#### Introduction

An archaeological trench evaluation was carried out by AC archaeology ahead of construction of four dwellings within the former Nat West Bank Car Park, Belle View, Holsworthy, Devon (Fig. 1; Plate 1). The site is located within the centre of Holsworthy, with Belle View to the south and Fore Street to the west. It was until recently an asphalt-covered former car park, lying on generally level ground at around 140m aOD (above Ordnance Datum). The underlying solid geology comprises sandstone of the Bude Formation (British Geological Survey Online Viewer 2019).

The site is situated within the historic core of the town, with a settlement recorded at Holsworthy in the Domesday Survey of 1086, indicating pre-medieval origins. It is situated to the rear of what appear to be burgage plots fronting onto Fore Street, with therefore the potential for associated settlement and small-scale industrial activity in the form of buildings, rubbish pits, former property boundaries etc.

#### Results

The archaeological works consisted of the machine-excavation of three trial trenches, totalling 34m long by 1.5m wide, which were excavated across the footprint of the proposed terrace of buildings and the rear gardens (Fig. 1). Prior to the evaluation a stone-lined well with collapsed slate cap had been exposed during preparation of the site and its position was mapped and photographed although it could not be recorded in detail as it was deemed unsafe (Fig. 1; Plate 2).

The evaluation trenches comprised:

*Trench 1* was aligned north-south and measured 14m long by 1.5m wide. It was excavated to a depth of 1m partly into natural (103) which was composed of light yellow clay. The overlying deposits were all modern comprising largely of made ground containing pieces of brick and modern china (not retained).


*Trench 2* was aligned northeast-southwest and measured 10m long by 1.5m wide. It was excavated to a depth of 0.9m partly into natural (202) which was composed of light yellow clay. The overlying deposits were all modern comprising of made ground containing pieces of brick and modern china (not retained).


*Trench 3* was aligned northeast-southwest and measured 10m long by 1.5m wide. It was excavated to a depth of 1.1m partly into natural (302) which was composed of light yellow clay. The overlying deposits were all modern comprising of made ground containing pieces of brick and modern china (not retained).

#### Comments

The results from the evaluation show that the site has been subject to significant levelling and filling to create hard standing in modern times, probably within the second half of the 20th century when the area was converted to car parking. With the exception of the deep well, it is probable that any archaeological remains that had been present were removed during this process. No finds of pre-modern date were present and the modern finds were not retained. The well is marked on the first edition Ordnance Survey map dated 1885.

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




Plate 1: General view of the site looking east, with the well in the foreground (1m scale)
