#### Introduction

An archaeological watching brief was carried out on behalf of Mr D. Collacott during groundworks associated with the construction of a single dwelling on land to the rear of Cormelles, Victoria Street, Combe Martin, Devon (Fig. 1a). The site lies within the garden area to the rear of the existing house on ground that slopes gently down to the south and the River Umber. It is located within the historic core of Combe Martin, with a settlement established here during the medieval period. Lead and silver mining has been undertaken in the area since the late 13th century.

#### Methodology

The groundworks were carried out in two stages. First, the removal of topsoil was monitored for an area measuring approximately 9m long by 8m wide and to a depth of between 0.35m and 0.5m. This was not to a sufficient depth to establish the presence/absence of buried archaeological remains, so monitoring then took place during the excavation of three external strip footings for the dwelling (see Fig. 1b).

#### Results

The recorded layer sequence for the site is set out in Table 1 and shown on Fig. 1c. No archaeological features or deposits were exposed and finds were recovered from the topsoil only. The lower layers recorded are alluvial and likely to have been formed as a result of the site's proximity to the River Umber.

The finds assemblage is small with very limited potential (Table 2). It includes three fragments of plain clay pipe stem, one fragment from an interlocking roof tile of 19th-20th century date and six sherds of 18th/19th century pottery. The pottery includes North Devon Coarsewares (coarse quartz temper) with dark brown glaze and a single sherd in a pale fired inclusion-free fabric with clear glaze.


