

Description of works.					
The excavation of two tree pits was monitored during construction of a new paved area and landscaping within the rear courtyard of The Mansion, Fore Street, Totnes (Figs 1-2). The Mansion House was rebuilt in 1797 and is on the site of a 17th-century property, orchard and chapel. The site (no. 36 Fore Street) is located within one of the medieval burgage plots on the south side of Fore Street. An archaeological evaluation undertaken prior to the construction of a nursery at the rear of the site identified evidence for activity from the 11th century to the present day.					
Tree pit 1 This pit measured 1m by 0.9m by 0.35m deep. Natural subsoil was encountered at a depth of 0.17m directly below the modern tarmac surface. No archaeological features or deposits were exposed.					
Tree pit 2  This pit measured 1.5m by 1.7m. A large late 19 <sup>th-</sup> or 20 <sup>th</sup> -century water tank was encountered below 0.15m of modern crushed tarmac overburden, and was partially exposed within the trench. It measured 2.5m long (N/S) by 1.3m wide (E/W), and was built of slate slabs bonded with grey mortar that had been constructed into the natural. The tank was capped by large slates, measuring 1.55m long by 0.40m wide by 0.06m deep bonded in clay. In the southwest corner it was fed by two ceramic pipes and a lead pipe.					
Summary Other than the water tank, no archaeological features or deposits were exposed. It is clear that this part of the property has been heavily landscaped in the 20th century with only substantial cut features surviving.





Fig. 1: Site location







#### a) Plan of water tank



#### b) Section through tank








