He was the third and youngest son of George Clive Esquire of Whitfield, Co. Hereford, by his wife Sydney Bolton of Louth, Ireland. He married Charlotte Jane, third and youngest daughter of John Buller Esquire of Morval, Co. Cornwall, by his wife Anne, sister of Sir William Lemon, Bt. He bought the manor of Barkham sometime after 1816 and was Under-Secretary for the Home Department; he died s.p. After the death of his widow in 1874 his nephew George Clive, third son of his eldest brother Edward-Bolton Archer (d. 1845), sold the manor to John Walter of Bearwood. [V.C.H. The hatchment represents General John Leveson-Gower, M.P. (1774-1816) the eldest son of Admiral of the White the Hon. John Leveson-Gower (1740-1792) by his wife Frances (d. 1813), eldest daughter of Admiral the Hon. Edward Boscawen. He married

in 1796 Isabella Mary (d. 1817), daughter of Philip Bowes Broke, of Broke Hall, Co. Suffolk, by whom he had two sons, John (1802–1883), of Bill Hill in Hurst, Co. Berks. and Edward (1807–1853) and two daughters. His grandmother Lady Mary Gower (d. 1785), third wife of John, 1st Earl of Gower (1694–1754) purchased the manor of Barkham about 1783 which descended to John (1802–1883) during whose minority it was sold by trustees to Henry Arthur Broughton. He was the eldest son of Richard Palmer (d. 1637) of Wokingham by Dorothy daughter of Richard Meade of Soulbury, Co. Bucks. He married Mary daughter and heir of Oliver Fish of Biggleswade, Co. Bedford, by whom he had a son and heir Richard (born 1647, d.s.p.), John (1656-1674), Charles (1660-1712) and three daughters, Mary, Martha (d. 1723) and Elizabeth. He was a barrister and a magistrate for the County; he bought the manor of East Court in Finchampstead from Sir Richard Harison in 1661 and on the death of his son and heir Richard it passed to his third son Charles Palmer, M.D., of Arborfield, Co. His father owned the manor of Odes in Hurst and lived at Haines Hill and was a partisan of Cromwell but was pardoned by Charles II and allowed to retain his property which remained in the family until the middle of the 18th century. He was the eldest son and heir of Thomas Warde of Winkfield by his wife Maud daughter of Thomas Moore Esquire of Burton, Co. Bucks. He married Colubre daughter of William Flambert (Lamberde) of Chertsey, Co. Surrey, serjeant at arms to the King, by his wife Alice daughter and heir of Thomas Tasborough, Esquire of Co. Suffolk, by whom he had, according to the representation on the brasses, eight sons and nine daughters. In 1540 Richard Warde was granted the manor of Hurst by the King and he also held the manor of Winkfield, the rectory and advowson of White Waltham and of Waltham St. Lawrence; he also held the manor of Beenhams in Waltham St. Lawrence where he appears to have lived. He was cofferer to Henry VIII, Edward VI, Queen Mary and Queen Elizabeth; he died in 1578, his wife having predeceased him in 1574. Richard, his second son, appears to have been his heir, and was knighted at Reading in 1601 and died at New Windsor in 1605. Alice, his eldest daughter, married Thomas Harison (d. 1602) of Finchampstead, Co. Berks., and had a son Richard who d.v.p. and whose grandson was Sir Richard Harison (d. 1683; see No. 59 below). (Nos. 26 and 27, who married in 1607, as his first wife, Dudley Carleton, Viscount Dorchester (d. 1632); she died in 1627 and was buried in Westminster Abbey), a second daughter who died in infancy and Frances (No. 36, who married Sir Richard Harison, Kt. (d. 1655; Nos. 30-32 and 35)). She married secondly John Smith, Esquire of Co. Essex, by whom she had three sons all of whom died in infancy. Her third husband was Sir Henry Savile (No. 28), Kt. (1549-1622), Warden of Merton College, Oxford, and Provost of Eton, by whom she had two sons who died young and a daughter Elizabeth (No. 34) who married Sir John Sidley (No. 33), 2nd Bt. of Ailesford (d. 1638). The five kneeling figures of children against the sinister panel below probably represent the issue of her daughter Frances, four of whom, Richard, John, Elizabeth and Frances, are given in the pedigree in Ashmole MS. 852, 96, 97. 



(d. 1655) of Whistley and Hinton in this parish, by his wife Frances, daughter and coheir of George Garrard, second son of Sir William Garrard Kt., Lord Mayor of London. He married Dorothy only daughter and heir of William Deane Esquire of Nethercot, Co. Oxon., by

whom he had thirteen sons and two daughters. His sister Frances (d.s.p.m. 1658) was the first wife of Thomas Howard (d. 1706), 4th Earl of Berkshire. His father was knighted in 1621 and lived at his manor house in Hurst and was M.P. for Berkshire and New Windsor and Sheriff of the County; both father (d. 1655) and son (d. 1683) were Royalists and suffered heavily for their loyalty: the latter raised two troups of horse at his own charge and served first under the Earl of Crawford and then under Colonel Thomas Howard afterwards Earl of Berkshire, who as stated above: married his sister Frances. Sir Richard (d. 1683) had to mortgage his manor in 1659 to Samuel Hyne who paid £1000 for it together with property in Finchampstead; at the Restoration he was made a member of the Privy Chamber and was in possession again in 1672 when, with his son John, he made a settlement of the manor. His third son William (d. 1694; see No. 64 below) was educated at Winchester and Wadham College, Oxford, and was rector of Cheriton, Master of the Hospital of St. Cross and a prebend of Winchester; he married Dorothy and in 1678 was holding the manor of Hurst until his death. Henry Barker (d. 1651) was the eldest son of John Barker (d. 1620; for 43 years gentleman usher to Queen Elizabeth) of Hurst by his wife Frances, daughter of Henry Manfield of Taplow, Co. Bucks. He married Magdelen, daughter of William Cade, Esquire of Essex, by whom he had John, Henry, Henry, William and a daughter Frances. The latter married Henry Fairfax (d. 1650; see Nos. 43-58 above), second son of Sir Thomas Fairfax (cr. Viscount Fairfax of Emley, Co. Tipperary; d. 1636), by his wife Catherine, daughter of Sir Henry Constable, of Burton Constable. The eldest son of Frances and Henry Fairfax was Henry who married Ann, daughter of Sir Thomas Browne, Kt. of Norwich, by whom he had William (d. 1684; see No. 71 above), Ann Alethea, Frances (d. 1678; see No. 72 above) and Frances (d. 1719) who married in 1696 David, 9th Earl of Buchan (d. 1745) as his first wife. He was the second son of Thomas Palmer (1678–1762) and married firstly in 1745 Ann le Grys (d. 1752) of Great Yarmouth, Co. Norfolk, by whom he had several children all of whom died in infancy. He married secondly in 1755 Charlotte Wakelin (d. 1768) of London by whom he left a son Richard (1765–1806; see Sonning Nos. 32–36 on p. 76 Vol. xl (1936)) and four daughters. Robert Palmer was an attorney-at-law and lived in Great Russell Street, Bloomsbury, and was for many years agent to the Duke of Bedford. About the middle of the 18th century he bought Hurst Lodge and the rectory of Hurst, the latter remaining in the family until 1874 when Miss Susanna Caroline Palmer (d. 1880; see Sonning No. 36) gave the great tithes for the endowment of Hurst church. 

He was the fourth son of Thomas Boone Roupell (d. 1889) of Loddon Court in Swallowfield, Co. Berks., by his wife Arabella Elizabeth, fourth daughter of the Rev. John Dryden Pigott of Edgmond. He was of Charlton, Co. Kent, late Captain, 15th Yorkshire Rgt., and served in the Army 1869–80; in 1886 he married Ellen Priscilla, daughter of Colonel William Cross of Redscar, Co. Lancs., by whom he had a son Thomas George Pigott, born in 1890. [Land. Gent. (1937), 1957; Arm. Fam. (1930), 1687].

In about 1786 he bought the manor of Shinfield from the Earl of Fingal. According to records in the India Office (quoted in Berks. Arch. Jour., xxxvii (1933), 144) he sailed to India in the ship "Success" in 1783-4 as a free merchant; he married a Slade and was sheriff of Berkshire in 1790 and died suddenly as a result of a fall from his horse. The manor passed to his great-nephew, Alexander Cobham Martyr who took the name of Cobham and had a grant of arms in 1813 of "Gules on a cheveron engrailed between three cinquefoils gold three lions sable." A M.I. below the monument states that his wife was Elizabeth, eldest daughter of the Rev. J. S. Breedon, D.D. of Bere Court (in Pangbourne, Co. Berks.). She died in 1827, aged 39. Charles Maitland Hulme, their son, died in 1836, aged 11, and their daughter Marianne died in 1841, aged 15. George and Elizabeth Hulme died in infancy and were buried at Pangbourne. Henry and Catherine are also mentioned in the inscription. The Rev. George Hulme built the church of Holy Trinity as a proprietary chapel in Reading in 1827. He may have been the fifth son of William, eldest son of Thomas Martin of Wokingham and he may have married as his first wife Katherine, daughter of John Cheyney of Chesham Bois, Co. Bucks. The inscription states that he was a royal supervisor and that by Mary his wife he had an only daughter and heir Anne who married William Wollascott. According to the pedigree in Ashmole MSS. 852, 156-7, his wife Mary was the daughter of Thomas Reade of Barton near Abingdon by his wife Anne, daughter of Thomas Hoo of Hoo, Co. Hertford. Edward Martin probably built the south chapel and appears to have settled the manor of Shinfield on himself and his (? first) wife Katherine in 1561 which manor his son-in-law William Wollascott eventually held with that of Brimpton, Co. Lady Russell in "Swallowfield and its Owners," p. 237, note 2, states:—"John Walter of Farley Hill . . . was one of the same family as John Walter Esquire, M.P., of Barbados and Busbridge Hill, and was descended from Sir William Walter, Bart., of Sarsden, Oxfordshire, who was an intimate friend of Henry Lord Clarendon. John Walter of Farley Hill married Newton, only daughter of Alexander Walker, of Swallowfield and Barbados, Sheriff of Berks. in 1751. . . . Her father was probably descended from Sir Walter Walker of Bushey Hall, Herts., Advocate to Charles II's Queen, who was also a great friend of Lord Clarendon. William Walker, the second son of Sir Walter, married Mary, daughter of Powell Pryce of Newton, Co. Montgomery, and Earley Court, Reading.

Hence, no doubt, the reason of the name 'Newton' having been given to Miss Walker." It is to be noted that the family of Walker of Bushey, Co. Hertford, bore, according to Burke's 'General Armory' Erminois on a pile battled azure a mural between two galtraps in pale gold while Walker of Barbados bore Vert a canton silver charged with an eve. It is not clear why the coat of Neville (No. 5) is quartered by Walter. The arms of Walter of Sarsden on a tomb in Wolvercot church, Oxon, are Azure a daunce gold between three eagles silver. Further, it appears, from a deed of bargain and sale dated December 16 1773 (in the possession of the Hon. Editor of this Journal) that Powell Pryce was of Newtown and not of "Newton" as Lady Russell stated.

He was the son of Nicholas Backhouse (d. 1650, merchant and sheriff of London and of Widford, Co. Hertford, by Christian, daughter of William Williams of London. In 1662 he married Flower (1641-1700), sole daughter and heir of his first cousin William Backshouse (d. 1662) by Anne (d. 1663; No. 17), daughter of Brian Richards. Flower had married as her first husband William Bishop (d. 1661) of South Warnborough, Co. Hants., by whom she had William (born in 1659; d. young; No. 18) and a daughter Anne (1657-1660); she married thirdly in 1670 Henry Hyde, Viscount Cornbury who, as eldest son of Edward Hyde, Earl of Clarendon, succeeded to the earldom in 1647. As Lady Clarendon, Flower was governess to the Princess Anne and was described by the Duchess of Marlborough as "one who looked like a madman and talked like a scholar." Sir William held the manor of Swallowfield in the right of his wife and was created a baronet in 1660 and in 1664 he was sheriff of Berkshire. He owned three adventurers' shares in the New River Company and Lady Flower held eleven such shares; in 1889 one adventurer's share was sold by auction for £122,800. The monument was erected by his widow and also commemorates:—1. Her grandfather Samuel (d. 1626), 2. Her grandmother, Elizabeth (d. 1630; No. 11), daughter of John Borlase of Marlow, Co. Bucks., 3. Her aunt, Ann (No. 12) who married Thomas Chester of Almondsbury, Co. Glouc., 4. 

In 1615 he married at St. Alban's church, Wood Street, Flower (d.s.p. 1652; No. 30), daughter of Benjamin Henshaw of London and merchant tailor and silkman to James I; he was a royalist and suffered imprisonment and sequestration; at the coronation of Charles I he had been made a Knight of the Bath, having been member for Great Marlow in the first parliament of that reign; he sat again in 1626 and 1628. He was succeeded at Swallowfield by his brother William (d. 1662), the Roscicrucian and friend of Ashmole; extracts of his will are given in 'Swallowfield and its owners,' pp. 118–120. Sir Henry Russell (1783-1852), 2nd Bt., was the eldest son and heir of Sir Henry Russell (d. 1836; see No. 46 below), by his second wife Anne Barbara (d. 1814; see No. 47 below), fifth daughter of Sir Charles Whitworth. He married firstly in 1808 Jane Amelia (d. 1808), second daughter of John Casamajor Esquire, a member of the Council of Madras, and secondly in 1816 Marie Clotilde (d. 1872), daughter of Baron Benoît Mottet de la Fontaine, the last French Governor of Pondicherry, by whom he had issue Henry (d. 1847; see No. 23 above), Charles, 3rd Bt. (d. unm. 1883; see No. 42), George, 4th Bt. (1828-1898) and three daughters. He succeeded at Swallowfield on the death of his father in 1836 at the age of fifty-three; at the age of eighteen he was appointed assistant secretary to the Resident at Hyderabad and in 1810 he became Resident at the salary of £20,000 per annum, which post he held until 1820 when he retired to England, spending most of his time at Swallowfield. He is said "to have greatly resembled William Pitt in his features." See pedigree on p. 111. [Burke, Peer.; Russell, Swallowfield and its owners (1911), 262-272]. Sir Charles Russell, V.C. was the second son and heir of Sir Henry Russell (d. 1852; see No. 35 above) and succeeded as 3rd Bt. He was a captain in the Grenadier Guards and took part in the siege of Sebastopol and in the battles of Alma, Balaclava and Inkerman and in 1857 on his return he was awarded the Victoria Cross. He was M.P. for Berkshire, 1865-68 and for Westminster, 1874-83. He died unmarried and was succedeed by his brother George (1828-1898) as 4th Bt. See pedigree on p. 111. 

In 1776 he married Ann (d. 1780), daughter and coheir of John Skinner, Esquire of Lydd, Kent. He married secondly in 1782 Anne Barbara (d. 1814; see No. 47), fifth daughter of Sir Charles Whitworth and sister of Charles, Earl Whitworth, by whom he had six sons and five daughters. In 1797 he was appointed to the Bench in India and in 1806 he became Chief Justice in Bengal retiring in 1813, having been created a baronet in 1812. He bought Swallowfield manor in 1820 and made considerable alterations to the house. He died at his London house, 62, Wimpole Street. See pedigree below. He was the son of Roger Lytcott Esquire of Ruscombe and Twyford, Co. Berks., Marshall of the Hall to King Henry VII, by his wife Julian, daughter of John Barker Esquire of Sonning, Co. Berks. He married Katherine, daughter of Sir Robert Cheyne (Cheney) Kt., of Chesham Bois, Co. Bucks., by whom he had three sons, John, Leonard and Christopher (d.s.p. 1599; see West Hanney Nos. 1 and 2, Vol. xxxvi (1932), p. 141) and a daughter Dorothy. He was a gentleman pensioner of King Henry VIII and train-bearer to Queen Anne Bullen and had a grant of Whem and train-bearer to Queen Anne Bullen and had a grant of the manor of Swallowfield in 1553, having held the lease since 1542 of the house, of Swallowfield Park and the fulling-mill. He may have been the son of Edward Dalby Esquire of Inner Temple, by his wife Frances, second daughter of Charles Holloway of Oxon. By his second wife Johanna he had a son John Dalby of Hurst.
