# **H**istoric Houses.

## THE PRIORY OF CHACOMBE.

The Priory of Chacombe was founded by Hugh de Chaucumbe, justiciary of Normandy in the 2nd year of King John (1200). The monks who lived then were Canons Regular of St. Augustine. They were perhaps the least ascetic of the Monastic orders. A minstrel of the XIII. century says of them: "Among them one is well shod, well clothed and well fed. They go out when they like, mix with the world, and talk at table." They wore a long black cassock, cloak and hood, leather girdle, and four-square cap.

The founder, for the health of his soul, and the souls of Amabilia his wife and their heirs, and of Hodierna his then wife,
