1. INTRODUCTION

1.1 General

This report presents the results of an archaeological watching brief undertaken by CFA Archaeology Ltd (CFA) on 13th April 2011 at Whitslaid Farm, Lauder, Scottish Borders (NGR: NT 5647 4470) (Fig. 1). The work was commissioned by Maden Design and Build.

A Written Scheme of Investigation (WSI) dated 12 April 2011 for this programme of works was produced by CFA on behalf of Maden Design and Build. The WSI was designed to meet the requirements of the Scottish Borders Council Archaeology Officer.

1.2 Background

Planning consent (Ref No. 10/01382/FUL) has been granted for the construction of two 30kw wind turbines; the planning consent was subject to a condition requiring a programme of archaeological works.

The proposed turbine locations are located on the eastern side of Whitslaid Farm and lie c.300m to the east of the scheduled area associated with Whitslaid Tower (SAM No. 8880). Other archaeological remains identified within the area include NT54SE.32 a sub-circular settlement identified as a crop mark from oblique aerial photography, and NT54SE.26, a worked flint currently in the collection of the National Museum of Scotland.

No previous invasive archaeological fieldwork is known to have taken place within the proposed development site prior to the archaeological watching brief.

1.3 Objectives

The objectives of the project were

- To conduct an appropriate programme of archaeological investigation (Watching Brief) to monitor the excavation of ground breaking that is required.
- to mitigate the effects of construction on any archaeological deposits or features identified, through excavation and recording and production of a report.

2. WORKING METHODS

2.1 General

CFA Archaeology Ltd follows the Institute for Archaeologists' Code of Conduct, Standards and Guidance.

2.1 Watching Brief

A watching brief was conducted during the removal of topsoil from the areas of the two wind turbine bases.

All groundbreaking work was carried out under constant archaeological supervision. All further excavation required to fulfil the objectives of the watching brief was carried out by hand.

The stratification of all excavation areas was recorded, whether or not significant archaeological deposits were identified.

3. ARCHAEOLOGICAL RESULTS

The two turbines were to be situated next to the farm track which exits Whitslaid Farm and travels east into the adjacent fields (Fig. 1). The northern field is pasture while the southern field was under a crop.








Fig. 2 Turbine Base 1 from the north

Two trenches for the turbine bases, each measuring 5.4m by 5.4m, were dug by a tracked mini digger using a flat bladed ditching bucket. The topsoil was removed under constant archaeological supervision exposing pink/orange sandy gravel natural geology (Fig. 2-3).

The removal of the topsoil exposed the natural subsoil, and no deposits or artefacts of archaeological significance were identified.

4. CONCLUSIONS

An archaeological watching brief was carried out at Whitslaid Farm, Lauder during construction works associated with the erection of two wind turbines.

No archaeological features were uncovered and no further works are recommended.

The project archive, comprising all CFA record sheets, maps and reports will be deposited with the National Monuments Record of Scotland (NMRS) and copies of reports will be lodged with the Scottish Borders Council.

A summary statement of the results of this evaluation will be submitted for publication in *Discovery and Excavation in Scotland* (Appendix 2).




