#### Introduction (Fig. 1)

An archaeological trial trench evaluation was undertaken ahead groundworks associated with the construction of an new agricultural storage building and the extension of an existing agricultural building was undertaken by AC archaeology on land at Red Linhay, Crown Hill, Halberton, Devon (SS 9949 1280 and SS 9968 1279). Red Linhay lies to the west of Halberton, on land to the southwest of Crown Hill Road and south of Post Hill. The site comprises Red Linhay farmhouse to the west, with an anaerobic digester plant and agricultural barns to the east. It lies on ground that slopes down to the northwest between 92m and 87m aOD.

The site is situated in an area containing extensive evidence for prehistoric activity. This includes the plot to the northwest of the site, where two ring ditches have been interpreted from a geophysical survey. Both are likely to represent the sites of former barrows. Subsequent evaluation of one of these exposed a corresponding 3.6m wide ditch from which Neolithic pottery and a worked chert flake were recovered. Archaeological trial trenching associated with the construction of the existing biodigester and monitoring of groundworks during the construction of a barn to the north recovered a small quantity of worked flints and prehistoric pottery (MDV119413 and MDV111019).

#### Results (Fig. 1; Plates 1-4)

The trial trench evaluation comprised the machine-excavation of six trenches totalling 90m in length and with each trench measuring 1.8m wide. Trenches 1-4 were located within a pasture plot to the southeast and Trenches 5-6 to the northwest within an orchard area.

Natural subsoil, which consisted of a mid-red loamy sand with gravel inclusions, was exposed in Trenches 1-4 at a depth of between 0.4m (Trench 1) and 0.58m (Trench 3) below existing levels. It was overlain by a mid-reddish-brown silty loam subsoil and a mid-brown silty loam topsoil. In Trenches 5 and 6, the natural subsoil was present at between 0.52m and 0.6m below subsoil and topsoil. No archaeological features or deposits were exposed. A small number of amorphous vegetation hollows were present in Trenches 5 and 6. These were all investigated. No finds were recovered.

#### Comments


The investigations exposed only a simple soil sequence overlying the natural subsoil in each of the trial trenches. Despite the nearby prehistoric activity, no further evidence for this was exposed by these investigations.
