

Appendix 1: Photographs



Plate 1: Looking North. Showing slots through apsidal building ((109), (114) & (225)) and east-west aligned larger wall ((145) in the foreground). Cist burial [131] is shown in the top right.



Plate 2: Looking North. Showing apsidal building ((109), (225) (114) & (166)). Wall (145) has been removed and wall (166) is visible underneath (bottom left). The postholes ([255], [257], [259] & [261]) and the large trench cut of wall (113) are visible in the west of the photo.



Plate 3: Looking East along wall (145). Showing the method of construction (mortar bonding) and the size and quality of the building material. Wall/buttress (270) is visible to the north as is a second possible buttress to the south. Disturbed grave? [274] is located in the top left.



Plate 4: Looking Southeast along Trench 1. Close up of walls (109) & (225) showing the construction method and quality of building material. Substantial cist burials [174] & [131] are seen in the top left.



Plate 5: Looking West in Trench 2. Slot through wall (145) has been removed to reveal backfilled earlier cist burial incorporated into foundations [171].



Plate 6: Looking Southwest over eastern limit of excavation area. Working shot showing two horizontal rows of simple earthen graves from the latest phase of burial. Note a row of graves above these have already been lifted.



Plate 7: Looking South over Cist burial (131). The walled construction of the cist is clearly visible and very different from the other cist burials (**Plates 10&11**). Note the head niche is still incorporated into the design.



Plate 8: Looking West over Sk 36 (Phase 3). This is an example of an anthropomorphic grave, Note the head niche cut onto the earth.



Plate 9: Looking West over Sk 32 & the disturbed skull of Sk 31 (Phase 6). This is an example of a coffin burial.



Plate 10: Looking West over Sk45 (Phase 2). One of the first cist burials on site. Note the substantial stones used for its construction.



Plate 11: Looking West over Sk6 (Phase 6). One of the latest cist burials on site, note the less substantial stones.



Plate 12: Looking East over wall (145) and ditch [154]. Apical wall (109) can be seen in the section below the larger surface stones of (145). Areas of robbing [234] can be seen in the bottom left.



Plate 13: Looking North over the central area of the site. Early modern building slots and pits of Phase 8 are clearly visible.



Plate 14: Eastern portion of North Facing section. The orangey-brown soil accumulation of Phase 5 is clearly visible at the base of the section, cutting this is an early modern building rubble filled pit [200] from Phase 8. These are all then sealed by the topsoil and other modern overburden of Phase 8 (181) (204) & (208).
