An archaeological watching brief was undertaken by Cotswold Archaeology during groundworks associated with the construction of changing room facilities at Red Bull Playing Fields, Bristol Road, Malmesbury, Wiltshire.

No features or deposits of archaeological interest were observed during groundworks, and no artefactual material pre-dating the modern period was recovered.

1. INTRODUCTION

- 1.1 Between December 2008 and February 2009 Cotswold Archaeology (CA) carried out an archaeological watching brief for Malmesbury Youth Football Club at Red Bull Playing Fields, Bristol Road, Malmesbury, Wiltshire (centred on NGR: ST 9100 8791; Figs 1 and 2). The watching brief was undertaken to fulfil a condition attached to a planning consent for the construction of changing room facilities (North Wiltshire Council Planning ref: 07/03106/FUL, condition 6). The objective of the watching brief was to record all archaeological remains exposed during the development.
- 1.2 The watching brief was carried out in accordance with a detailed Written Scheme of Investigation (WSI) produced by CA (2008) and approved by Ms Melanie Pomeroy-Kellinger, Wiltshire County Council Archaeologist, archaeological advisor to the local planning authority, North Wiltshire District Council (NWDC). The fieldwork also followed the *Standard and Guidance for an Archaeological Watching Brief* issued by the Institute of Field Archaeologists (2008), *the Standards for Archaeological Assessment and Field Evaluation* (Wiltshire County Council Archaeology Service 1995) and the *Management of Archaeological Projects* (English Heritage 1991).

The site

- 1.3 The site covers approximately 184m² and is currently used as part of a sports field (Fig. 1). It lies at approximately 94m AOD and is bounded to the east by the Red Bull Public House, and by playing fields to the south, west and north.
- 1.4 The underlying geology of the area is mapped as cornbrash, rubbly limestone of the Upper Jurassic era (BGS 1970). However, the natural geological substrate encountered during the watching brief consisted of light grey gravel and clay. This was revealed across the monitored area.

Archaeological background

1.5 The proposed development area lies in an area of archaeological potential. Approximately 100m to the south-west undated cropmarks, possibly representative of an undated settlement site, have previously been identified (Wiltshire SMR ST98NW623). Aerial photographic evidence has also identified an undated circular cropmark, possibly representative of a round barrow, 800m south-west of the site (Wiltshire SMR ST98NW624).

Methodology

- 1.6 The fieldwork followed the methodology set out within the WSI (CA 2008). An archaeologist was present during intrusive groundworks comprising ground reduction, the excavation of foundation trenches, and the excavation of a separate soak-away trench (Area 2) (Fig. 2).
- 1.7 Where archaeological deposits were encountered written, graphic and photographic records were compiled in accordance with CA Technical Manual 1: *Fieldwork Recording Manual* (2007).
- 1.8 The archive from the watching brief is currently held by CA at their offices in Kemble, and will be deposited with the Wiltshire Heritage Museum. A summary of information from this project, set out within Appendix B, will be entered onto the OASIS online database of archaeological projects in Britain.

2. RESULTS

- 2.1 The natural geological substrate (102 and 202) consisting of light grey gravel and clay, was revealed in both Areas 1 and 2 at an average depth of between 0.3 and 0.4m below present ground level. In Area 1, this was overlain by mid grey, clay silt subsoil (101) averaging 0.25m in thickness, which was in turn sealed by 0.2m of topsoil (100). In Area 2, this was overlain by further natural gravel (201) averaging 1m in thickness, which was in turn sealed by 0.4m of modern aggregate (20).
- 2.2 No features or deposits of archaeological interest were observed during groundworks and, despite visual scanning of spoil, no artefactual material pre-dating the modern period was recovered.

3. DISCUSSION

3.1 The watching brief identified no archaeological remains within the area of observed groundworks. The absence of archaeological deposits may indicate that nearby cropmarks, suggestive of a possible undated settlement site, either do not extend as far as this or were not exposed by the current development.
