300m to the west of the site.

3.3 **Roman** (AD43-c.450)

The HER records a Roman road c.600m south west of the development site, which follows the general route of the modern A40. It is thought that this road connected London with the south Oxfordshire region, passing through Middlesex into Buckinghamshire (HER4399). There is only one recorded find dating to the Roman period within the study area, a coin of Constantine I (AD307-337), discovered c.150m to the north east of the development site.

3.4 **Saxon - Medieval** (c.450 -1500)

The settlement at Denham is mentioned in the Domesday Survey of 1086, suggesting it has its origins in the late Saxon or early medieval period. It also mentions the presence of two mills in Denham (HER2893), which are identified on later mapping as being located c.300m to the southeast of the development site. There is also documentary evidence for a medieval market and fair at Denham, granted by charter in early 1227 by King Henry III to Henry de Capella (HER9844).

There are several listed buildings in the village of Denham, including The Old Bakery (HER5062). Whilst this Grade II listed building was being restored, it was discovered that the building started life as a medieval base-cruck hall, which has been dated to the mid 14th century, based on archaeological and documentary evidence.

The church of St Mary is located immediately to the north of the development site, with the churchyard boundary forming the northern boundary of the site. Although much updated in the 18th and 19th centuries, the earliest features within the building date to the 13th century.

3.5 **Post-Medieval** (1500-1900)

Located on the development site itself, Cedar Cottage, and the adjacent Cedar Tree Cottage, are both Grade II listed buildings dated to the 17th century.

A bronze purse mount with traces of green enamelling dating to the 15^{th} or 16^{th} century was found c.450m to the southeast of the development site.

Denham Place is a large 17th century brick mansion, built by Sir Robert/Roger Hall, situated *c*.500m to the north west of the development site. It is thought to be on the site of the former Denham Manor, which belonged to the Peckham family (HER4370). Another large 17th century manor house, known as Denham Court, is located *c*.800m to the east of the development site. Largely rebuilt in the 18th and 19th centuries, it is surrounded by an ornamental watercourse, and has a surviving fishpond (HER2149).

3.6 *Modern* (1900-present)

During the modern period, the village of Denham has expanded considerably to the southwest of the development site, probably as a result of the opening of major transport routes nearby, such as the railway, c.1km to the north, and the M25, 2.5km to the west.

4. Results

4.1 The footings were excavated with the use of a mini digger with a 0.8m toothless bucket (Plate 1). The northwest footing was the primary area to be monitored; this was because the development area had been greatly disturbed by a former concrete fishpond, stream and soil channel (Fig. 3).

4.2 *Northwest Footing* (Fig. 3; Plates 2-3)

The northwest footing measured c.0.8m width, c.7m in length and between 1.15-1.3m in depth. The stratigraphy comprised of c.0.3m of patio and sand, underlying which is c.0.85-1.0m of a mid brown, loose, clay silt layer with moderate small subangular/rounded and rounded stones, underlying which is a light orangey brown, loose, sandy/gravely natural strata with frequent small sub-angular/rounded and rounded stones. The ground was much disturbed due to the laying of the patio, an earlier soakaway, and numerous services running through the area. No archaeological features or deposits were observed.

5. Conclusions

5.1 Due to the high level of disturbance encountered within the monitored area, the presence of buried modern services and a former concrete pond and stream, no archaeological finds or deposits were observed within the footing trench.

5.2 Confidence Rating

The work was carried out in good conditions and can be given a high confidence rating.
