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## **SUMMARY**

An archaeological watching brief was undertaken by Cotswold Archaeology during groundwork associated with demolition of the current clubhouse and replacement with a new structure at Newbury Canoe Club, Newbury, West Berkshire.

No features or deposits of archaeological interest were observed during groundwork, and no artefacts pre-dating the modern period were recovered due to the limited nature of the observed excavations.

### 1. INTRODUCTION

- 1.1 In February 2017 and January 2018 Cotswold Archaeology (CA) carried out an archaeological watching brief for Newbury Canoe club which is located alongside the Kennet and Avon Canal and A339 in the centre of Newbury, West Berkshire (centred at NGR: SU 47416 67159 Fig. 1). The watching brief was undertaken to fulfil a condition attached to a planning consent for the demolition the current clubhouse and replace it with a new structure (West Berkshire Council ref 14/00657/FUL).
- 1.2 The watching brief was carried out in accordance with a detailed Written Scheme of Investigation (WSI) produced by CA (2016) and approved the archaeological advisors to the West Berkshire Council (WBC). The fieldwork also followed Standard and guidance: Archaeological watching brief (CIfA 2014).

#### The site

- 1.3 The site is bounded to the north by the River Kennet, and to the west is the A339. The southern boundary is formed by the Newbury Police Station. The west edge is bounded by manicured green land with mature Trees (Figure 2). The site lies at approximately 75.6m above Ordnance Datum (aOD), with a drop in height of approximately 0.3m from north to south.
- 1.4 The site is 0.03 hectares in size. The previous building was used by the canoe club for the storage of the canoes.
- 1.5 The underlying bedrock geology of the area is mapped as Seaford Chalk Formation Chalk. Sedimentary Bedrock formed approximately 84 to 89 million years ago in the Cretaceous Period. The superficial deposit is recorded as Peat. Superficial Deposits formed up to 3 million years ago in the Quaternary Period (BGS 2017). During the current groundworks only made ground was encountered down to a depth of 0.7 (see section 5.1).

## 2. ARCHAEOLOGICAL BACKGROUND

- 2.1 The site consisted of the Newbury Canoe Club Clubhouse, which comprised corrugated iron, timber framed structure, standing on the edge of the Kennet and Savon Canal close to Newbury Wharf in the town centre.
- 2.2 The West Berkshire Council Archaeologist has advised that the site is of archaeological and historic interest. In archaeological terms the site was considered to have a 'high potential for below ground archaeology associated with the Kennet Valley and internationally important Mesolithic sites, several of which have been found close by in Victoria Park and along the dual carriageway. Medieval and Post-Medieval deposits associated with the river usage were also considered likely. 'The proposed works involve the demolition of a stone wall that is likely to be part of an 18th or 19th century canal development and commercial activities of the wharf.' (Alex Godden, per comms)
- 2.3 It was suggested that 'The building......scheduled for demolition could possibly be a surviving 'Tin Tabernacle' Victorian church, although this has only been surmised from external appearances. The building was used by the local artist Victor Corden and such has a strong local connection.' (Alex Godden, *per comms*)
- 2.4 The current structure was demolished and a new clubhouse erected on the same site.

### 3. AIMS AND OBJECTIVES

- 3.1 The objectives of the archaeological works were:
  - to monitor groundworks, and to identify, investigate and record all significant buried archaeological deposits revealed on the site during the course of the development groundworks;
  - at the conclusion of the project, to produce an integrated archive for the project work and a report setting out the results of the project and the archaeological conclusions that can be drawn from the recorded data.

## 4. METHODOLOGY

- 4.1 The fieldwork followed the methodology set out within the WSI (CA 2016). The watching brief comprised the observation by a competent archaeologist of intrusive groundworks comprising the excavation of two shallow service trenches (Figure 2). Non-archaeologically significant deposits were removed by the contractors under archaeological supervision. Where mechanical excavators were used, these were equipped with a toothless bucket.
- 4.2 Where archaeological deposits were encountered written, graphic and photographic records were compiled in accordance with CA Technical Manual 1: *Fieldwork Recording Manual*.
- 4.3 The archive from the watching brief is currently held by CA at their offices in Andover. Subject to the agreement of the legal landowner the site archive will be deposited with West Berkshire Museum. A summary of information from this project, set out within Appendix B will be entered onto the OASIS online database of archaeological projects in Britain.

## 5. RESULTS (FIGURES 2-3)

- No natural geology was observed within **Trench 1**, a foul sewer service, which ran along the south-east corner of the building. The trench which was 0.6m wide consisted of the removal of modern made ground which was excavated to a maximum depth of 0.4m.
- 5.2 No natural geology was observed within **Trench 2.** The trench which was 0.5m wide consisted of the removal of modern made ground which was excavated to a maximum depth of 0.7m.
- 5.2 No features or deposits of archaeological interest were observed during groundworks and, despite visual scanning of spoil, no artefactual material pre-dating the modern period was recovered.

#### 6. DISCUSSION

6.1 Despite the archaeological potential of the application area (see archaeological background above) due to the limited nature and depth of the trenches observed the watching brief identified no archaeological remains. The depth of the trenches did not exceed the depth of topsoil/madeground.


