He was educated at Eton and entered the Middle Temple in 1698, barrister-at-law, 1706, Bencher, 1733, and Lent Reader in 1736. For some years previous to 1732 he was Steward to the Dean and Chapter of St. Pauls and from that date Second Justice of Brecknock until his death.

The name of Henry Proctor, Esquire of Clewer, is found in the list of those summoned to appear at the Visitation in 1665-6; he made no appearance. A family of this name held the manor of Mores in Bray from 1738 to 1855. [V.C.H. Berks, iii, 105; Harl. Soc. lvii, 45; Burke, Gen. Arm.; Williams, W. R., Hist. of Great Sessions in Wales (1899), 147].

The manor of Clewer Brocas was held by the Brocas family from about the middle of the 14th century until 1499. Sir Bernard Brocas (d. 1395) obtained a licence to found and endow a chantry of Our Lady in this church in 1384; he married Mary the daughter and heir of John des Roches and jure uxoris held the mastership of the Royal Buckhounds which office remained in the family for 300 years; he represented Hampshire in the parliaments of Richard II. He was succeeded by his son Bernard who was beheaded for his opposition to Henry IV in 1400. The family also held lands in Wokefield from 1340 until the latter half of the 15th century, and in Windsor, Eton, Cookham and Bray, the chief house being Beaurepaire, near Basingstoke. [V.C.H. Berks. ii, 285; iii, 73 76, 424; Burke, Gen. Arm.].

He married secondly Mary (d.s.p. 1688), daughter of Richard Lybb of Hardwick, Oxon. He received a grant of arms on October 10, 1662. His eldest son Sir William (d. 1716) married firstly, Elizabeth (d. 1704 and here buried), daughter of Sir Charles Cottrell, Master of the Ceremonies to Charles II and secondly Judith Alexander, youngest daughter of Henry, Earl of Sterline (d. 1691; see pedigree on p. 45, Vol. 41 (1937)) by whom he had a daughter Judith (d. inf. 1707 and here buried) and an only son William (1708–1760). Sir William (d. 1716) was Verderer of Easthampstead forest, Fellow of All Souls College, Oxford, 1657, D.C.L. 1667, Chancellor of Rochester Diocese and Clerk of the Signet, Judge Advocate at Tangier, 1683, Clerk of Delivery of the Ordnance stores, Envoy to France, 1685, Ambassador to Turkey 1686–91, lord of the Treasury 1694–5, Principal Secretary of State, 1695, Governor of Hudson's Bay and Turkey Companies and M.P. for Oxford University 1695–8. See pedigree on p. 00. [M.l.; D.N.B.; V.C.H. Berks. iii, 79; Harl. Soc. lvi, 296: lvii, 220–221].



(4) Samuel Michell Esquire, late servant of King James, one of his Majesty's Marshalls of the Hall, who married Anne, only daughter of Isaac Rudstone Esquire, by whom he had two sons John and Humphrey; d. 1613. (5) John Michell (d. 1661, aged 49) and Anne, his mother who afterwards married William Duke of Richmond and d. 1669, aged 80. (6) Benet, daughter and coheir of Matthew Read of Folkestone and wife of John Michel; d. 1683, aged 63. (7) Humphrey Michell, d. 1696, aged 84. See pedigree on p. oo. During the Commonwealth John (d. 1661), an Upper Commoner of The Queen's College, Oxford, and Humphrey (d. 1696) an Upper Commoner of Balliol,

were at the former College. John held a commission in 1644 in the regiment raised from members of the University. Humphrey founded at Richmond an Alms house for ten old men and left his property to his nephew John (d. 1739), son of his brother John (d. 1661). John Michel (d. 1739), in gratitude for his uncle's and his father's relations with the Queen's College, "left to it by his will four estates, three in Kent, at Plumstead, Sandwich, and Horton Kirby, and one at Old Windsor, in Berkshire. The rents and profits of the estates bequeathed by John Michel were to be applied to the support of eight Master Fellows and four Bachelor Scholars to be elected by the provost and Fellows of Queen's out of any other Colleges or Halls within the University. . . . The Old Windsor estate was further charged with 'the Necessary Care and and Expence of cleaning, preserving and repairing my Family Monument forever." The brasses and monuments in the church were restored by the College in 1878 and again in 1933. In the College library is "The Descent of John Michel, of Old Windsor in the County of Berks, and of Richmond in the County of Surry Esquire from the Antient Families of Read, Rudstone and Wotton" signed by John Anstis, Garter, on 15 September 1722; it contains illuminated coats throughout the pedigree and an achievement below, in colour, of Michel quartering Waller, Landerdale, Rudston, Barwick, Hayton, Molineux, Kighley, Wilde, Wilde, Read and Mennis. Humphrey Michell (d. 1598) received an exemplification of arms and the grant of a crest from William Flower, Norroy, dated 7 April 1581. Humphrey (d. 1696), his grandson, was summoned to appear at the Visitation of 1665-6. [Ashmole MSS. 850, 312; Magrath, J.R., The Queen's College (1921), ii, 104-108; Michel Pedigree in the Queen's College Library; V.C.H. Berks. iii, 84; Harl. Soc. lvii, 45, 179].



Good Hope. He was born in Calcutta, and was educated at Eton; he went to India in 1800 and by 1834 had become Governor General of India (provisionally) which post he held until 1836 when he became Lieutenant Governor of the North West Provinces; he was a P.C. in 1839. He was Governor of Jamaica 1839-42 and Governor General of Canada, 1843-45. In 1845 he was created Baron Metcalfe of Fern Hill and died unmarried at Malshanger in Hampshire, when the peerage became extinct. He was an "excellent public servant, a firm and sagacious administrator of perfect integrity . . . In appearance he was short and thickset, and used laughingly to explain his celebate state by his want of good looks." [G.E.C., Compl. Peer. viii (1932), 679-680; D.N.B.; Burke, Gen. Arm.].

He was the seventh son of William, 4th Earl of Albemarle (d. 1849) by his first wife the Hon. Elizabeth Southwell (d. 1817), daughter of Edward, Lord de Clifford. He served in the Crimea and commanded at the destruction of the Chinese fleet in 1857; he was groom-in-waiting to Queen Victoria, 1858-60, admiral 1877 and was an intimate friend of King Edward VII. He published "A Sailor's Life under Four Sovereigns" in 1899. He married firstly in 1839, Katherine Louisa (d.s.p. 1859), daughter of General Sir John Crosbie; he married secondly in 1861 Jane Elizabeth (d. 1895), daughter of Martin J. West, by whom he had issue Colin Richard (born 1862, Admiral, G.C.V.O., serjeant-at-arms, 1915) and one daughter. [Burke, Peer.; D.N.B.].
