Description of works

An archaeological watching brief was undertaken by AC archaeology on behalf of the owner Mr Bent during groundworks for a new detached dwelling at the rear of Priory Cottage, 13a Gravel Lane, Cullompton. The archaeological works were required as a condition of planning permission by Mid Devon District Council, following consultation with the Devon County Council Historic Environment Team.

The site lies on ground sloping gently to the south at a height of approximately 50m aOD. The underlying solid geology comprises Permian Sandstone of the Cadbury Breccia Formation overlain by Quaternary colluvium.

Archaeological background

The principal archaeological interest in the site is that it lies within the historic core of Cullompton (Devon Historic Environment Record ref. MDV71719). The church may have been a focus of early settlement and is thought to be on the site of an earlier minster church (MDV54301). Within the town to the north and northwest of the church, evidence for prehistoric, Roman military and Romano-British activity has also been discovered.

The aim of the archaeological monitoring and recording was to preserve by record any archaeological features or deposits exposed during groundworks associated with the project, with particular reference to the potential for historic settlement remains.


Fig.1: Location of site

Results (Figs 1 and 2; Plates 1 and 2)

Groundworks comprised the levelling of the site and excavation of trenches for the footings of the dwelling and for a revetment wall to the rear (the north side) of the proposed dwelling. The foundation trenches measured up to 0.85m wide by up to 1.10m deep. In patches at the north end of the site the natural was reached at 0.35m below the levelled ground surface, but the natural dropped steeply to the south where it was not encountered until 1.10m below the former ground surface.

The following soil sequence was recorded: a topsoil (context 001), measuring up to 0.40m thick, comprising greyish-brown silty-loam with rare modern artefacts (none of which were retained), below which was a subsoil (002), measuring between 0.30m and 0.70m thick, consisting of brownish-grey silty-loam. In the northern part of the site a further layer (003), measuring 0.23m thick and consisting of pale yellowish silty-sand and pebbles, possibly representing a naturally-derived colluvium. The underlying natural (004) consisted of light red and pale orange gravels.

A shallow ditch (F005) orientated north-south and measuring 0.8m wide by 0.41m deep was exposed towards the west end of the levelling scarp and revetment wall trench cutting into layer 003. It had shallow sloping sides and rounded base with a single fill (006) consisting of a clean grey silty-loam with no finds. The orientation follows the slope and it is probably a drainage ditch, although a boundary ditch cannot be ruled out since it also matches the orientation of the historic field boundaries. It appears to have a naturally accumulated fill.


Summary




