

Reebe's Account of the Manor of Barkham, temp. Edward I.

The following Compotus of the issues and expenses of the Manor of Barkham is found among the early series of Minister's Accounts at P.R.O. which have been lately arranged and calendared and appears to be the only one of that early period extant.

TRANSLATION.

Compotus of William Bulluc, Reeve of Barkham, from the feast of St. Gregory pope, the fourth year of the reign of King Edward, son of King Henry, to the Purification of Blessed Mary next ensuing.

RENTS OF ASSIZE.

ACOUITTANCES.

Therof he answers in acquittance of a Reeve for a year x^{s.} ij^{d.} ob. In hydage paid viijd. Sum xs. xd. ob.

EXPENSES OF NECESSARIES.

The same answers for i. qr. vj. bush. of oats bought for sowing xxjd price per qr.-xijd. For ploughing and harrowing three acres and a half for oats-xvijd ob. For the said oats and for iiij acres of corn and iij acres and a half of oats reaping and binding xxijd ob. price per acre iijd. For carriage of corn and oats ijd. For iiij. qr. v. bush, and a half of corn and iiij, qr. and j. bush, of oats. Threshing and winnowing xijd. For i. qr. and a half of corn bought vs. price per qr. xld. For xij. qrs. and a half of oats bought xvj. jd. ob. q. price per qr. xvd. ob. Sum xxviis. xd.

Sum of the total expenses xxxviija. viijd. ob. And so he owes clear xj1 xij1 jd. ob. q. which he pays upon the account and is quit.
