An archaeological watching brief was undertaken by Cotswold Archaeology during groundworks associated with the excavation of trenches for the construction of column bases within the existing building and the excavation of foundation trenches at the Hotel de la Bere, Southam, Gloucestershire.

The earliest deposits encountered comprised post-medieval/modern make-up/levelling layers. A number of structures, comprising wall foundations and culverts/drains, were also identified in these trenches and appeared to cut through, or were built upon these deposits. In all likelihood these structures relate to either the 19th-century expansion or 20th-century modernisation of the Hotel de al Bere building.

No other features or deposits of archaeological interest were observed during groundworks, and no artefactual material pre-dating the modern period was recovered.

1. INTRODUCTION

- 1.1 In January 2011 Cotswold Archaeology (CA) carried out an archaeological watching brief for Shetland Hotels Ltd at Hotel De La Bere (centred on NGR: SO 9723 2535; Fig. 1). The watching brief was undertaken to fulfil a condition attached to a planning consent granted by Tewkesbury Borough Council (TBC) for the removal of squash courts, swimming pool complex and ancillary modern buildings/extensions and restoration of existing buildings with new build health spa centre and quest accommodation (TBC ref: 08/01590/FUL). The objective of the watching brief was to record all archaeological remains exposed during the development.
- 1.2 The evaluation was carried out in accordance with a *Brief for a Programme of Archaeological Recording* (GCC 2009) prepared by Charles Parry, Senior Archaeological Officer, Gloucestershire County Council (GCC) and with a subsequent detailed Written Scheme of Investigation (WSI) produced by CA (2009) and approved by Mr Parry. The fieldwork also followed the *Standard and Guidance for an archaeological watching brief* (IfA 2008), the *Statement of Standards and Practices Appropriate for Archaeological Fieldwork in Gloucestershire* (GCC 1995), the *Management of Archaeological Projects 2* (English Heritage 1991) and the *Management of Research Projects in the Historic Environment (MORPHE): Project Manager's Guide* (English Heritage 2006).

The site

- 1.3 The site is approximately 3.25ha in area and comprises the existing buildings and grounds of the Hotel de la Bere. The site is bounded to the north, south and west by farmland and to the east by the B4632.
- 1.4 The underlying solid geology of the area is mapped as Charmouth Mudstone formation (BGS 2011). The natural substrate was encountered in all groundworks excavations and comprised compact yellow grey clay with occasional gravel patches.

Archaeological background

1.5 The Hotel de la Bere is one of the largest Tudor houses in Gloucestershire, and is Grade II* listed. Construction of this building began around 1500, for Thomas Goodman. The estate was sold to Sir John Huddleston soon afterwards; the house was completed by his son, also Sir John, in the mid sixteenth century. It was bought by Lord Ellenborough, Governor General of India in 1831; the construction of his additions to the house lasted until 1844 or soon thereafter. The building became a hotel in 1973. It is suspected that the original Tudor house would have had a number of associated ancillary structures. Therefore, groundworks required for the development may have revealed significant archaeological deposits and/or finds relating to medieval settlement and activity on the site.

Methodology

- 1.6 The fieldwork followed the methodology set out within the WSI (CA 2009). An archaeologist was present during intrusive groundworks comprising the excavation of eight pits (T1-8) for the construction of column bases within the existing building and the excavation of foundation trenches (Areas A and B; Fig. 2).
- 1.7 Where archaeological deposits were encountered written, graphic and photographic records were compiled in accordance with CA Technical Manual 1: *Fieldwork Recording Manual* (2007).
- 1.8 The archive and artefacts from the evaluation are currently held by CA at their offices in Kemble. The site archive will be deposited with Cheltenham Art Gallery and Museum under accession number CAGM 2011.19. A summary of information from this project, set out within Appendix B, will be entered onto the OASIS online database of archaeological projects in Britain.

2. RESULTS

- 2.1 The natural geological substrate consisting of compact yellow grey clay, was revealed at between 0.2m and 1.1m below present ground level. In areas A and B this was sealed by topsoil measuring *c*. 0.25m in thickness. The earliest archaeological deposits encountered in trenches 1-8 comprised post-medieval/modern make-up/levelling layers that sealed the natural substrate. A number of structures, comprising wall foundations and culverts/drains, were also identified in these trenches and these appeared to cut through, or were built upon these deposits (Fig. 3). In all likelihood these structures relate to the 19th or 20th-century expansion/modernisation of the Hotel de al Bere building.
- 2.2 No other features or deposits of archaeological interest were observed during groundworks and, despite visual scanning of spoil, no artefactual material pre-dating the modern period was recovered.

3. DISCUSSION

3.1 Despite the archaeological potential of the application area (see archaeological background above), the watching brief identified no archaeological remains predating the post-medieval/modern period within the area of observed groundworks. The absence of archaeological deposits may indicate that potential structural remains associated with the original Tudor house and its associated ancillary structures either do not extend as far as or were not exposed by the development, or that they may have been removed during previous development associated with the expansion or modernisation of the building during its use as either a private residence or hotel.
