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INTRODUCTION

- This report presents the results of a desk-based assessment and field survey that identifies the cultural heritage interests within and in the vicinity of a proposed wind farm development at Torbay Farm, near Dufftown. The assessment has been carried out by CFA Archaeology Ltd (CFA), informed by information provided by the Aberdeenshire Council Archaeology Service.
- 2 Cultural heritage resources include:
 - World Heritage Sites.
 - Scheduled Monuments and other archaeological features.
 - Listed Buildings and other buildings of historic or architectural importance.
 - Conservation Areas and other significant townscapes.
 - Historic Gardens and Designed Landscapes and other significant historic landscapes.
- Those resources relevant to the proposed wind farm are Scheduled Monuments and other archaeological features, Listed Buildings and other buildings of historic or architectural importance and Conservation Areas. There are no Scheduled Monument, Listed buildings or World Heritage Sites within the boundaries of the proposed development and no part of the proposed development would lie within a Conservation Area or a historic Garden and Designed landscape. Effects on Gardens and Designed Landscapes are considered by the Landscape and Visual Amenity report.
- 4 The specific objectives of the cultural heritage study were to:
 - Identify the cultural heritage baseline through desk-based assessment and walk-over reconnaissance field survey.
 - Consider the proposed development site in terms of its archaeological and historic environment potential.
 - Assess the potential and predicted effects of the development of the site on the baseline cultural heritage resource, within the context of relevant legislation and planning policy guidelines.
 - Identify the constraints and opportunities of the development in terms of the cultural heritage resource.
- Figure 1 depicts the wind farm area boundary and the locations of cultural heritage sites and features identified by the study, within this boundary. Figure 2 shows development features overlaid on the Ordnance Survey 1st (1872) edition. Appendix 1 provides a gazetteer of cultural heritage sites and features within the proposed wind farm area and an indication of the relative importance of each site.
- An extract of the Ordnance Survey 1st Edition map for the propose wind farm area is provided on Figure 2.
- Figure 3 shows the cultural heritage receptors within 10km of the proposed wind farm, a list of these sites is provided as Appendix 2.

PLANNING AND LEGISLATIVE BACKGROUND

Context

- Scotland's historic environment contributes to the Scotlish Government's strategic objectives and to the target of improving the state of Scotland's historic buildings, monuments and environment is identified as a national indicator and target under the National Performance Framework. The Scotlish Historic Environment Policy (SHEP) sets out Scotlish Minister's policies for the historic environment, and provides policy direction for Historic Scotland and a framework that informs the day-to-day work of a range of organisations that have a role and interest in managing Scotland's historic environment. Through the implementation of the SHEP, Scotlish Ministers wish to achieve three outcomes for Scotland's historic environment:
 - 1) That the historic environment is cared for, protected and enhanced for the benefit of our own and future generations.
 - 2) To secure greater economic benefits from the historic environment.
 - 3) That the people of Scotland and visitors to our country value, understand and enjoy the historic environment.
- 9 Cultural heritage resources include sites with statutory and non-statutory designations, as defined in Scottish Planning Policy (SPP 23): Planning and the Historic Environment.
- 10 Sites with statutory designations include:
 - Scheduled Monuments.
 - Listed Buildings.
 - Conservation Areas.
 - Designated Wrecks.
- 11 Sites with non-statutory designations include:
 - World Heritage Sites.
 - Gardens and Designed Landscapes.
 - Historic Battlefields
 - Other Historic Environment Interests.

Sites with Statutory Designations

Scheduled Monuments

Under the Ancient Monuments and Archaeological Areas Act 1979 (1979 Act), the Scottish Ministers are required to compile and maintain a schedule of monuments considered to be of national importance. The consent of the Scottish Ministers is required before any works are carried out which would have the effect of demolishing, destroying, damaging, removing, repairing, altering, adding to, flooding or covering up a Scheduled Monument. In addition, impacts of proposed development works upon the setting of a Scheduled Monument form an important consideration in the granting or refusal of planning consent to conduct development works. Further information on development control procedures relating to Scheduled Monuments is provided in the SHEP, SPP 23 and in Planning Advice Note (PAN 42): Archaeology.

Listed Buildings

13 Under the Planning (Listed Buildings and Conservation Areas) (Scotland) Act 1997 (1997 Act), the Scottish Ministers are required to compile a list of buildings of special architectural or historic interest. Such buildings are classified into Categories A, B and C(S), in decreasing order of importance. Planning authorities and the Scottish Ministers are required to have special regard for the desirability or preserving of Listed Buildings and their settings and any features of special architectural or historic importance they possess. Scottish Government policy and guidance is also provided in SHEP and SPP23.

Conservation Areas

14 Under the Planning (Listed Buildings and Conservation Areas) Scotland Act 1997 Act, areas of special architectural or historic interest can be designated by local authorities as Conservation Areas, the character or appearance of which it is desirable to preserve or enhance. Planning authorities are required to consider planning applications affecting the appearance, character or setting of Conservation Areas. Scottish Government policy and guidance is also provided in SHEP and SPP23

Sites with Non-Statutory Designations

Other Historic Environment Interests

There is a range of other non-designated archaeological sites, monuments and areas of historic interest, including battlefields, historic landscapes, other gardens and designed landscapes, woodlands and routes such as drove roads that do not have statutory protection. Sites without statutory protection are curated by the local planning authority and SPP 23 and PAN 42 provide national planning policy guidance and advice on the treatment of such resources. SPP 23 requires that planning authorities ensure that development plans provide land use policy frameworks for the protection, conservation and enhancement of the historic environment within which any development impacts can be properly assessed. PAN 42 indicates that the principle that should underlie all planning decision-making is preservation of cultural resources *in situ*, where possible, and by record if destruction cannot be avoided. It is recognised in the PAN that preservation may not always be possible, and where damage is unavoidable various mitigation measures may be proposed.

Regional and Local Planning Policy Guidance

Moray Structure plan (adopted 2008)

- The Moray Structure Plan contains policies that provide a framework for the conservation and enhancement of the urban and rural environment and protection of the diversity of the natural and cultural heritage.
- The Structure Plan states that the conservation, enhancement and protection of Moray's built heritage is important. This means safeguarding listed buildings, ancient monuments, archaeology and designed landscapes and to retain buildings, townscapes and artefacts which are part of Moray's character and identity.
- Policy 2(f) of the structure plan states that the Council will seek to conserve and enhance the areas of built heritage resources and their settings.

Moray Local Plan (adopted 2008)

- Policy BE1 of the Moray Local Plan states that development proposals will be refused where they will adversely affect Scheduled Monuments and nationally important archaeological sites or their settings unless the developer proves that any significant adverse effect on the qualities for which the site has been designated are clearly outweighed by social or economic benefits of national importancePolicy 2(f) of the structure plan states that the Council will seek to conserve and enhance the areas of built heritage resources and their settings.
- The policy further states that development proposals which will adversely affect sites of local archaeological importance, or their settings, will be refused unless it can be demonstrated that;
 - Local public benefits clearly outweigh the archaeological value of the site, and
 - There is no suitable alternative site for the development, and
 - Any adverse effects can be satisfactorily mitigated at the developer's expense.
- Where, in exceptional circumstances, the primary aim of preservation of archaeological features in situ does not prove feasible, the council shall require the excavation and researching of a site at the developer's expense.
- Policy BE2 states that the Council will encourage the protection, maintenance, enhancement and active use of listed buildings. Development proposals will be refused where they would have a detrimental effect on the character, integrity or setting on the listed building(s). The demolition of listed buildings will not be permitted unless it is demonstrated beyond reasonable doubt that every effort has been exerted to find practical ways of retaining the building and that the community would benefit from the redevelopment.
- Policy BE4 states that development proposals which will adversely affect Gardens and Designed Landscapes or their settings will be refused unless.
 - The overall character and reasons for designation will not be compromised, or
 - Any significant adverse affects can be satisfactorily mitigated and are clearly outweighed by social, economic and strategic benefits.

METHODOLOGY

General

24 This Cultural Heritage Study was conducted in accordance with the Institute for Archaeologists' Code of Conduct (2006) and Standard and Guidance for Archaeological Desk-Based Assessment (2001).

Desk-based assessment

- Consultation letters were sent to Historic Scotland, the Aberdeenshire Council Archaeology Service and the Moray Council Planning Officer (Listed Buildings and Conservation Areas) to obtain their opinion on the likely effects of the proposed development and to obtain information on cultural heritage resources within their remit.
- A reply was received from Historic Scotland (14/09/09) who:
 - Confirmed that there are no Scheduled Monuments or Category A Listed Buildings within the proposed development area, and that no part of the proposed development lies within a Garden and Designed Landscape.
 - Identified three Scheduled Monuments (Balvenie Castle, Index no 90023; Mortlach Battle Stone, Index no 350; Wood of Furhead Settlement and field system, Index no 3685; Cauddwell Castle, Index no 2505; Arndilly House, Index no, 348 and Rothes Castle, Index no, 2455) and two Listed Buildings (Drummuir Castle, HB number 2296; Kinnivie House, HB number 15862; Mortlach Parish Church, HB number 15864; Aberlour House east lodge, HB number 2352; Aberlour House, west lodge, HB number 2353; Aberlour House, HB number 2349; St Margarets Episcopal Church HB number 20872 and Victoria Bridge over the River Spey, HB number 20873) which lie in the vicinity of the proposed development area and which should be considered as part of the impact assessment.
 - Confirmed that there are also a number of other Scheduled Monuments, Category A
 Listed Buildings, and Gardens and Designed Landscapes in the vicinity of the proposed
 wind farm and requested that any significant impacts upon these assets and any other
 wider areas should be considered in the ES. They recommended that such analysis
 should contain appropriate visualisations such as photomontages and wireframe views
 of the development in relation to the sites and their settings, illustrating views towards,
 and if possible from, the proposed development.
- A reply was received from the Aberdeenshire Council archaeology service (18/09/09) who:
 - Agreed that the 10km radius for identification of key external historic environmental receptors is acceptable and requested that this assessment is informed by a Zone of Theoretical Visibility (ZTV) model.
 - Identified Little Conval prehistoric Hillfort (SMR no. NJ23NE0006) and Knock of Allachie hut circles and cremation cemetery (SMR no. NJ24SE0002), considered to be of regional importance and requested that these be considered as part of the impact assessment.
 - Provided, in digital GIS format information on all sites held in the SMR within the proposed wind farm area and those within 500m of the proposed wind farm boundary.
 - Stated that appropriate archaeological mitigation should be included in the EIA chapter

- A reply was received from the Moray Planning Officer (16/10/09) who:
 - Identified ten Category B Listed Buildings, Drummuir Castle, Gate Lodge (Index no. 2297); Drummuir Castle Home Farm Steading Index no. 2298); Kirkton House (Index no. 2299); Botriphnie Primary School (Index no. 2300); Drummuir Mains House (Index no. 2301); Drummuir Tollhouse (Index no. 2302); Botriphnie Parish Church and Burial Ground (Index no. 4283); Hazelwood (Index no. 15861); Kinnivie House Dovecot (Index no. 15863), and Tullich House (Index no. 15866) all of regional importance and which should be considered as part of the impact assessment.
 - Confirmed that there are no Conservation Areas within 10km of the proposed wind farm.
- 29 Up-to-date information was obtained from appropriate sources on the locations and extents of cultural heritage sites with statutory protection and non-statutory designations either within the proposed development area or within a 10km radius of it. The following data was obtained:
 - Details of the locations and extents of Scheduled Monuments, Listed Buildings and Historic Gardens and Designed Landscapes were obtained from the Historic Scotland GIS download website (http://hsewsf.sedsh.gov.uk). Additional information was provided on known archaeological sites and monuments from Aberdeenshire Council Sites and Monuments Record (SMR). The data was provided in digital GIS format.
 - Information on the character and condition of known archaeological sites and monuments within the proposed development site was obtained from the online National Monuments Record of Scotland (NMRS) Pastmap resources maintained by the Royal Commission on the Ancient and Historic Monuments of Scotland (RCAHMS)(HTTP://JURA.RCAHMS.GOV.UK/pastmap/START.JSP). The information obtained from this site has been augmented by further desk-based research and field survey.
 - Information on the locations and extent of Conservation Areas and other historic townscape designations was obtained from the Local Plans.
 - Ordnance Survey maps and other historical maps held by the Map Library of the National Library of Scotland were examined, to provide information on sites of potential archaeological significance and on the historic land-use development of the proposed development area.
 - An assessment was made of vertical aerial photograph collections held by The Royal Commission on the Ancient and Historical Monuments of Scotland (RCAHMS). Sorties dating from 1946 - 1988 were examined.
 - Bibliographic references were consulted to provide background and historical information. No attempt was made within the remit of this study to conduct detailed historical analysis
 - The online Historic Land-Use Assessment for Scotland, maintained by the RCAHMS (www.rcahms. gov.uk) was consulted for information on the historic land use character of the proposed development area.
 - The Scottish Palaeoenvironmental Database (SPAD) (http://xweb.geos.ed.ac.uk/#ajn/spad), which records the distribution of known sites across Scotland, was consulted for information on palaeoenvironmental data within or adjacent to the proposed development area.

A list of all sources consulted during the assessment is provided at the end of this Report.

Reconnaissance field survey

- A walk-over reconnaissance field survey was undertaken of the proposed wind farm area, areas of dense conifer plantation were not surveyed, with the following aims:
 - To assess the presence/absence, character and condition of the sites, monuments and landscape features identified by the desk-based assessment.
 - To identify any further features of cultural heritage interest not detected from the deskbased studies.
 - To assess the topography and geomorphology of the proposed wind farm area for its potential to contain buried remains of other archaeological sites and features.
- Walk-over reconnaissance field was not carried out in areas of dense conifer plantation.
- 33 Site locations were recorded using a Differential Global Positioning System (GPS). The grid references thus provided are accurate to 1m or less. No intrusive archaeological interventions have been carried out as part of this assessment.

Assessment of importance of cultural heritage features

- Archaeological and built heritage sites and features represent a non-renewable resource that are often fragile and suffer from constant attrition, from both natural and human causes. The relative importance of cultural heritage resources is summarised in Table 1. The importance of cultural heritage resources are assessed according to the criteria published in SHEP and SPP 23.
- The main thresholds of archaeological importance defined in SPP 23 are sites of national importance, protected by statute, and sites with non-statutory designations of regional or local importance.
- 36 Sites of national importance comprise those sites protected by scheduling under the 1979 Act, and sites of "schedulable quality". Scheduling is an ongoing process and not all sites of schedulable quality are currently scheduled.
- Sites of regional or local importance are those that do not merit scheduling, but which have significance within a regional or local context. This may, for example, apply to their importance to regional or local history, or they may be the only local example of a monument type. A final category in Table 1, sites of lesser importance, covers those archaeological or historic environment features that are of little intrinsic cultural heritage value and the find-spots of artefacts now removed.
- Listed Buildings are categorised according to their relative importance (1997 Act; Section 1; SHEP) Category A Listed Buildings are of national or international importance. Category B Listed buildings are of regional or more than local importance and Category C(S) Listed structures are of local importance. Historic Gardens and Designed Landscapes listed in the Inventory of Gardens and Designed Landscapes in Scotland are considered to be nationally important.
- Table 1 summarises the relative importance of key cultural heritage resources.

BASELINE CONDITIONS AND ANALYSIS OF IMPORTANCE

General

- Thirty-two sites of cultural heritage interest have been identified within the proposed development area. Appendix 1 provides detailed gazetteer information on the character and baseline condition of each site and Figure 1 shows their locations and extents.
- Numbers in brackets in the following text, refer to site numbers provided on Figure 1 and Figure 2, and in Appendix 1.

Cultural heritage resources within the proposed development area

- There are no Scheduled Monuments and no Listed Buildings present within the proposed development area (Figure 1) and no part of the proposed development area lies within a Conservation Area or Historic Garden and Designed Landscape.
- The NMRS and Aberdeenshire Council SMR contain records for twenty-seven sites and monuments within the proposed wind farm area, relating to crofts or farmsteads (1 27).
- Examination of cartographic sources provided further information on the farmsteads and led to the identification of two additional sites and monuments within the proposed development area. These are a school (32) and a series of field boundaries (30) and tracks (31) which no longer survive within the study area.
- No further sites were identified from examination of aerial photographs.
- Field survey provided information on the baseline condition of the sites identified through desk-based assessment and identified two further sites, two field banks (28, 29).

Character of Cultural Heritage Resource

The cultural heritage resources identified by the baseline study, is divided into chronological groups, each of which exerts varying degrees of influence over the character of the current landscape.

Medieval and later rural settlement sites

Farmsteads and other buildings

- Twenty-seven farmsteads (1–27) are recorded within the proposed development area. Torbay (7) and Brawlands (6) are first depicted on Roy's Military Survey map (1747-55), although Brawlands is annotated Brelaws. The remainder of the sites are first shown on the Ordnance Survey 1872 edition map, suggesting a mid to late 19th century date. The Ordnance Survey depicts each farmstead within improved, formally, laid out fields (30), linking each farmstead by series of tracks (31). The farmsteads are still depicted on the Ordnance Survey 1905 edition map, although some (1, 2, 15, 18, 20, 24) are depicted as unroofed or have been removed. Approximately half of the farmsteads still survive as upstanding remains; many currently sit within rough pasture and have been preserved *in situ*. The remaining farmsteads appear to have been removed, the sites of which currently lie within pasture or agricultural fields. It is probable these farmsteads have destroyed by modern agricultural processes, but associated buried remains may still be preserved as buried archaeology. Torbay (7) still survives as a working farm but Brawlands (6) is now a domestic residence.
- A school (32) is first depicted on the Ordnance Survey 1905 edition map, perhaps replacing the previous school (SMR no: NJ34SE0066) depicted outside the study area. The school and schoolhouse (32) also still survives but are currently not lived in.
- Two field banks (28, 29) were recorded by field survey and are indicative of 19th century land improvement initiatives.

Assessment of importance of cultural heritage sites and features

- Using the criteria detailed above in Paragraphs 33-38 and Table 1, the final column in Appendix 1 indicates the importance of each cultural heritage site, identified by the baseline study, within the proposed wind farm area.
- There are no cultural heritage features considered to be of international, national or regional importance within the proposed development area.
- Thirteen sites and features are considered to be of local importance. These are the sites of former farmsteads or crofts (4, 6, 7, 11, 12, 15–21, 23 and 32) and a school and school house (32).
- Four sites and features are considered to be of lesser importance. These are two field banks (28 and 29), field boundaries (30) and a series of tracks (31).
- Fifteen cultural heritage sites and features (1–3, 5, 8–10, 13, 14, 22, 24-27) are considered to be of unknown importance. No upstanding remains of these sites survive but there is potential for buried remains to survive. If buried remains do survive these sites are likely to be of no more than local importance.

Assessment of archaeological potential of the proposed development area as a whole

- The majority of the cultural heritage features identified by this study relate to a 19th century rural landscape, although cartographic evidence suggests that two farmstead (6, 7) may be earlier in date. Half of these sites and features are no longer present as upstanding remains, although some may survive preserved as buried remains. Twenty-seven of the farmsteads are recorded within the NMRS or SMR.
- Within the wider area, one possible prehistoric hut circle (NJ34NW 30) was recorded directly north of the study area. There is no other recorded prehistoric activity in the immediate vicinity of the proposed development but further remains of medieval and later rural settlement are present in the vicinity that are similar in size to the cultural heritage features recorded within proposed development area.
- The application site has not been extensively developed. Cartographic evidence indicates that the field layout has changed little over the last 150 years and suggests that the majority of it has been under cultivation since the mid 19th century. The farmsteads, depicted on Ordnance Survey maps (1872 and 1905 Editions), are enclosed within improved rectilinear fields. Today the site is roughly split into two distinct landscapes. The more south western parts of the landscape currently contain crops or are pasture fields. Farmsteads recorded within this area are no longer visible as upstanding remains, although associated buried remains may still survive. Torbay (7) and Brawlands (6) survive as a working farm and domestic residences. The remaining part of the study area (the proposed turbine area) is now generally overgrown with high grasses, although some parts are still used for rough pasture. The badly drained land has resulted in the majority of the historic farmsteads surviving in situ as upstanding remains, although many now survive as low relief remains. Tracks and field boundaries depicted on the Ordnance Survey 1st Edition are no longer visible as surface traces, but associated buried remains may still survive.
- Given the lack of prehistoric sites recorded in the wind farm area, and the recorded remains of only one prehistoric site within the vicinity of the study area, it is considered that the potential for as yet, undetected buried remains and sites, of a prehistoric date, is low. However, it is considered likely that hitherto undiscovered remains of a medieval or later date are present within the proposed development area.

Key receptors within 10km of the proposed development

- Within a 10km radius of the proposed development there are eight Scheduled Monuments one of which is also a Category A Listed Building; sixteen other Category A Listed Buildings; 85 Category B Listed Buildings, and 58 Category C(S) Listed Buildings.
- Historic Scotland identified fifteen key receptors in the vicinity of the development which should be included within the Impact Assessment. These are:

• Drummuir Castle (HB Number 2296)

- Kinnivie House (HB Number 15862)
- Mortlack parish church watch house and burial ground (HB Number 15864)
- Aberlour House, east lodge, gatepiers and gates (HB Number 2352)
- Aberlour House, west lodge, gatepiers and gates (HN Number 2353)
- Aberlour House and terrace (Aberlour House Prep School) (HB Number 2349)
- St Margaret's Episcopal church and burial ground (HB Number 20872)
- Victoria Bridge over River Spey (HB Number 20873)
- In addition to these sites the Aberdeenshire Council Archaeologist and the Moray Council Planning Officer highlighted 12 sites, considered to be of regional importance, which they requested should be considered within the Impact Assessment. These are:
 - Drummuir Castle, Gate Lodge (Index no. 2297);
 - Drummuir Castle Home Farm Steading Index no. 2298);
 - Kirkton House (Index no. 2299);
 - Botriphnie Primary School (Index no. 2300);
 - Drummuir Mains House (Index no. 2301);
 - Drummuir Tollhouse (Index no. 2302);
 - Botriphnie Parish Church and Burial Ground (Index no. 4283);
 - Hazelwood (Index no. 15861);
 - Kinnivie House Dovecot (Index no. 15863)
 - Tullich House (Index no. 15866)
 - Little Conval prehistoric Hillfort (SMR no. NJ23NE0006)
 - Knock of Allachie hut circles and cremation cemetery (SMR no. NJ24SE0002),
- The initial key receptor distribution map (Figure 3) indicates that the majority of Listed Buildings lie within established townscapes (such as Dufftown and Charlestown of Aberlour) and their settings are unlikely to be affected by the proposed development.
- The Category A Listed Drummuir Castle (and associated buildings) lies in close proximity to and south-east of the proposed wind farm, although the development is likely to be at least partly screened visually by natural topography.
- In most other cases the setting of receptors within the wider area are unlikely to be significantly affected by the proposed development, although this will be confirmed by the ZTV for the fixed design.
- Photomontages from a selection of sites in the wider landscape would aid both the assessment and the representation of the visual impact on these sites, including in particular cumulative effects from this development in combination with other wind farms in the vicinity. The locations of photomontages should be agreed with Historic Scotland following the development of the final layout.

CONSTRAINTS

- Potential effects have been assessed with reference to the proposed wind turbine layout as shown on Figure 1. All upstanding remains of cultural heritage features should remain insitu. The current layout of the proposed wind farm will not directly affect cultural heritage sites recorded within the wind farm area. However the following issues should be taken into consideration
 - The close proximity of Turbine 3 to site (20). It is recommended that the turbine base is microsited further south.
 - A potential access track between Turbines 1 and 2 may directly affect site (17). This site should be avoided by the development.

- Any further design features, such as access tracks or borrow pits should take into consideration the current location of cultural heritage sites and avoid them where possible.
- All cultural heritage features, currently surviving as upstanding remains, should remain *in situ* and should be avoided where possible.
- Allow for the mircositing of design features, should cultural heritage features be identified during further, invasive archaeological investigations.
- Drummuir Castle may be indirectly affected by the wind farm. It is recommended that a
 photomontage be produced from this property, to inform the effect assessment, to be
 presented in the cultural heritage EIA chapter.
- In accordance with national and regional planning policy and guidance, the preferred option for mitigation is preservation of important remains *in situ* where practicable and by record where preservation is not possible. The Aberdeenshire Council archaeologist specified in his consultation response that the council would expect to see appropriate archaeological mitigation for ground-breaking works within the EIA's recommendations for Cultural Heritage.

CONCLUSION

- A desk-based assessment and reconnaissance walk-over field survey have been carried out over the whole of the proposed Torbay wind farm development area. This study has identified thirty-two sites of cultural heritage interest within the proposed development area, predominately 19th century rural farmsteads and associated features. Wherever possible, upstanding elements of the historic environment should be retained within the development design.
- Within the vicinity of the proposed development, assessment of recorded archaeological remains has revealed scarce evidence of prehistoric activity, but has indicated (by the density of later rural farmsteads) that the potential remains relating to a medieval or later rural landscape date to be present within the proposed development area to be high.
- Potential constraints on the proposed development have been highlighted and mitigation recommendations have been made.
