CHILDREY, BERKS.—In 1557 Sir John Coope, Knt., of Canons Asheby, co. Northants, made his will. In it he leaves his lands at Childrey, Berks, to his youngest son, Anthony ("My lands, &c., in Childrey, Berks, as well as Kyngstons as Matravers, the parsonage and rectory of Childrey, the parke close and an acre of land called Hedlande Acre to the utter blacke lande in Childrey and the parsonage and rectory of Letcombe, to be sold by my executors." This Anthony Cope died the following year; he had married Elizabeth, daughter of Sir Humphrey Stafford, of Blatherwyke, but left no heirs; so, I suppose, his property passed to his brother George, who died 1572, but I am not sure if he left any heirs: this I want to find out. I should be very glad of any particulars of this property as regards the Copes, and also any notes of Copes.—E. C. COPE, Sulhamstead, Berks.
