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1. INTRODUCTION

1.1 General

This report describes an archaeological watching brief that was undertaken during groundbreaking works for a house extension at Abbeylea, 10-12 Main Street, New Abbey, Dumfriesshire (NGR: NX 96362 66250, Figs. 1-2) in September 2019. The work was commissioned by Mr Jim Tinsley.

A Written Scheme of Investigation (WSI) was produced by CFA (dated 05 September 2019), and agreed in advance with Dumfries and Galloway Council (DGC).

1.2 Background

Planning permission has been granted for the demolition and removal of an existing extension and the erection of a new, larger extension with associated service upgrades.

Dumfries and Galloway Council has requested a watching brief during ground breaking works.






Fig. 3: The view North from 10 Abbeylea. The garden is on the right and the Precinct Wall of Sweetheart Abbey can be seen at the left side of the adjacent garden of No. 8 Main Street

This request is due to the location of the development, within the Precinct of Sweetheart Abbey (Fig. 3).

1.3 Objectives

The aims and objectives of the archaeological work were:

1. To carry out a watching brief during ground breaking works, undertake any mitigation as required, and produce a report.

2. WORKING METHODS

CFA Archaeology Ltd follows the Chartered Institute for Archaeologists' Code of Conduct, Standards and Guidance as appropriate.

A watching brief was carried out following the demolition to ground level of the existing extension on the site.

All groundbreaking works were carried out using a micro digger under archaeological supervision.

All excavation and on-site recording was carried out according to standard CFA procedures, principally by drawing, by photography and by completing standard CFA record forms.

3. ARCHAEOLOGICAL RESULTS

3.1 General

Context numbers are in bold and described in Appendix 1.

3.2 Watching Brief

The existing extension (Fig. 4) consisted mainly of concrete block walls with a concrete floor (001). A drain (003) containing a plastic capillary pipe ran around the exterior of the extension and the cottage itself (004). This drain was overlain by pea gravel with backfilled soil and stones (002) above.

The new extension (Figs. 2, 5) was an irregular shape but measured around 10.5m ENE-WSW by 5.4m SSE-NNW. The excavation extended around 450mm beyond the outer extent of the extension walls to allow for their construction.

The concrete foundation of the existing extension was not removed but, apart from this, natural subsoil (008) was exposed over the whole footprint of the development (Fig. 5). Overlying the natural was around 0.15m of orange-brown sandy silt with gravel subsoil (007) (Fig. 6-7). This was overlain by around 0.4m of grey sandy silt subsoil which contained occasional stones as well as fragments of coal and ash (006). Above 006 was a grey-black sandy silt topsoil (005) with a depth of around 0.3m. On the western side of the plot, surface deposits of a crushed flint path material (011) were present.

One archaeological feature (010) was recorded (Figs. 2, 7-8) in the section at the western corner of the development footprint. This was a drystone structure with an exposed height of 0.5m and width of 0.5m. It was founded on the top of the natural subsoil which was also the case with the cottage wall (004) and was overlain by the topsoil (005). It was aligned NE-SW, parallel to the existing garden boundary (Fig. 8).

No other archaeological remains were uncovered.

4. CONCLUSION

An archaeological watching brief was undertaken during the excavation of predominantly garden soils within and just beyond the footprint of a new house extension.

A drystone structure was partially exposed in one of the corners of the extension footprint. It appeared to be roughly parallel with the existing plot boundaries and it may be either part of an earlier plot boundary, or perhaps a rockery feature adjacent to it. Due to the location of this structure, within the 450mm working area beyond the extension walls, it will not be affected by the development and was left in situ.

No other archaeological remains were uncovered.

The project archive, comprising all CFA record sheets, maps and reports, will be deposited with the National Record of the Historic Environment (NRHE) and copies of reports will be lodged with the DGC Historic Environment Record.

A summary statement will be submitted for publication in *Discovery and Excavation in Scotland* (Appendix 3) and will also be reported on through *OASIS Scotland*.


