An archaeological watching brief was undertaken by Cotswold Archaeology during groundworks associated with the construction of an extension at the front of The Norman Knight Public House.

No features or deposits of archaeological interest were observed during groundworks, and no artefactual material pre-dating the modern period was recovered.

1. INTRODUCTION

- 1.1 In August 2009 Cotswold Archaeology (CA) carried out an archaeological watching brief for Matthew Findlay on behalf on The Norman Knight Ltd at The Norman Knight (centred on NGR: SP 3153 3470; Fig. 1). The watching brief was undertaken to fulfil a condition attached to a planning consent for an extension at the front of the Public House (Planning ref: 09/00642/FUL). The objective of the watching brief was to record all archaeological remains exposed during the development.
- 1.2 The watching brief was carried out in accordance with the Brief for Archaeological Work: The Norman Knight, Whichford (WMFS 2009) prepared by Anna Stocks, Planning Archaeologist, Warwickshire Museum Field Services (WMFS), the archaeological advisors to Stratford on Avon District Council (SADC), and with a subsequent detailed Written Scheme of Investigation (WSI) produced by CA (2009) and approved by SADC acting on the advice of Anna Stocks. The fieldwork also followed the Standard and Guidance for an Archaeological Watching Brief issued by the Institute for Archaeologists (2008), the Management of Archaeological Projects (English Heritage 1991) and the Management of Research Projects in the Historic Environment (MORPHE) (EH 2006).

The site

- 1.3 The site comprises The Norman Knight and associated garden, located in the centre of the village of Whichford. The site is flat and lies at approximately 134m AOD.
- 1.4 The development comprises an area of 60m² and comprised a paved area and lawn at the front of the property.
- 1.5 The underlying solid geology of the area is mapped as Lower Lias Clay of the Jurassic era (BGS 1968).

Archaeological background

1.6 The site is located within the probable extent of the medieval settlement of Whichford (Warwickshire Sites and Monuments Record MWA 8994) and therefore within an area of significant archaeological potential (WCC 2009).

Methodology

- 1.7 The fieldwork followed the methodology set out within the WSI (CA 2009). An archaeologist was present during intrusive groundworks comprising ground reduction and the excavation of a foundation trench (Fig. 2).
- 1.8 Where archaeological deposits were encountered written, graphic and photographic records were compiled in accordance with CA Technical Manual 1: *Fieldwork Recording Manual* (2007).
- 1.9 The archive from the watching brief is currently held by CA at their offices in Kemble and will be deposited with Warwickshire Museum. A summary of information from this project, set out within Appendix B, will be entered onto the OASIS online database of archaeological projects in Britain.

2. RESULTS (FIG. 2)

- 2.1 The natural geological substrate 110 comprising yellow sandy clay was revealed at an average depth of 0.34m below present ground level (bpgl). This was generally overlain by yellow-brown silty clay subsoil 104 c. 0.24m in thickness, which was in turn overlain by dark brown silty clay topsoil 103 c. 0.1m thick. Wall foundations for the existing Public House and modern garden features were also identified.
- 2.2 No features or deposits of archaeological interest were observed during groundworks and, despite visual scanning of spoil, no artefactual material pre-dating the modern period was recovered.

3. DISCUSSION

3.1 Despite the archaeological potential of the application area (see archaeological background above), the watching brief identified no archaeological remains within the area of observed groundworks. The absence of archaeological deposits may indicate that structural remains associated with the medieval settlement of Whichford either do not extend as far as or were not exposed by the development.
