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SUMMARY

An archaeological watching brief was undertaken by Cotswold Archaeology during groundworks associated with the change in use from residential institution to residential (8 flats) at Redlands, 13 Charlotte Mews, Swindon, Wiltshire.

A possible, undated, wall foundation was identified within the area of groundworks.

1. INTRODUCTION

- 1.1 In April 2010 Cotswold Archaeology (CA) carried out an archaeological watching brief for Urban Elite Property Developments at Redlands, 13 Charlotte Mews, Swindon, Wiltshire (centred on NGR: SU 1572 8370; Fig. 1). The watching brief was undertaken to fulfil a condition (no. 17) attached to a planning consent for the change in use of the property from residential institution to 8 residential flats (Planning ref: SU 1572 8369). The objective of the watching brief was to record all archaeological remains exposed during the development.
- 1.2 The watching brief was carried out in accordance with a detailed Written Scheme of Investigation (WSI) produced by CA (2010) and approved by Swindon Borough Council acting on the advice of Melanie Pomeroy-Kellinger, County Archaeologist, Wiltshire Council. The fieldwork also followed the Standard and Guidance for an Archaeological Watching Brief issued by the Institute for Archaeologists (IfA 2008), the Statement of Standards and Practices Appropriate for Archaeological Fieldwork in Wiltshire (WCC 1995), the Management of Archaeological Projects (English Heritage 1991) and the Management of Research Projects in the Historic Environment (MORPHE): Project Manager's Guide (EH 2006).

The site

- 1.3 The site is approximately 0.15ha and comprises buildings, hard-standing and gardens. The site is bounded to the north-west by Charlotte Mews and on the remaining sides by residential properties.
- 1.4 The underlying solid geology of the area is mapped as Ampthill Clay Formation and Kimmeridge Clay Formation of the Jurassic era (BGS 2010). The natural substrate was not encountered during the groundworks.

Archaeological background

1.5 Archaeological interest in the site arises from its location within the historic core of Old Town, Swindon (a settlement with medieval origins, SMR ref. no. SU18SE461). More specifically, archaeological investigation at The Hermitage immediately to the north-east of the site identified artefacts dating to the Mesolithic, Iron Age, Romano-British and medieval periods, together with a Saxon sunken-floored building (SMR ref. nos. SU18SE054, SU18SE204, SU18SE350, SU18SE404 and SU18SE469). A

further Saxon sunken-floored building was identified immediately to the north of the site at the Lloyds Bank Building (SMR ref. no. SU18SE403).

Methodology

- 1.6 The fieldwork followed the methodology set out within the WSI (CA 2010). An archaeologist was present during intrusive groundworks comprising the excavation of a foundation trench (Fig. 2).
- 1.7 Where archaeological deposits were encountered written, graphic and photographic records were compiled in accordance with CA Technical Manual 1: *Fieldwork Recording Manual* (2007).
- 1.8 The archive from the watching brief is currently held by CA at their offices in Kemble and will be deposited with Swindon Museum and Art Gallery. A summary of information from this project, set out within Appendix B, will be entered onto the OASIS online database of archaeological projects in Britain.

2. RESULTS (FIGS 2-3)

- 2.1 The earliest deposit encountered consisted of undated possible wall foundation 103 orientated north-east/south-west. This was revealed at the south-western end of the trench at an average depth of 0.88m below present ground level. This was overlain by garden soil 102 averaging 0.67m in thickness, which was in turn sealed by gravel bedding deposit 101 averaging 0.26m in thickness. This was overlain by modern tarmac 100.
- 2.2 Despite visual scanning of spoil, no artefactual material pre-dating the modern period was recovered.

3. DISCUSSION

3.1 An undated possible wall foundation was identified during the groundworks and may relate to structures formerly occupying the site.
