<sup>1</sup> Seacourt, near Botley (Hundred of Hormer). T. N. pp. 110, 121, 127, William of Sevekeworth has in Sevekewrth, Bayworth and Mercham two fees of the Abbot of Abingdon of his barony. The grant to the Abbey, with boundaries, is given A. C. i. 179, 180. Anschi was thrown into prison by William Rufus, and died there: he left a son William (of Seacourt), whose half-brother Richard was the illegitimate son of Henry I. (A. C. ii. 37.) <sup>2</sup> Shinfield (Hundred of Theale). T. N. p. 124, Roger of Whitchurch holds Sheffield of the Monks of Noyon by the service of 40s. a year, and the aforesaid Monks have the land of the gift of the Count of Evreux in alms. p. 133, for four car. are paid 8s. <sup>3</sup> West Shefford (Hundred of Kintbury Eagle). T. N. p. 124, Richard de Lucy and Godhend de St. John his wife hold the manor of the inheritance of Robert de St. John, which belongs to his barony of Basings, and it pays no scutage.

The Abingdon Chronicle confirms Domesday in saying that the land formerly held by Ednod Stalre (A. C. ii. 19, quidam ipsius constabulus nomine Ead notus) was given to the Abbey by Earl Hugh of Chester. A. C. ii. 285, Abbot Rainald is said to have bought it from Earl Hugh for £30. Soanesfelt: c.f. Solafel. <sup>3</sup> Sugworth, near Bayworth (Hundred of Horner). T. N. p. 110, John de Chereburk (p. 121, 127, Thomas de Hynton) has half a fee of the Fee of the Abbot of Abingdon. The service is stated to be half a fee in the time of Warinus (A. C. ii. 4). <sup>4</sup> Sulhamstead (Hundred of Theale). T. N. pp. 110, 122, 127, John Banastre has one fee of the Fee of Robert Achard. p. 132, for four car. are paid 8s. <sup>5</sup> Sonning (Hundred of Sonning). T. N. pp. 124, 127, the Bishop of Sarum has in demesne Sonning and Wokingham 'sed nescitur per quod servicium.' <sup>6</sup> Sunningwell (Hundred of Horner). T. N. pp. 110, 121, Robert de Wyleby has in Sunningwell, Boxford, Cumnor, Worth and Garford 1½ fees of the Fee of the Abbot of Abingdon of his barony. *ib.* Adam de Periton has in Bayworth and Sunningwell one-fifth of a fee of the same barony. These holdings seem to have been those of Bernerius: but the Abingdon Chronicle represents them as held by Raimbaldus (A. C. ii. 4).
