

Summerhouse Torsonce Mansion House Stow **Scottish Borders**

Archaeological Watching Brief

Report No. 3116

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1. INTRODUCTION

This report presents the results of an archaeological watching brief undertaken in December 2013 during ground-works for a summerhouse at Torsonce Mansion House, Stow, Scottish Borders (NGR: NT 45592 43412) (Fig. 1). The work was commissioned by Ms Sharon-Anne Young (Ms Young)

A Written Scheme of Investigation (WSI) dated 09 December 2013 for this programme of works was produced by CFA on behalf of Ms Young. The WSI was designed to meet the requirements of the Scottish Borders Council Archaeologist.

1.2 Background

Planning Permission (13/00453/FUL) has been granted for the construction of a summerhouse at Torsonce Mansion House, Stow. The planning permission was subject to an archaeological condition requiring a watching brief on the groundworks.

Torsonce House is understood to date from the early to mid-19th century, but is believed to occupy the site of a late medieval tower (Torsonce Castle). An entry in the New Statistical Account (NSA 1845) suggests that part of the original tower may have been incorporated into the current house, but there is no evidence to substantiate this report. The tower was most probably enclosed by a barmkin wall, which is also likely to have enclosed a variety of other structures. Further structures may have existed outwith the barmkin forming a small hamlet around the tower. This phenomenon is known from other contemporary towers such as Smailholm. Consequently, it was considered possible that evidence for buildings and other activities may have survived as buried features within the development area.

Torsonce appears on Roy's Military Map (c.1750) as enclosed wooded estate land, with the general area being annotated *Torsons hill*, while on the First Edition Ordnance Survey map (1854) the current house is depicted and annotated *Torsonce on the site of Torsonce Castle*. Roy's reference to *Torsons Hill* suggests that the name Torsonce may be derived from the Norse name Torson or Thorson (son of Thor).

1.2 Objectives

The objectives of the programme of archaeological works were

- To conduct an appropriate programme of archaeological investigation (Watching Brief) to monitor topsoil stripping.
- to mitigate the effects of construction on any archaeological deposits or features identified through excavation and recording and produce a report on them.

2. WORKING METHODS

2.1 General

CFA Archaeology Ltd follows the Institute for Archaeologists' Code of Conduct, Standards and Guidance for Archaeological Fieldwork.

2.2 Watching Brief






Fig. 2 - Development area from SW following soil stripping

An area measuring 4.5m ENE-WSW by 3.8m transversely (Fig.2 and 3) was soil stripped for the summerhouse foundations using a 360° tracked mini-digger equipped with a smooth-bladed ditching bucket. This operation was carried out under constant archaeological supervision.

The stratification of all excavated areas was recorded whether or not significant archaeological deposits were identified.

All excavation and on-site recording was carried out according to standard CFA procedures, principally by drawing, photography and by completing standard CFA record forms.

3. ARCHAEOLOGICAL RESULTS

3.1 Watching Brief

The deposits within this area consisted of up to 0.3m of dark/mid-brown silty-clay topsoil (001) and up to 0.2m of mid-brown silty-clay subsoil (002) overlying orange-yellow clay natural (000). Two rubble drains were identified aligned NE to SW. These measured 0.3m in width and were located 2m apart. There were no features, deposits or artefacts of archaeological significance identified.

4. CONCLUSIONS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

An archaeological watching-brief was carried out during ground-works for a summerhouse at Torsonce House, Stow. Torsonce House is understood to occupy the location of an earlier late medieval tower known as Torsonce Castle. The watching brief did not identify any features, deposits or artefacts of archaeological significance.

CFA does not recommend any further archaeological work in relation to this programme of works. However the final decision on any further mitigation measures lies with the Scottish Borders Council Archaeology Service.

The project archive, comprising all CFA record sheets, maps and reports, will be deposited with the RCAHMS and copies of reports will be lodged with the Scottish Borders Council Sites and Monuments Record.

A summary statement to be submitted for publication in *Discovery and Excavation in Scotland* (Appendix 3) will be sufficient to disseminate the results of this programme of works.
