THE ROMANO-BRITISH POTTERY

R.S.Leary

1. Factual Data

The pottery was examined and catalogued according to the Guidelines of the Study Group for Romano-British Pottery for basic archiving (Darling 2004).

One sherd pottery (10g.) was recovered from pit 109. This is a brown shell-tempered ware with grey core and orange brown internal surfaces. The sherd feels hard and soapy. The shell inclusions are moderate, ill-sorted platey inclusions, fine to coarse. The sherd comes from a large closed vessel, a jar, with multiple cordons on the shoulder. It compares with vessels belonging to the late Iron Age such as those from Dragonby (May 1996, type 3 or perhaps type 15).
