An archaeological watching brief was undertaken by Cotswold Archaeology during groundworks associated with the construction of a new house, bungalow, garage and detached storage building at the land to the rear of 48 Evesham Road.

No features or deposits of archaeological interest were observed during groundworks, and no artefactual material was recovered.

1. INTRODUCTION

- In October 2008 Cotswold Archaeology (CA) carried out an archaeological watching brief for Mr David Greening at land to the rear of 48 Evesham Road, Bishop's Cleeve, Gloucestershire (centred on NGR: SO 95748 28178; Fig. 1). The watching brief was undertaken to fulfil a condition attached to a planning consent for a new house and detached storage building (Tewkesbury Borough Council (TBC) Planning ref: 08/00508/FUL) and a new bungalow and garage (TBC Planning ref: 08/00160/FUL). The objective of the watching brief was to record all archaeological remains exposed during the development.
- 1.2 The watching brief was carried out in accordance with a detailed Written Scheme of Investigation (WSI) produced by CA (2008) approved by Mr Charles Parry, Senior Archaeological Officer, Gloucestershire County Council, the archaeological advisor to TBC. The fieldwork also followed the Standard and Guidance for an Archaeological Watching Brief issued by the Institute of Field Archaeologists (2001), the Statement of Standards and Practices Appropriate for Archaeological Fieldwork in Gloucestershire (GCC 1996) and the Management of Archaeological Projects (English Heritage 1991). It was monitored by Mr Charles Parry.

The site

- 1.3 The site is located to the rear of 48 Evesham Road, and is surrounded by residential properties to the north, south and east with Evesham Road to the west (Fig. 2). The site lies at approximately 51 m AOD.
- 1.4 The site covers approximately 0.1hectares and prior to work commencing was a grassed lawn to the rear of 48 Evesham Road.
- 1.5 The underlying solid geology of the area is mapped as lower lias of the Jurassic era. These are undifferentiated clays, silty in upper part, with argillaceous limestone bands in the lower part (BGS 1981). Clayey silt was observed across the site during the watching brief.

Archaeological background

1.6 The site lies approximately 40m to the east of a series of mid to late Iron Age enclosures excavated by Birmingham Archaeology in 2005. The largest of these enclosures was square-shaped with sides measuring approximately 70m. Within the enclosures were uncovered the remains of roundhouses in the form of ring ditches and postholes. The excavation also encountered two human burials. It is not clear whether the occupation of the enclosures continued into the early Roman period, although evaluation of the area in 1999 revealed later Romano-British activity to the south of the enclosures.

Methodology

- 1.7 The fieldwork followed the methodology set out within the WSI (CA 2008). An archaeologist was present during intrusive groundworks comprising the excavation of foundations (Fig. 2).
- 1.8 Where archaeological deposits were encountered written, graphic and photographic records were compiled in accordance with CA Technical Manual 1: *Fieldwork Recording Manual* (2007).
- 1.9 The archive from the evaluation is currently held by CA at their offices in Kemble. It will be deposited with Cheltenham Museum and Art Gallery. A summary of information from this project, set out within Appendix B, will be entered onto the OASIS online database of archaeological projects in Britain.

2. RESULTS (FIG. 2)

2.1 The natural geological substrate (102 and 202) consisting of a yellow clayey sand, was revealed at an average depth of 0.8m below present ground level. This was overlain by a yellow sandy clay subsoil (101 and 201) and brown sandy clay topsoil (100 and 200).

2.2 No features or deposits of archaeological interest were observed during groundworks and, despite visual scanning of spoil, no artefactual material was recovered.

3. DISCUSSION

3.1 The watching brief identified no archaeological remains within the area of observed groundworks. The relatively large depth of top and subsoil covering the natural substrate could suggest that there has been no truncation during previous development and that archaeological features were never present. Conversely, this depth of top and subsoil could be the result of dumping during the previous construction and may have masked such truncation. The absence of finds in the top and subsoil suggests that the former interpretation is more likely and that archaeological deposits associated with the Iron Age enclosures recorded o the west did not extend as far as the site.
