An archaeological watching brief was undertaken by Cotswold Archaeology during groundworks associated with the development of two residential buildings at Mount Pleasant, Parkham.

Only one feature of archaeological interest was observed, a ditch containing a single small sherd of post-medieval pottery.

1. INTRODUCTION

- 1.1 In February 2020 Cotswold Archaeology (CA) carried out an archaeological watching brief for OBK Land & Planning Ltd on behalf of the clients (names redacted for GDPR) at Mount Pleasant, Parkham, Bideford, North Devon (centred at NGR: 238709 121548; Fig. 1).
- 1.2 The watching brief was undertaken to fulfil a condition attached to a planning consent for residential development of the site (Planning ref: 1/0203/2018/OUT / 1/1145/2019/FUL).
- 1.3 The watching brief was carried out in accordance with detailed *Written Scheme of Investigation* (WSI) produced by CA (2020) which was approved by Stephen Reed, Senior Historic Environment Officer, Devon County Council Historic Environment Team (DCCHET). The fieldwork also followed Standard and guidance: Archaeological watching brief (CIfA 2014), and the Specification for a programme for Archaeological Monitoring and Recording (Devon County Council 2018).

The site

- 1.4 The proposed development site is approximately 0.12ha in extent, and was previously used a garden for adjoining properties. The site lies outside of the north-eastern edge of Parkham, to the immediate west of the junction of Chapel Road (Fig. 2). It is bordered to the north and east by residential properties. The site lies at approximately 160m AOD, with a gradual downward slope to the north.
- 1.5 The underlying bedrock geology of the area is mapped as Bude Formation Sandstones. No overlying superficial deposits are recorded (BGS 2019).

2. ARCHAEOLOGICAL BACKGROUND

2.1 The archaeological background given below is a succinct summary of known sites within a 1km radius available on the Heritage Gateway website.

Prehistoric (4000BC - AD 43)

2.2 The cropmarks of a curvilinear enclosure (Monument number (MN): 1031713) are recorded *c.* 900m to the north-east of the site.

Medieval (1066-1539)

2.3 A medieval manor house (MN: 32653) is recorded within the study area as well as the 15th century Church of St James (MN: SS32 SE10).

Post Medieval (1540-1800)

2.4 Five Grade II listed buildings dating to the 17th and 18th centuries are recorded within the study area including a Woollen Mill (MN: SS32 SE12) and a post-medieval farmhouse (MN: 32650).

Recent archaeological Investigations

A geophysical survey was carried out approximately 200m to the south-east of the site, on land at Barton Road. This identified undated ridge and furrow, and possible linear archaeological anomalies which may be agricultural in nature. A subsequent archaeological evaluation uncovered a 19th century hollow way, a post-medieval ditch and a series of undated ditches forming a small sub-rectangular enclosure. This enclosure could be prehistoric in nature given its prominent location, although the name of the field (Pound Meadow) could indicate it is a medieval or post-medieval pound/pinfold used for impounding stray animals (South West Archaeology 2017).

3. AIMS AND OBJECTIVES

- 3.1 The objectives of the archaeological works were:
 - to monitor groundworks, and to identify, investigate and record all significant buried archaeological deposits revealed on the site during the course of the development groundworks;
 - at the conclusion of the project, to produce an integrated archive for the project work and a report setting out the results of the project and the archaeological conclusions that can be drawn from the recorded data.

4. METHODOLOGY

- 4.1 The fieldwork followed the methodology set out within the WSI (CA 2020). An archaeologist was present during intrusive groundworks associated with the levelling of ground for the residential properties. Non-archaeologically significant deposits were removed by the contractors under archaeological supervision to the natural geology. Where mechanical excavators were used, these were equipped with a toothless bucket.
- 4.2 Where archaeological deposits were encountered written, graphic and photographic records were compiled in accordance with CA Technical Manual 1: *Fieldwork Recording Manual*.
- 4.3 The archive and artefacts from the evaluation are currently held by CA at their offices in Andover. Subject to the agreement of the legal landowner the archive will be deposited with the Museum of Barnstaple and North Devon under accession number NDDMS 2.2020a, along with the site archive. A summary of information from this project, set out within Appendix B will be entered onto the OASIS online database of archaeological projects in Britain.

5. RESULTS (FIGS 2-4)

- 5.1 The natural geological substrate **1002** consisting largely of a firm mid red yellow silty clay with <10% slate fragments was revealed at an average depth of 0.32m below present ground level. An area of dark brownish red silty clay with <25% slate fragments was seen in the western corner of site (**Fig 3**). The natural was heavily bioturbated by the flower beds and hedges that were present on site. This was overlain by a firm mid brown red silty clay subsoil with <10% slate fragments **1001** averaging 0.14m in thickness, which was in turn sealed by 0.22m of friable dark reddish brown clay silt topsoil with <5% slate fragments and <25% rooting **1000**.
- One post-medieval south-east/north-west orientated ditch **1003** was identified in the northern corner of the site, it measured 10.00m in length, 1.20m in width, and 0.41m in depth (**Fig. 4**). The ditch contained one fill **1004**, a friable light grey brown clay silt with <10% charcoal flecks from which one small sherd of post-medieval pottery was recovered.

6. EX0094 THE FINDS by Katie Marsden

6.1 Artefactual material recovered from the evaluation is listed in Appendix B and discussed further below. All finds have been recorded directly to an MS Excel spreadsheet.

Pottery

6.2 A single fragment of post-medieval to modern dated pottery, a sherd of transferprinted refined white ware of late 18th to 19th century date was recovered from ditch 1003 (fill 1004).

7. DISCUSSION

- 7.1 Only one feature of archaeological interest was observed on site. This was a post-medieval ditch which located in the northern edge of the site and ran parallel with e current field boundary and the road. The ditch most likely represents an earlier phase of the same boundary and may have also acted as a drainage ditch for the trackway that predated the current road.
- The sparsity of archaeological remains within the site is not wholly unexpected given the limited amount of evidence for archaeology in the surrounding area. A post-medieval ditch, holloway and possible enclosure were uncovered during an evaluation 200m to the south-east of the site (South West Archaeology 2017). It is possible that this field boundary was in use around the same time as these features but it is unlikely that this ditch is a continuation of any of the features found during the previous evaluation.



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
