#### **Description of works:**

#### Introduction

An archaeological watching brief was undertaken, as per an agreed WSI (CA 2016), by Cotswold Archaeology during groundworks associated with the development of the Turks Head Road Junction and the paths and verges surrounding it (Fig. 1) on behalf of Jacobs UK Ltd at the request of Stephen Reed, Senior Historic Environment Office, Devon County Council Historic Environment Team (DCCHET).

#### Archaeological background

The archaeological background, compiled from a consultation of the Devon and Dartmoor HER using the Heritage Gateway, was outlined in the WSI and the salient points are outlined below:

### Prehistoric

Remains of a Prehistoric field system (MDV 44031) have been noted in the area surrounding the site and a number of flint scatters (MDV 61150 etc.) were retrieved during works associated with improvements to the A30, *c*. 600m to the west.

#### Roman

A Roman road (MDV 1875), Honiton to Exeter is believed to follow the historic line of the A30 quite closely and may pass near to, or through, the site.

#### Medieval to modern

The St Margaret's Leper Hospital (MDV 107147) and chapel (MVD 1117009) are located c. 100m east of the site. The hospital was rebuilt as almshouses in 1530. The current Grade II listed almshouses date from 1800 when the earlier structure was rebuilt. There are a number of other Grade II listed buildings in the area. Immediately to the south of the lies the site of a World War Military Camp (MVD 83002), which now lies under an industrial estate.

#### Results

The watching brief was carried out, observing the excavation of a single trench on the Turks Head junction; the results are outlined below (Fig. 2):

A broadly similar stratigraphic sequence was identified throughout the trench: natural substrate overlain by subsoil,

topsoil and modern road and pavement material (Fig. 3). The subsoil was disturbed by modern service trenching.
A single feature 104 was identified, a ditch running west-south-west to east-north-east in the south-western corner
of the excavated area. It was 0.25m wide and 0.13m deep. A length of 2.4m was observed between the limit of
excavation and a modern service trench which truncated the feature. Its fill, 105, contained three sherds of pottery
dated to the late eighteenth and nineteenth centuries.
No features of archaeological significance were identified during the archaeological evaluation.


