1. INTRODUCTION

1.1 General

- 1.1.1 This report presents the results of a Level 1 Photographic Survey undertaken in December 2008 by CFA Archaeology Ltd (CFA) at St Hilda's Parish Church, 1a Oxgangs Road, Edinburgh (NGR: NT 2332 6910). The work was commissioned by Mr Alex Shaw of Hackland Dore architects on behalf of Dunedin Canmore Housing Association. St Hilda's Church and Rectory are to be demolished prior to redevelopment of the site for social housing. Although the church is not a listed structure, the City of Edinburgh Council Archaeology Service (CECAS) consider the site to be of local historical interest and as such they have requested that a Level 1 (English Heritage 2006) standing building recording survey be carried out prior to its demolition.
- 1.1.2 A Written Scheme of Investigation (WSI) for the work was approved by John Lawson, at CECAS.

1.2 Background

- 1.2.1 St Hilda's Church was designed by Stevenson & Dunworth Architect's, Edinburgh and constructed in 1965 for the Scottish Episcopal Church. It occupies a rectangular layout plan with baptistry, chapel and sacristy. The roof is asymmetrical and covered with zinc alloy sheets. The building is lit on the main elevations by both gothic-arched and ogeeheaded windows. The interior of the church is minimalist in terms of ornamentation. A mural of Christ and his twelve disciples is present on the wall behind the altar.
- 1.2.2 The church rectory has a rectangular layout plan with study, dining and living rooms on the ground floor. The upper floor plan incorporates two bedrooms, storage space and a bathroom. The upstairs rooms are lit by dormer windows. The roof is asymmetrical and covered with aluminium sheets.
- 1.2.3 On 27th May 2007 there was a final thanksgiving service marking the end of the church as a place of worship. The congregation of St Hilda's, having reduced in size in recent years, decided that it could no longer maintain worship in the building and the building closed in the summer of 2007 (Bishop's Notices Archive 2007).

1.3 Objectives

- 1.3.1 The aims of the programme of archaeological works were:
 - 1. To carry out a Level 1 photographic survey of the church and rectory in relation to floor plans of the church and rectory.
 - 2. To produce an illustrated report outlining the results of the work.

2. WORKING METHODS

2.1 General

2.1.1 CFA Archaeology Ltd follows the Institute of Field Archaeologists' Code of Conduct, and Standards and Guidelines for Historic Building Surveys as appropriate.

2.2 Building Survey

- 2.2.1 Original architectural drawings from 1965 have been used to produce Fig 1. Owing to the poor quality of the drawings they have been redrawn to provide cross-reference to the photographic record (Appendix 1).
- 2.2.2 The building survey included an inspection of all interior rooms within the rectory and the church. Dimensions of each room were obtained using a Leica Distometer. General notes were taken on the layout of the buildings.
- 2.2.3 A photographic record of the exterior and interior of both buildings was made using a Nikon D100 SLR digital 35mm camera. Selected images that best portray the character of both buildings are produced as Plates 1-13.

3. BUILDING RECORDING RESULTS

3.1 General




Fig 2 - Floor Plan of St Hilda's Church




Fig 3a - Ground Floor Plan

3.1.1 Figure 2 and 3 shows the ground and first floor plans of the church and rectory. The dimensions of the individual rooms within each building are listed in Table 1.

St Hilda's Church exterior

3.1.2 St Hilda's Church is a single storey structure with an asymmetrical pitched zinc alloy roof. The walls are brick-built with a heavy coating of grey pebble-dash render on the exterior. The east elevation incorporates the main entrance doorway and windows that light the baptistary (Plate 1). A commemorative plaque laid by Kenneth Carey, Bishop of Edinburgh on July 25th 1965 is also present on the corner of the south-facing elevation (Plate 2). The south elevation is buttressed with windows lighting the nave (Plate 3 & 7). The north elevation also has buttresses and an outshot building (robe room) with a catslide roof. The east-facing elevation incorporates three small windows that light the chapel (Plate 4).

3.1.3 The interior of St Hilda's Church is open plan with a sliding door forming a temporary division between the nave and baptistry (Plate 5). The baptistry font is situated at its centre (Plate 6). A doorway on the west elevation of the nave leads to the robe room. On the south wall, a doorway leads to the sacristy where a doorway leads to the chapel. The walls of the nave and chapel have white-painted walls and are lit on the east elevation by lancet windows (Plate 7). Two rows of pews constructed from plywood occupy the nave floor. A brass alter rail enclosed the altar that is raised on a dias at the south end of the nave (Plate 8). The altar is constructed of sandstone blocks (Plate 9). The wall behind the altar has a crucifix and a mural of Christ and his disciples depicted in simple line-form (Plate 10). The chapel is accessed through the sacristy and has plain white-painted walls and a small altar with tabernacle at its south end (Plate 11).

Church Rectory

3.1.4 The rectory occupies a rectangular layout plan. On the ground floor an L-shaped living and dining room are present at the west end. The kitchen, stairs and hallway occupy the middle part of the ground floor and a study and bedroom are present on the east side of the building. Two bedrooms are present on the first floor. Due to the shape of the asymmetric roof configuration, the east side of the first floor has a large area of loft space used as a storage area. The bathroom leads off the landing and hallway. The two storey rectory has been fully modernized since its construction. There are no 1965 period features present within the building. All the walls are lined with plaster-board and all fixtures and fittings are modern. The main entrance is situated on the south-facing elevation (Plate 12). This elevation also includes an outshot chimney for the living room and bedroom and bathroom windows on the first floor. The east-facing elevation is plain with two windows lighting the study and a bedroom (Plate 13).

4. CONCLUSION

- 4.1 The photographic survey has adequately recorded the architectural character of the building and its form and layout have been described.
- 4.2 In accordance with the terms of the WSI approved by the CECAS the survey has now been completed. An online OASIS entry and submission to Discovery and Excavation in Scotland will be made to disseminate the results (Appendix 2).

The latter has plain white walls and a small altar at the east end.






Fig. No: Revision: Hackland Dore Architects for Dunedin Canmore Housing Association




Fig 3b - First Floor Plan






