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1. INTRODUCTION

1.1 General

This report presents the results of a watching brief undertaken by CFA Archaeology Ltd during site investigations at Yester House, Gifford, East Lothian in June 2015 (NGR: NT 5436 6712).

A Written Scheme of Investigation (WSI) dated 23 June 2015 was produced and was designed to fulfil the requirements of East Lothian Council Archaeology Service (ELCAS).

1.2 Background

A short programme of site investigation works was required on ground to the south of Yester House in order to establish the ground conditions in preparation for landscaping works. Yester House dates from the 18th century and it is possible that former garden and landscaping features may survive beneath the current surface.

1.3 Objectives

The objectives of the programme of works were:

- To conduct an appropriate programme of archaeological investigation (watching brief) to monitor the excavation of the trial pits.
- To mitigate the effects of construction on any archaeological deposits or features identified through excavation and recording and produce a report on them.

2. WORKING METHODS

2.1 General

CFA follows the Institute for Archaeologists' Standards and Guidance and Code of Conduct.

2.2 Watching Brief

Excavations were undertaken with JCB fitted with smooth-bladed ditching bucket, under constant archaeological supervision. All discoveries, including soil profiles and subsoil characteristics, were recorded using standard CFA recording forms and digital photography.

3. ARCHAEOLOGICAL RESULTS

Context numbers are in bold and described in Appendix 1.

Trial-pit 1 measured 1.8m by 2.3m by 1.1m deep and was located 5m to the south of the west wing of the house. A 0.3m thick mid-brown silty sand topsoil (**001**) overlay a dark red sandy gravel 0.35m thick, containing clay and small rounded stones (**002**). This may be redeposited natural used to build up the area in front of the house. A lens of redeposited topsoil (**003**) may represent a former ground surface, lending credence to **002** being redeposited natural. Below this lay dark brown/red sandy gravel (**004**), which is considered to be probable natural.

Trial-pit 2 measured 1.8m by 2.6m by 1.5m deep and was located 6m south of the east wind of the house. Topsoil (**001**) overlay subsoil (**002**), as in trial pit 1. Below this was darker brown/red sandy gravel with no clay (**005**), which lay on top of a light grey sandy clay (**006**); both deposits appear to be natural.

Trial-pit 3 measured 1.8m by 2.6m by 0.95m deep and was located approximately 14m due south of the stairs leading up to the main door of the house. 0.25m of topsoil (001) was followed by 0.5m of 002 which lay on top of 0.2m of a clayey sand (007). Below this, 006 was visible in the base of the trial pit.

Trial-pit 4 measured 1.8m by 2.7m by 1.25m deep and was located 27m south of trial pit 1. 0.3m of topsoil overlay 0.45m of dark red brown sandy gravel (**004**). A bright orange sandy gravel (**008**) was visible in the base of the trial pit.

Trial-pit 5 measured 1.8m by 2.4m by 1.5m deep and was located 27m south of trial pit 2. In this trial pit 0.2m of topsoil overlay 0.55m of the red/brown gravel (**002**), which in turn lay on top of darker red/brown sandy gravel (**003**). 0.3m of yellow grey sandy clay (**006**) was visible in the base of the trench.

Trial-pit 6 measured 1.8m by 2.8m by 1.5m deep and was located 15m south of trial pit 5. 0.2m of orange/red sandy gravel containing clay (009) lay beneath 0.2m of topsoil (001). Below the gravel was 0.7m of mixed grey/orange sandy silt (010). Bright orange sandy gravel (008) was visible in the base of the trial pit.

Trial-pit 7 measured 1.8m by 2.9m by 0.3m deep and was located 15m south of trial pit 4. This trial pit was only excavated to 0.3m deep, as a stone culvert (**011**) running NW-SE was encountered at this level. The culvert itself was not excavated but was cleaned and recorded before the trial pit was backfilled.

Trial-pit 8 measured 1.8m by 2.7m by 0.3m deep and was located directly to the west of trial pit 7. It was only excavated to a depth of 0.3m, as a stone filled drain was encountered at this level.

Trial-pit 9 measured 1.8m by 2.5m by 1.1m deep and was located to the east of Yester House. A layer of topsoil (001) 0.3m thick overlay a 0.5m thick layer of dark brown soil with charcoal inclusions (013), which may be redeposited topsoil or garden soil, as seen in trial-pit 1. Below this deposit was orange/yellow sandy silt containing angular and rounded stones (014).

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Trial-pit 10 measured 1.8m by 2.5m by 2.4m deep and was located to the west of Yester House. Excavation revealed that the topsoil (**001**) overlay dark brown sandy silt which in turn covered mixed grey/brown sandy silt (**016**). Very friable, dark red/burgundy clayey silt was uncovered in the base of the trial pit.

4. CONCLUSION

Excavation of trial-pit 7 revealed a stone culvert and excavation of trial-pit 8 revealed a stone drain. Natural undisturbed subsoil appears to have been encountered at depths varying between 0.9m and 1.5m below the current ground surface.

CFA recommends that this report along with the *OASIS* and *Discovery and Excavation in Scotland* entries will be sufficient to disseminate the results of the watching brief.

The project archive, comprising all CFA record sheets, maps and reports, will be deposited with the RCAHMS and copies of reports will be lodged with the East Lothian Council Historic Environmental Record.








Fig. 2 - Photograph of Trial Pit 1






Fig. 5 - Photograph of Trial Pit 4
