An archaeological watching brief was undertaken by Cotswold Archaeology during groundworks associated with the erection of buildings to provide a Religious Meeting Hall and associated car parking and landscaping at Ernesettle Lane, Plymouth.

An undated, east/west orientated ditch was observed within the development area.

1. INTRODUCTION

- 1.1 In September 2011 Cotswold Archaeology (CA) carried out an archaeological watching brief for the Plymouth St Budeaux Kingdom Hall Project at the Religious Meeting Hall, Ernesettle Lane, Plymouth, Devon (centred on NGR: SX 4518 5926; Fig. 1). The watching brief was undertaken to fulfil a condition (no. 11) attached to planning consent granted by Plymouth City Council (PCC) for the erection of a Religious Meeting Hall building and associated car parking and landscaping (Planning ref: 09/00669/OUT). The objective of the watching brief was to record all archaeological remains exposed during the development.
- 1.2 The watching brief was carried out in accordance with a detailed *Written Scheme of Investigation* (WSI) produced by CA (2011) and approved by Mr Mike Daniells, Historic Environment Officer, Plymouth City Council (PCC). The fieldwork also followed the *Standard and guidance for an archaeological watching brief* (IfA 2008), the *Management of Archaeological Projects 2* (English Heritage 1991) and the *Management of Research Projects in the Historic Environment (MORPHE): Project Manager's Guide* (EH 2006).

The site

- 1.3 The development enclosed an area of approximately 1.3ha, and comprised a former playing field, now overgrown. It is bounded to the north by a hedge beyond which the land slopes down sharply towards the Rivers Tamar and Tavy. To the south it is bounded by former allotment gardens, now overgrown, and to the east by a further field. The western boundary of the site comprises Ernesettle Lane which runs in a north-westerly direction to Lower Ernesettle. The south-eastern corner of the site is bounded by a fence which separates it from an embankment.
- 1.4 The underlying solid geology of the area is mapped as Balsaltic Lava of Saltash formation (BGS 2011).

Archaeological background

1.5 The embankment located immediately to the south-east of the development area is associated with a former 19th-century military road linking Ernesettle Battery (to the

west) to Agaton Fort (to the east). This forms Scheduled Ancient Monument PY840B (CA 2006).

Methodology

- 1.6 The fieldwork followed the methodology set out within the WSI (CA 2011). An archaeologist was present during intrusive groundworks including the stripping of topsoil and subsoil across the southern part of the site prior to construction (Fig. 2).
- 1.7 Where archaeological deposits were encountered written, graphic and photographic records were compiled in accordance with CA Technical Manual 1: *Fieldwork Recording Manual* (2007).
- 1.8 The archive and artefacts from the evaluation are currently held by CA at their offices in Kemble. Subject to the agreement of the legal landowner will be deposited with Plymouth Museum and art Gallery, along with the site archive. A summary of information from this project, set out within Appendix C, will be entered onto the OASIS online database of archaeological projects in Britain.

2. RESULTS (FIGS 2-3)

2.1 The natural geological substrate, 102, comprising mid yellow brown mudstone bedrock was observed across the southern third of the development area at an average depth of 0.64m below present ground level (bpgl). A narrow, east/west orientated ditch, 103/105/107/109, was cut into the natural substrate. It was filled by reddish brown clay silt 104/106/108/110. A single sherd of highly abraded pottery dating to the medieval period was recovered from deposit 106. The ditch was sealed by subsoil 101, which was in turn covered by a layer of topsoil, 100.

The Finds

2.2 Artefactual material is limited to a single small and abraded sherd of pottery (weighing 1g), recovered from ditch fill 106 (fill of feature 105). The sherd, which is unfeatured, occurs in an grey/brown firing unglazed coarseware fabric with common quartz, igneous-rock and black mica inclusions. A broad medieval date (probably 11th to 14th centuries) is suggested.

3. DISCUSSION

3.1 A ditch running across the southern part of the site was identified but could not be securely dated. It is likely the medieval pottery recovered from it is residual, as suggested by the significant abrasion it has undergone. It should be noted that this ditch is orientated parallel to a field boundary that was first depicted on the 1840 St Budeaux Tithe Map (CA 2006, Fig. 5).
