Introduction

Archaeological monitoring and recording was carried out by AC Archaeology during ground works associated with the construction of two new barns on land at Cutwellcombe Fam, Avonwick, South Brent, Devon (SX 6943 5853).

The site lay 1.8km to the west of Avonwick, 1km southwest of South Brent and some 350m northwest of Cutwellcombe Farm (Fig 1). It comprised the southern corner of a wider rectangular pasture plot occupied by an existing agricultural building and yard (Plate 1). The site of the proposed new buildings lay at 164m aOD (above Ordnance Datum) on ground that sloped gradually towards the northwest. The underlying solid geology comprised slates of the Middle Devonian Slates Formation (British Geological Survey Online Viewer).

The site was 150m to the south of, and positioned on the same topographic ridge as, a hilltop enclosure at Yellowberries Copse, also known as Turtley Hill Fort, which is a Scheduled Monument (Heritage England List for England ref. 1019325).

Description of works

The monitored groundworks consisted of the bulk reduction of topsoil within the footprints of the two new buildings. For Building 1; this comprised a 1.2m wide strip alongside an existing concrete yard surface, which was retained in situ (Plate 2); while for Building 2, this involved the stripping of a rectangular area measuring approximately 15m by 20m (Plate 3).

Both areas were excavated onto natural subsoil, which comprised a mid brownish-red silty-clay with common slate inclusions. This was exposed at a depth of between 0.14m and 0.23m below existing levels and was overlain by a mid grevish-brown silty-loam topsoil.

No archaeological features or deposits were exposed and no finds were recovered.


Discussion


