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#### SUMMARY

An archaeological watching brief was undertaken by Cotswold Archaeology in October 2013 and in July 2016 during groundworks associated with a proposed mixed-use development at 2, 2A, 2B Mill House and 2-8 Church Road, Bishop's Cleeve Gloucestershire.

A single pit containing three sherds of medieval pottery was identified during the groundworks. No further archaeological features were observed, and evidence of modern truncation and/or dumping immediately sealing the natural substrate was revealed throughout the site.

#### 1. INTRODUCTION

- 1.1 In October 2013 and July 2016 Cotswold Archaeology (CA) carried out an archaeological watching brief for Blackwater Securities Ltd at 2, 2A, 2B Mill House and 2-8 Church Road, Bishop's Cleeve, Gloucestershire (centred on NGR: SP 0190 2815; Fig. 1). The watching brief was undertaken to fulfil a condition attached to planning consent granted by Tewkesbury Borough Council (TBC) for a proposed mixed-use development including extensions and alterations to an existing building and the erection of two retail units and six flats (planning ref: TBC/12/00704/FUL; condition 10).
- 1.2 The watching brief was carried out in accordance with a Written Scheme of Investigation (WSI) produced by CA (2013) that was approved by TBC acting on the advice of Charles Parry, Archaeologist, Gloucestershire County Council, the archaeological advisor to TBC. The fieldwork also followed Standard and guidance: Archaeological watching brief (ClfA 2014). It was monitored by Charles Parry.

#### The site

1.3 The site lies within the historic core of the village immediately to the south of Church Road. It formerly comprised car parking and open ground bounded to the north by shops fronting Church Road, and to the south and west by Tesco's car park and access road. To the east lies a small area of public open space. The underlying geology of the area comprises Charmouth Mudstone Formation overlain by superficial deposits of Cheltenham Sand and Gravel (BGS 2016). The geological substrate identified during the watching brief comprised yellow-orange silty sands.

#### 2. ARCHAEOLOGICAL BACKGROUND

2.1 Numerous archaeological investigations have been made and reported on at Bishop's Cleeve over the last decade, with evidence for Iron Age, Romano-British, Late Saxon and medieval activity having been recorded (Cullen and Hancocks 2007). The current site lies to the south of Gilder's Paddock and 21 Church Road, where evidence for Iron Age, Romano-British and medieval occupation was identified in 1989/90 (Parry 1999) and 2004 (Cullen and Hancocks 2007). Further evidence of occupation is attested immediately to the south of the current site, now

the site of Tesco (Lovell *et al.* 2007), and to the west at Home Farm (Barber and Walker 1998) and Stoke Road (Enright and Watts 2002).

#### 3. AIMS AND OBJECTIVES

- 3.1 The objectives of the archaeological works were:
  - to monitor groundworks, and to identify, investigate and record all significant buried archaeological deposits revealed on the site during the course of the development groundworks;
  - at the conclusion of the project, to produce an integrated archive for the project work and a report setting out the results of the project and the archaeological conclusions that can be drawn from the recorded data.

#### 4. METHODOLOGY

- 4.1 The fieldwork followed the methodology set out within the WSI (CA 2016) An archaeologist was present during intrusive groundworks, predominately foundation trenches, for the three areas of new build (Fig. 2; Areas 1, 2, 3).
- 4.2 Where archaeological deposits were encountered written, graphic and photographic records were compiled in accordance with CA Technical Manual 1: *Fieldwork Recording Manual*.
- 4.3 The archive and artefacts from the watching brief are currently held by CA at their offices in Kemble. Subject to the agreement of the legal landowner the artefacts will be deposited with The Wilson Cheltenham Art Gallery and Museum along with the site archive. A summary of information from this project, set out within Appendix C, will be entered onto the OASIS online database of archaeological projects in Britain.

#### 5. RESULTS (FIGS 2-3)

5.1 The natural geological substrate, comprising yellow-orange silty sands, was revealed within Areas 1 and 2 at a typical depth of 0.6m below present ground level (bpgl). Within Area 3, the natural sands were identified solely in the south-eastern corner of the new build at a depth of 0.95m bpgl, the remainder of the groundworks

in this area being founded above the natural substrate. In all instances the natural sands were immediately sealed by modern made-ground deposits containing plastics and building waste.

5.2 Within Area 2 the natural sands were cut by pit 1703. The full extent of the pit was not revealed, but extended outwith the area of current groundworks. The pit, presumed to be circular in plan, measured approximately 1.6m in diameter and 0.6m in depth. It had moderate sides, concave base and contained two silt fills, 1704 and 1705. Three sherds of 11th to 13th-century pottery were recovered from lower fill 1704.

#### 6. THE FINDS

6.1 Artefactual material recovered during the watching brief is listed in Appendix B and discussed further below. Gloucester type series codes have been applied to the pottery (Vince 1983).

#### **Pottery**

6.2 A total of three sherds (21g) of pottery were recorded from fill 1704 within pit 1705 (Appendix B). The unfeatured bodysherds occur in an oolitic limestone-tempered fabric (TF41B) and dated from the 11th to 13th/earlier 14th century (Dalwood and Edwards 2004).

#### Other finds

6.3 A single formless fragment fired clay, for which original function is uncertain, was also recorded from fill 1704.

#### 7. DISCUSSION

7.1 The presence of made ground deposits containing plastics, bricks and modern glass immediately sealing the natural substrate, suggests the site has previously been truncated, most probably during construction of the retail units fronting Church Road immediately to the north. However, the survival of pit 1703 does suggest that the modern truncation was not of sufficient depth to remove all, presumably locally deep, archaeological features.

7.2 The pottery recovered from pit 1703 is dated to the 11th to 13th century. Broadly contemporary activity, comprising a series of pits and a later cultivation layer, was previously identified immediately to the north of the current site during archaeological excavations at 21 Church Street (Cullen and Hancocks 2007) and also at Stoke Road (Enright and Watts 2002). In both instances the pits were interpreted as being typical of domestic waste disposal to the rear of medieval property plots. A similar interpretation is offered for the current pit, particularly given its location 25m south of Church Road and therefore beyond any contemporary buildings that would have fronted the southern extent of Church Road in the medieval period.






