Description

There is a quarry to the north-west of Giggleswick Scar. It is c.60m long and c.5m wide and is formed by a near vertical quarry face up to 4m in height, orientated north-west/south-east and with low spread soil banks on the down slope side. No obvious tool or other working marks were visible on the face [1].

The site may be associated with the construction of the Keighley to Kendal turnpike road after 1853. This followed the line of the modern A65 close to the site of the quarry and was constructed by improving the route of an existing lane [2] [3].

Description:

A cave to the north-west of Giggleswick Scar is c.2.0m high and c.1.5m wide. It is located beneath a limestone outcrop and appears to have been created by water running over the top of the outcrop. It was not examined in detail but it is accessed by a tall narrow entrance leading onto an interior space c.3m long. The ground level of the interior is partially rubble choked and slopes steeply towards the back of the cave [1].

Although the cave is a natural feature, it is possible that it may have been occupied at some point, possibly as a temporary shelter. No evidence of this was visible at the time of the site visit, but may be revealed by more detailed examination [2].

Description:

There is a small sub-rectangular enclosure to the north-west of Giggleswick Scar. It measures c.10m long and c.8m wide, is possibly D-shaped, and is orientated north-east/south-west. It is located within an area of limestone pavement and the west side is formed by a limestone outcrop. The enclosure walls are represented by low spread banks of angular limestone rubble, apparently the remains of collapsed walls, c.1.0m wide and up to c.0.2m high [1].

The age of the enclosure is unknown, but it may be associated with other prehistoric features (Sites 4 and 5) to the east [2].

Description:

There is an enclosure to the north-west of Giggleswick Scar. It is sub-rectangular in plan and orientated east-west, and measures c.20m long and c.10m wide. The walls are formed by low, grassed-over banks, c.0.1m high and 0.5m wide. The south wall curves around to the north at its east end, whilst the west end of the enclosure appears to be open [1].

The RCHME Yorkshire Dales Project recorded the site as an enclosure of unknown prehistoric date, apparently associated with a hut circle in the same location [2].

The function and date of the enclosure is unclear, although it may form part of a small settlement including the hut circle (Site 5) to the north [3].

Description:

There is a possible hut circle, possibly two, and associated features to the north-west of Giggleswick Scar. The hut circle is oval in plan, c.3m by c.2.4m, and is delineated by spread limestone rubble walls, 0.1m high and 0.3m wide. A short distance to the south-east is a shallow depression of similar dimensions, containing the remains of very low drystone walls, which probably form another hut circle. A small sub-rectangular feature to the east may also be a structure of some kind. To the east of this group, there may be a sub-square enclosure, c.20m in length and width, marked by very spread boundary banks. However, it may just be a natural feature [1].

The RCHME Yorkshire Dales Project recorded the site as a hut circle of unknown prehistoric date, apparently associated with an enclosure in the same location [2].

The site may form part of a small prehistoric settlement, perhaps of a temporary nature and may be associated with Sites 3 and 4 to the south and south-west [3].

Description:

There are quarries and a ruined structure to the north-west of Giggleswick Scar covering an area of c.20m by c.10m. The quarries are represented by three shallow and irregularly-shaped depressions, the largest of which is c.8m long and c.5m wide. All three contain low piles of small flat angular limestone pieces. One depression contains a small ruined sub-rectangular structure, c.2.5m long by c.1.5m wide, formed by drystone walls standing to a maximum height of 0.5m. There are no indications of a roof, or any internal fittings [1]. Neither the quarries or the shelter are depicted on the early OS maps of the area [2] [3].

The quarries are shallow workings taking advantage of a natural limestone outcrop. The shallow piles of stone indicate that some preparation and/or storage of the quarried stone took place on the site, and the ruined structure may be the remains of a small shelter. Whilst the quarrying may be post-medieval in date, perhaps for the repair of the surrounding field walls, it is possible that they represent activity from an earlier period. The precise location of the features is difficult to determine within the large enclosure [4].

Description:

The RCHME Yorkshire Dales Project record an enclosure of unknown prehistoric date to the north-west of Giggleswick Scar, at SD80306587 [1]. The enclosure could not be located at the time of the site visit, although the site almost coincides with a fairly large cairn represented by a grass-covered mound c.7m in diameter and c.1m high at SD80296588. There is some disturbance in the central area which may result from rabbit activity. There is also a small similar mound c.10m to the north, c.5m in diameter and c.0.5m high with what appears to be short length of curving bank running for c.10m away to the north-east; this might be the enclosure recorded by the RCHME. The tussocky nature of the grass in this general area makes it difficult to identify the full extent of the site(s), and the precise locations of the features are difficult to determine within the large enclosure [2].

The RCHME Yorkshire Dales Project recorded part of a co-axial field system in this area, formed principally of two parallel north-west/south-east orientated boundaries set c.150m apart. The southern of the two boundaries is represented by two converging linear features in the approximate centre of the large modern enclosure; the north boundary is described as Site 96. The bank extends beyond the survey area. The field system was classified as of unknown prehistoric date [1]. A bank is partially visible in the distance on an aerial photograph taken in 1988 [2].

A faint intermittent bank in places c.0.3m high and c.1.0m wide and extending for only part of the c.300m length as shown by the Yorkshire Dales Project was identified, but it should be noted that the alignment as shown on the AP plot also coincides with a line of outcropping limestone [3].

Description:

The RCHME Yorkshire Dales Project recorded a cairn of unknown prehistoric date at this location, at the south end of a north-south orientated boundary [1]. The features are visible on an aerial photograph taken in 1988 [2].

The cairn survives as a well preserved and quite prominent, grass-covered, c.1m high ovate mound on the brow of a small promontory, measuring c.7m east-west and c.5m north-south. There is also a central depression c.0.7m in diameter and c.0.3m deep, which might suggest some previous disturbance, but no stone is immediately obvious. Description:

There is a large cairn to the north-east of Giggleswick Scar, just to the north of the present footpath (Site 19). It is represented by a continuous low spread bank, c.1.5m-2.0m wide and 0.5m high, and containing some stone. This outer bank encloses an c.19m diameter area of flat ground which has a small sub-circular mound in the centre, c.3.0m diameter and 0.2m high. Named as a "tumulus" on the OS 1909 edition, and as a "cairn" on the modern map [6] [7]. Scheduled as an Ancient Monument [8].

The presence of the bank and the size of the earthwork suggests that the site is a burial mound rather than a clearance cairn. The depression in the central mound implies that it has been deliberately disturbed, possibly by antiquarians in the 18th or 19th centuries, although there are no records of such [9]. This is probably the site identified by King as a pond barrow, and forming part of a larger cairn cemetery centred on SD805664 [10].

Description:

A trackway and holloway runs from the south of Little Stainforth to the north of Giggleswick Scar. It leaves the west side of Stainforth Lane and then runs south-west towards High Barn. It then follows a sinuous route across the area to the south-west, making use of gaps between natural areas of terracing, and is represented by a flattened linear terrace between 2m-4m wide. It then turns sharply to the west and runs westwards for c.120m as a shallow linear depression enclosed between two 1.5m high field walls. Beyond the enclosed section, the track begins to climb sharply to the north-west. There is a section of holloway, c.150m long in the steepest part, formed by a linear depression c.3.0m wide and up to c.2.5m deep; the depression has steeply sloping sides and a flat bottom, and this marks the original line - a more modern vehicular route runs to the south. Towards the top end there is a substantial rubble bank running along its eastern side, with another possible trackway to the east of the bank; these represent former alignments. The section of the trackway from High Barn to where it joins the footpath (Site 17) is in use as a public footpath, and this section is represented by a broad grassy line [1].

The route is marked in its entirety on the OS 1st edition 6" map [2]. The lower section, from Stainforth Lane to High Barn, is marked as "Cart Road" on the 1841 tithe map, and only this section is shown on the later OS maps [3] [4].

The track may be medieval or possibly earlier in date, as it appears to form a boundary for ridge and furrow (Site 58) to the north of High Barn, and it passes through the middle of a Romano-British settlement or farmstead (Site 45) [5].

Description

There is a well preserved shaft mound and associated features to the west of Borrins Wood. The shaft mound is well defined and is a circular depression c.4m wide and c.1.5m deep. Description

There is a large cairn to the north of Giggleswick Scar, formed by a sub-circular mound c.20m in diameter and c.1.5m high, and partly grassed-over and containing much stone. In the centre of the upper part of the cairn there is a sub-rectangular depression or cavity c.10m long by c.2m wide by c.0.6m deep. Within the depression there is a large flat limestone boulder, c.2.5m long by c.1m wide, set at an angle on one side. There appears to be some relatively recent disturbance [1].

This site is known as "Apron Full of Stones", and it was opened "many years ago" (written in 1784) when it was described as being 9 or 10 yards in diameter and 7 yards high. It was found to contain a stone cist (6ft 9ins long and 3ft broad), a skeleton, scattered human bones, an ivory disc and a tusk [2] [3]. The RCHME Yorkshire Dales Project record the site as a cairn of Bronze Age date whereas the NAR list it as a ring cairn. The NAR also note that a polished stone axe, c.1ft long and now housed in the Pig Yard Museum at Settle, reputedly came from this site [4] [5]. Shown as being defined by two circles on the OS 1st edition map, but not specifically named [6]. Named as a "tumulus" on the later editions, and depicted as a sub-oval mound measuring 24m north-east/south-west and 14m north-west/south-east with a central linear depression [7]. The modern OS map shows a 20m diameter circular stone-covered mound named as a "Cairn" [8]. Well shown on an aerial photograph taken in 1988 [9].

The size of the cairn and the large flat limestone slab within it suggest that it is a burial mound which once buried a stone cist or chamber. May be associated with an adjacent enclosure (see Site 47) and is set within a wider prehistoric landscape [10].

In the base of the depression are numerous sub-circular depressions, on average c.3m in diameter and up to c.1m deep [1].

The RCHME Yorkshire Dales Project recorded the site as a short shaft of unknown date and it was shown as a curving pair of parallel lines. A short boundary was also shown to the north of the feature but this was not visible in the field [2]. The rake is well shown on an aerial photograph taken in 1988 [3]. No features are shown on the historic maps of the area [4] [5].

In the absence of any evidence for any other metal mining in the immediate area, the site may have been working low grade coal for use in clamp kilns. Alternatively, it may be a trial excavation to test for the presence of minerals [6].

Description:

A pond, sub-rectangular in plan and c.20m long by c.8m wide, lies to the south-west of Riseber Wood. It contained water at the time of the site visit but is quite silted up. It is supplied from another pond immediately outside of the survey area, which is itself supplied from a walled-off spring. A c.350m long watercourse leaves the pond and runs south-east down the hillslope where it enters a small presumed sheep wash (Site 42). The lower part of this section of the watercourse is partially culverted, although some collapse has taken place. There is a former pond at the west end of the sheep wash, now represented by a boggy depression, and another extant pond on the south side (outside the survey area) may be associated.

After passing through the sheep wash, the watercourse runs along the north side of the field wall (also the township boundary) before passing through and onto the south side. It is then culverted under Stainforth Lane and runs into the river via "Robin Hood's Mill". A linear depression on the north side of the wall, c.2m deep and up to c.10m wide in places, together with a blocked culvert in the west side of the Stainforth Lane, suggests that the watercourse (or part of it) may originally have taken a slightly different alignment along the north side of the township wall [1] [2].

A spring is marked to the north of the pond on the OS 1st edition 6" map, and a later edition shows a "Dam" at the south end of the pond [3] [4]. A "dam" and three co-joined ponds are shown on the OS 1909 edition [5]. The 1841 tithe map marks the northern pond as "Limekiln and washfold" [6].

The cartographic evidence suggests that an existing spring was dammed at some point in the later 19th century to create the existing pond. The divergence in the watercourse in the east side of the survey area may be associated with the site of Robin Hood's Mill, which is shown on the east side of Stainforth Lane and of which nothing could be seen [7].

Description:

A series of four long linear banks can be identified in the field and on aerial photographs running west up the natural slope to the south of Riseber Wood, all with a general east-west or north-west/south-east orientation. The northern bank is represented by a spread rubble bank in its upper c.120m section, c.1.0m wide and c.0.3m high, while the remainder is an intermittent bank of similar dimensions [1]. The RCHME Yorkshire Dales Project recorded this feature as a field boundary of post-medieval date, presumably due to the presence of the stone [2].

A similarly aligned c.120m length of bank, running up to a natural outcrop and a later wall (Site 38) can also be seen on the aerial photographs, some c.60m to the south.

A third boundary runs some c.100m to the south, from the rear of some enclosures to the west of the Romano-British complex (Site 45/7), as far as wall 38; this is visible for over c.200m as an intermittent low earthwork typically c.0.5m high and c.1.0m wide [3].

The fourth and southern-most boundary was recorded by the RCHME Yorkshire Dales Project to the south-west of High Barn, as a north-west/south-east linear boundary of medieval date with a short offshoot on the north side [4]. Much of this runs through natural terracing and disturbed ground, and could not be positively identified for any significant length but lower sections are c.0.7m wide and c.0.3m high, and are partly disturbed by vehicle tracks [3].

Apart from the section which survives as the collapsed field wall, none of the boundaries are shown on any historic maps of the area [5]. However, they can all be seen in varying degrees on aerial photographs taken in 1966 and 1986, and the latter appears to show the northern bank extending south-east to join with elements of the Romano-British farmstead complex (Sites 45/3 and 45/4) [6] [7].

Taken together, the four banks seem likely to represent part of a co-axial field system running up to the west edge of the survey area. The association with the Romano-British field

system might suggest a similar date, although an earlier and/or later date could equally apply. It should also be noted that the extant field boundary running to the north of these banks has a similar alignment, and further banks running at right angles to lynchets to the north (see Site 59) may be part of the same system [8].

Description:

There is a stone-walled presumed sheepwash *c*.40m long and *c*.15m wide to the west of Borrins Wood, on the township boundary between Stainforth and Giggleswick; the site is actually just within Giggleswick. A watercourse (Site 37) enters the site from the west via a culvert through the field wall. Within the stone-walled enclosure, the footings of an L-shaped wall c.7m long and c.1m wide are visible, formed of quite large stones rising c.0.3m high. A large worked stone slab c.0.5m wide and c.1.5m long covers the presumed exit point, and an earthwork depression leads to a now walled-up culvert located just inside the north wall, just to the west of the modern wooden stile. The watercourse then runs east along the township boundary (see Site 37). The east end of the enclosure contains a former 2 stoop gate which has been blocked by a timber framed sheep creep, which itself has since been blocked with stones. An adjacent pond to the south (outside the survey area) is probably associated with the management of the water here [1].

The site is shown on all the historic maps of the area, but is not specifically named [2] [3]. The L-shaped footings probably represent the south side of the now silted up or infilled sheep wash, creating a dry route to allow stock to pass around the wash; this is the route now taken by the public footpath. The long tightly enclosed walled track to the west creates an impressive structure, and the whole complex is of some interest [4].

Description

There is an enclosure and farm buildings to the north-west of High Barn, forming part of a larger Romano-British farmstead complex (Site 45). The enclosure is oriented approximately north-south, is sub-rectangular in plan, and measures c.60m north-south by c.30m east-west. The north edge is defined by a mostly collapsed right-angled field wall, which may follow an earlier boundary. The east side is formed by a low east-facing lynchet which extends from an adjacent field system (see Site 59) and runs through a number of angular returns to the west; within the enclosure the lynchet contains a number of apparent quarry scoops or buildings, including one c.4m square platform, and there are two other internal curving banks which run off to the east. The west side of the enclosure continues the line of the collapsed field wall to the south, through a small wood, as a rather denuded and disturbed earthwork. The bank is more substantial immediately beyond the wood, and there is an entrance towards the south end. In the north-west corner of the enclosure, in the area enclosed by the field wall, there is a small enclosure c.12m long by c.7m wide which appears to contain a small rectangular building c.5m long by c.3m wide; both are defined by low spread banks c.1.0m wide and 0.3m high. There are also other regular flat-bottomed scoops and depressions in the eastern half of the main enclosure which might represent quarries or further structures [1].

The north walled enclosure is shown intact on maps dating from 1841, and it is called "Hagg Coppice" on the 1841 tithe map with the land use given as meadow [2]. It is shown as being wooded on the OS 2nd edition map, but is not on later editions [3] [4]. The earthworks are not really visible on an aerial photograph taken in 1986 due to the tree shadow, but some elements can be seen on an aerial view taken in 1966 [5] [6].

The earthworks (and possibly some of the existing field walls) appear to form a sub-rectangular enclosure, with possible buildings in the north-west corner and in the centre of the east side. The main enclosure appears to have had some internal curving sub-divisions. The north end of the east side of the main enclosure appears to be continuous with one of the lynchets which extend north to form a field system (Site 59). The joint boundary with a second enclosure (Site 45/2) suggests that the two are contemporary [7].

Description

There is a possible enclosure and building to the west of High Barn, forming part of a larger Romano-British farmstead complex (Site 45). The enclosure is approximately triangular in plan and its south edge is defined by a bank c.2m wide and c.1m high running along the north side of a trackway (Site 19). The west side may be represented by a c.2m high limestone outcrop but woodland and recent dumping against the outcrop has obscured and confused the earthworks; one low bank can nevertheless be seen running west from the east side of enclosure 45/1. The rubbish, which is composed of farm and domestic ironwork, stones, brick and general refuse, has been tipped from the top of the outcrop. The east edge is also defined by an intermittent bank, which appears to contain an entrance to allow movement between this and the adjacent enclosure to the north-east (Site 45/2). Within the triangular area, a probable building platform, c.10m long and c.3m wide lies towards the east central side; this is defined by spread, slightly curving banks and it is crossed by the curving alignment of the field wall enclosing the wood. The north end of the building has one or two elevated and attached cells, and there is a large irregularly-shaped, partially grass-covered mound up to c.2m high in the vicinity; this is composed of stones which may be original or might be more recent disturbance. Beyond the wood, the building has a slightly dished internal profile and an offset entrance at the south end [1].

The RCHME Yorkshire Dales Project recorded the southern limit of the enclosure but did not give it a separate number [2]. The wooded enclosure is shown as a "Plantation" on the 1841 tithe map (field 254), and is remains as woodland on all subsequent historic maps [3] [4] [5]. The earthworks are not really visible on an aerial photograph taken in 1986 due to the tree shadow, but some elements can be seen on an aerial view taken in 1966 [6] [7].

The earthworks and limestone outcrops appear to form an approximately triangular enclosure with an entrance in its east side and a slightly off centre building with an entrance at its south end. The south limit of the enclosure may once have partly formed an east-west rectangular enclosure with the north side of Site 45/4), but this relationship has been partly obscured by trackway (Site 19) [8].

Description:

There is a group of field boundaries to the west of High Barn. They are formed by what appear to be three parallel curvilinear spread banks c.50m long and c.1m wide to either side of track/footpath (Site 39). The banks are orientated north-west/south-east and run down a gentle slope of open ground. They may have another bank marking their limit to the north-east of a footpath (Site 39). Description:

There is an enclosure and buildings to the south-west of High Barn, part of a larger complex. The enclosure is D-shaped or sub-square in plan, measures c.30m by c.35m and is defined by banks standing up to c.2m in height and up to c.3m wide. The flat end of the 'D', forming the north side of the enclosure, is separated from enclosure 45/2 by track 19 which may be following an earlier feature. There appears to be a gap in the east side of the enclosure, perhaps marking an entrance into the interior. Within the enclosure, there is one building and a further possible building or small enclosure, both located against the north bank. Both features are sub-rectangular and aligned east-west; the eastern, smaller earthwork is c.10m by c.5m whilst the western earthwork is c.13m by c.7m. The west side of the main enclosure interior rises in two broad steps. These probably reflect underlying limestone outcrops but they have been utilised as platforms or bases for buildings or other structures. There may be some quarry disturbance at the south end [1].

The RCHME Yorkshire Dales Project recorded the main enclosure as a Romano-British farmstead. The earthworks against the north interior side were recorded as a building and enclosure respectively [2] [3]. The complex is well shown on aerial photographs taken in 1966, 1986 and 1988 [4] [5] [6].

The earthworks in this area represent a D-shaped main enclosure with an entrance on the east side and two internal smaller enclosures or buildings against the north side. The north side of the main enclosure may once have formed an east-west orientated rectangular enclosure with the south side of site (Site 45/2); this relationship has been partly obscured by a track (Site 19) [7].

There is a large enclosure to the south of High Barn, c.70m long by c.10m wide, forming part of a larger Romano-British complex. The largest sub-plot lies to the south and is c.30m long by c.10m wide, and there are two more smaller rectangular enclosures to the north. A further curving bank to the west forms another apparent plot at the rear [1].

The RCHME Yorkshire Dales Project recorded the main enclosure as a rectangular enclosure of Romano-British date [2]. The complex is well shown on aerial photographs taken in 1966, 1986 and 1988 [3] [4] [5].

A number of banks define a series of enclosures on the west side of the main part of the Romano-British complex. One bank runs north-south and contains a right-angled bend, and appears to define a regular level area c.50m by c.10m to the rear of the complex. A further bank runs from the kink east for some distance, for c.200m up the slope; this is intermittent and rather spread, typically c.0.5m high and c.1.0m wide (see Site 41). The RCHME Yorkshire Dales Project recorded an enclosure to the west of a large cairn, of unknown prehistoric date, with two banks running west from the cairn for a short distance [1]. An aerial photograph taken in 1988 shows one linear bank running west from the cairn, after a short gap. This bank then kinks south-west to run around the top of a natural hollow. The east end appears to terminate in a small cairn [2]. This site might be that referred to by Welsh at SD805661: "The foundation of a wall 2m thick, 16m across a promontory and extending in a curve on the N and S sides, delimits an area about 40m across. Traces of circular structures lie within, on a deeply eroded limestone pavement. The site lies on a tabular ridge of limestone ... creating a defendable position" [3].

The gap between the large disturbed cairn (Site 21) and the start of the bank is an area of limestone pavement. Faint traces of an earthwork bank c.0.3m high and c.1.0m wide were seen running to the west, but only for a short length, and not for the c.100m as shown on the APs. No evidence for any circular features were seen, although the nature of the tussocky grass made any positive identification difficult [4].

A cairn has been recorded by the RCHME Yorkshire Dales Project to the north of Giggleswick Scar, with a 80m length of north-east/south-west orientated boundary running north-east from it, both of prehistoric date. Another boundary was marked to the south-east but was not given a separate number (Site 49) [1]. The main length of the bank and the cairn is visible on an aerial photograph taken in 1992, and the bank appears to link up with Site 49 [2].

The cairn survives as circular stone mound c.5m in diameter and 0.7m high with a central depression exposing the limestone pavement below. There appears to be some modern disturbance, with stones having been re-arranged to form a circular shelter. A cairn was recorded by the RCHME Yorkshire Dales Project to the north of Giggleswick Scar, with an c.80m length of boundary running from it, both of unknown prehistoric date [1]. The features are well shown on an aerial photograph taken in 1992, and the bank appears to link up with Site 48 [2]. The cairn was previously noted by Welsh: "A cairn, 9-10m in diameter and ribbed to expose a possible cist 1.94m by 0.35m, overlooks a small ravine to the north" [3].

The cairn survives as a well-preserved stoney, grass-covered mound c.10m in diameter and c.0.7m high with a central stone-filled depression c.0.5m deep. Some disturbance is evident. It has a very prominent position, on the edge of a scar overlooking almost the whole of the Ribble valley. The associated bank is much less obvious, c.0.3m high and c.0.7m-1.0m wide and intermittent. The continuation to Site 48 could not be traced, although the nature of the tussocky grass made positive identification difficult [4].

There are several earthwork boundaries to the south-east of High Barn, formed by two spread banks containing much rubble, which connect at right angles; the banks are typically c.2m wide and c.0.5m high. The west end of the main east-west boundary contains a shallow sub-rectangular depression, c.6m long by c.3m wide, which might be a spring [1]. The site was recorded by the RCHME Yorkshire Dales Project as a field boundary of unknown medieval date. The full complex represents three or four rectangular enclosures, with a smaller enclosure (Site 51) on the east side. The southernmost boundary is difficult to identify within a natural slope [2].

The main east-west bank is shown on aerial photographs taken in 1986, and it continues west as far as a field wall [3]. No boundaries are shown on the historic maps of the area, although the field is named as "Springs" on the 1841 tithe map [4] [5].

The date of the enclosures is uncertain and their regular form seems to respect the existing field walls, suggesting that they are later than the adjacent Romano-British farmstead complex to the west (Site 45). More probably, they may be associated with a possible medieval complex seen to the east (Site 52) [6].

There is an earthwork complex to the south-east of High Barn. There are earthworks of a boundary bank and possible buildings to the south-east of High Barn. The boundary bank consists of a south-facing spread lynchet, c.80m long, c.2m wide and c.1m high, which forms the north side of a possible complex; this bank has a similar orientation but a different alignment to that of an adjacent field system (Site 50). To the east of the centre of the lynchet are two possible buildings set into the bank, c.6m apart. There is an area of irregular depressions to the south-east of High Barn, the total area measuring c.50m by c.40m. The depressions can be divided roughly into two groups, both set in or on shallow natural slopes. The eastern group consists of a 0.7m deep irregular depression, c.12m by c.5m, with an angled depression c.7m long to its north. The western group consists of a sub-rectangular depression c.0.5m deep and c.5.0m long by c.2.5m wide, with a slightly larger flattened rectangular terraced area to its west. To its south is a sub-circular depression, c.12m in diameter terraced into the natural slope; the banks are typically c.1m high and c.1.5m wide, and the platform is open to the south. In between these two features is a slightly curving low rectangular mound, c.7m by c.2m [1].

An aerial photograph taken in 1986 shows the earthworks, with the south central one being sub-circular in plan [2]. The RCHME Yorkshire Dales Project recorded a quarry and pye kiln of unknown medieval date in this general area [3] [4].

The entire group of depressions may correspond with the quarry recorded by the RCHME whilst the oval terraced platform probably corresponds with the pye kiln. The depressions could be either quarry scoops, structures or possibly clamp kilns, or a combination of both [5].

There is a lynchet field system to the north-east of High Barn, represented by a series of north-south orientated curvilinear east-facing banks and covering an area of c.250m by c.160m (maximum). The banks are between c.1.5m-3.0m wide and up to c.1.6m in height, although most are lower. The banks separate level terraces of between c.5m-12m in width. The lynchets are not continuous with the other lynchet system seen to the south (Site 52/2). One of the lynchets appears to have been disturbed at its southern end by ridge and furrow ploughing across its line, and this might represent a re-orientation of the field system at some point [4].

There are ridge and furrow earthworks between Little Stainforth and High Barn. There is a lynchet field system to the east of Riseber Wood formed by a series of north-south orientated curvilinear east-facing banks covering a total area of c.230m by c.100m. A number of banks representing elements of a field system can be seen on the west side of Riseber Wood. The banks form a large sub-rectangular enclosure measuring c.260m by c.90m which narrows towards its east end. Another isolated stretch of bank survives to the north (Site 92). The banks are all between c.1.0m-1.5m in width and less than c.0.2m high, and most contain a high proportion of grassed-over stone rubble. In several places, short sections of collapsed enclosure wall are visible. The northern east-west boundary incorporates two large gritstone boulders which appear to be marking the alignment or defining a terminal end. The date of the field system is unclear. Whilst sections may be prehistoric, others are very straight and incorporate collapsed field walls; these may be post-medieval rationalisations of prehistoric boundaries. There is also some correlation between the alignment of these banks and those east-west cross banks seen running across lynchets to the east of Riseber Wood (Site 59) [4].

There are shrunken village (SMV) earthworks on the south side of Banks Lane. They are all located within a sub-rectangular area, defined by a north-facing bank c.3m wide and c.1.2m high on the south side, by a field wall and Banks Lane on the north side and by a low c.2.5m wide spread bank at the west end. The 1841 tithe map shows no buildings or boundaries, although the field is named as ANew Close≅ and a meadow [5].

The earthworks appear to form the remains of a number of enclosures and buildings related to the village. A medieval or early post-medieval date may be appropriate, given the regular nature of the earthworks, but they are all rather rounded and denuded, suggesting that they have been ploughed in the past [6].

There is an enclosure and possible buildings forming part of the shrunken village earthworks on the south-west side of Little Stainforth. The enclosure is sub-rectangular in plan and measures c.60m by c.30m. The south side is formed by a bank c.1.2m high and c.2.0m wide which defines the southern limit of the whole complex. Aerial photographs taken in 1988 show a series of four mounds or cairns to the east of an enclosure (Site 74/4) and adjacent to a long linear boundary (Site 92) on a north-facing natural slope. The site does not appear to have been recorded by the RCHME Yorkshire Dales Project [1].

The largest (southern) of the cairns is represented by an elongated grass-covered mound c.5m north-south and c.3m east-west. It is c.0.5m high and has a curved top, with some stones evident. The mound to the north is similarly aligned, but is slightly smaller (c.4m by c.2.5m and c.0.4m high) and it is flat-topped. A small animal scrape in the north-east corner shows that it is composed of small stones. There is also a possible circular platform c.7m in diameter immediately adjacent to the east side, marked by a slight c.0.3m high bank forming a terraced area with some stone in the north (downslope) section. Two other mounds lie to the north, both c.1.5m in diameter and c.0.3m high. It should be noted that the nature of the tussocky grass makes positive identification difficult, and there may be other cairns or features in the immediate vicinity [2].

Description:

A former field boundary and boundary bank, with a north-east/south-west alignment, can be seen to the west of Little Stainforth. Overall, it is c.480m long. To the south-west of a path (Site 39), it survives as a low limestone rubble bank c.2m wide and c.0.3m high, very straight in plan and clearly the remains of a collapsed field wall. However, to the north-east, especially where it nears a junction with the field system (Site 74/1), it becomes more sinuous and forms a spread, grassed-over stoney bank, also c.2m wide and c.0.3m high. Beyond this junction, which coincides with an area of limestone pavement, it is only intermittently visible but it extends as far as an extant field wall and past some cairns (Site 74/5). Junctions with a further east-west boundaries are not immediately obvious [1].

The RCHME Yorkshire Dales Project recorded the site as a long field boundary of post-medieval date [2]. The stoney and straightest part of the boundary, i.e. all that to the southwest of the path and a short section to the north-east, is shown on the OS 1st edition 6" map as a field wall, while the 1841 tithe map depicts it as a dashed line [3] [4]. The bank is visible on aerial photographs taken in 1989 [5].

Although the majority of the boundary is clearly of post-medieval date, the orientation and juxtaposition with other prehistoric boundaries in the area suggest that all or part of it originated as a prehistoric boundary, part of the field system associated with the settlement complex in this area [6].

Description:

There is an enclosure to the south-west of Hargreaves Barn, within an area of ridge and furrow (Site 76). It is formed by a very slightly raised sub-rectangular area, the interior of which slopes gently downwards from south to north. It is free from ridge and furrow and measures c.50m by c.40m. To the south-east is a slightly larger sub-square area, which appears to be free from ridge and furrow but some is shown on an 1979 aerial photograph [1]. Description:

Ridge and furrow earthworks and a lynchet field system covering an area of c.550m by c.240m lies to the south and west of Hargreaves Barn. The ridge and furrow is less than 0.1m high and has a ridge to ridge measurement of c.6m. There appear to be few major divisions within the ridge and furrow area; a few spread banks survive, but they may be only more prominent ridges. The south-east limit of the ridge and furrow is defined by a collapsed field wall, surviving partly as a field wall 1.2m high but mostly as a spread grassed-over rubble bank. The north limit is a track (Site 78).

To the south-east of the wall-line, and possibly including the line itself, is a lynchet field system. The lynchets are represented by south-east facing banks, all c.2m wide and c.1m high. Most contain large stones. The banks are up to c.150m long, running down a steep slope. Several of them contain angular kinks. Between Hargreaves Barn and the north-east end of the lynchets are a number of small blocks of ridge and furrow. The western side of the ridge and furrow is defined by a spread bank, which may predate the lynchets [1].

The RCHME Yorkshire Dales Project recorded the site as a large block of ridge and furrow [2]. Some elements are visible on aerial photographs taken in 1979, 1986 and 1988 [3] [4] [5].

Given the lack of apparent divisions, the ridge and furrow may represent a large open field, possibly the out-field of the medieval settlement adjacent to the west edge of the survey area. The lynchet field system may not be contemporary with the ridge and furrow and may contain earthworks of more than one phase [6].

A footpath leaves the west side of Stainforth Lane and runs north-west as far as Hargreaves Barn as a slight linear depression enclosed between two high field walls. It then continues to the north-west, climbing steadily as a partially visible flattened linear strip c.3m wide. It leaves the survey area close to the medieval settlement just outside its western edge [1].

The footpath is shown as an un-named footpath following its current route on the OS 1st edition 6" map, apart from the section to the west of the barn where it follows the right-angled field boundaries; the more direct alignment is shown on the 1909 edition [2] [3]. Description:

There is a large area of ridge and furrow field system to the north-west of Hargreaves Barn, covering an area of c.500m by c.250m. The ridge and furrow is formed by an extensive area of spread earthworks. The ridge and furrow is generally very faint, surviving to only between c.0.1m-0.2m in height and, where measurable, there is a ridge to ridge measurement of c.6m-7m. For the purposes of description, the field system is divided into three parts, running from west to east.

The western part is formed by a block of north-south orientated ridge and furrow, immediately adjacent to a medieval settlement site outside the western edge of the survey area. The central, and largest, part of the field system is formed by a number of curvilinear east-west or north-west/south-east orientated blocks of ridge and furrow. Several of the blocks have a similar width of c.40m. Within the ridge and furrow, there are several lynchets, surviving as spread banks c.2m wide and up to c.1.5m high, and a linear depression which may be a trackway.

The eastern part is formed by several blocks of north-south orientated ridge and furrow, with an area of lynchets immediately west of Stainforth Lane. Within the ridge and furrow, a spread curvilinear bank runs northwards downslope towards a group of group of seven large limestone boulders, up to 1.5m by 1m by 1m grouped in a roughly oval shape on the south side of drain (Site 80). Some of the boulders are a flattened rectangular shape, whilst others are more rounded [1].

The RCHME Yorkshire Dales Project recorded the site as ridge and furrow of late medieval date [2]. Some elements are shown on aerial photographs taken in 1979, 1986 and 1992; the area appears to have been improved on the latter [3] [4] [5]. The OS 1851 maps show that some of the fields between Hargreaves Barn and Stainforth Lane are further sub-divided into strip-like fields; that nearest the road is named as "Housestead" with the other fields being "Ing", "Long Field", "New Close" and similar on the 1841 tithe map [6] [7].

Part of the system may represent the infield of the medieval settlement adjacent to the

western edge of the survey area. The large boulders within the east part of the system are likely to be the result of field clearance [8].

There are some quarries to the west of Leys Barn. The largest is formed by a semi-circular depression cut into a natural slope, c.20m long, c.5m wide and with a working face c.3m high. The face is stepped outwards towards the base but no tool marks or other working evidence was observed. There are some piles of rubble within the quarry as well as several worked stones and concrete blocks, but some of these have been dumped here after the quarry had become disused. APPENDIX 7: YORKSHIRE DALES NATIONAL PARK AUTHORITY PROJECT BRIEF

LITTLE STAINFORTH

1 SUMMARY

1.1 A walk over archaeological survey of a 123ha farm at Little Stainforth, North Yorkshire, is required to provide baseline archaeological information for the Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority as part of its Farm Conservation Scheme. This will include identification and measured sketch planning of all archaeological and historical features within the survey area, including field boundaries, together with a detailed description, photographic record and report in order to assist in condition monitoring and the development of management proposals.

2 INTRODUCTION

- 2.1 The Yorkshire Dales National Park has developed a Farm Conservation Scheme with the objective of maintaining and improving the landscape and wildlife conservation interest of land outside the Pennine Dales Environmentally Sensitive Area. Entry to the farm scheme is voluntary but in signing an agreement with the National Park the farmer or landowner agrees to follow specified farming practices and operations designed to improve the conservation interest of the land. In return the National Park agrees yo make certain payments and grants. All known features of archaeological and historical interest should be detailed within the management schedule and protected by agreement. It is therefore essential that these features are identified, located and described accurately.
- The area has the benefit of a desk based Rapid Identification Survey carried out by the RCHME between 1989 and 1992. The main sources for this were the existing National Archaeological Record (NAR), the first edition Ordnance Survey 1:10,560 maps published in the 1850s, and a range of aerial photographs. These include the *c*.1:10,000 scale vertical photographs of the immediate post-war national survey taken by the RAF, a set of similar scale verticals commissioned by the West Riding County Council dating from *c*.1968 and oblique aerial photographs taken for archaeological purposes. The aerial photographs were systematically replotted and archaeological features recorded on them were classified on a morphological basis. The main products of the Yorkshire Dales Project are a set of 1:10,560 scale overlay plots, a MORPH2 data base and an expanded NAR data base. A summary print out of both databases for the eight main kilometre squares in which Little Stainforth Farm and the two surrounding holdings are situated is attached.
- 2.3 There has been little field enhancement of these records to verify interpretations and to provide information on the current condition of sites. Detailed fieldwork elsewhere in the National Park, while indicating that the AP interpretation is generally very reliable, has resulted in a significant increase in the number of recorded features, in some instances on particularly difficult terrain such as limestone pavement by over 200%. A similar %age increase is not expected as a result of this survey although it is anticipated that a significant number of new sites will be identified.

3 LOCATION

3.1 The area, centred on SD 815672 is shown edged in green on the enclosed plan.

4 OWNERSHIP

4.1 The farm has been recently purchased by H M Dugdale and Son, Borrins Farm, Stackhouse, Settle BD24 0DW (01729 822877) who also own the adjoining land edged blue on the maplet. The prospective contractors will be required to indemnify the land owner and any tenant against any loss, damage or claims which may be made as a result of their entering the farm for survey purposes and to accept liability for any personal injury, loss or damage sustained whether occasioned by negligence or otherwise.

Contractors will be required to notify the Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority before starting work and to agree survey timetabling with the land owner whose consent to the survey is included in their individual farm agreement.

5 ACCESS

5.1 The area has good road access and is also served by a network of footpaths and trackways.

6 ARCHAEOLOGICAL INTEREST

- 6.1 No previous archaeological work, other than the RCHME Yorkshire Dales Project noted above, is known.
- 6.2 The rapid desk-based survey carried out by the RCHME as part of the Yorkshire Dales Project identified a number of features, mainly from the 1st Edition 6" Ordnance Survey maps or from aerial photographs. This, however, was a desk-based exercise and the character and condition of these features has not been checked by ground survey; part of the proposed survey will be to record basic data about these features for management purposes. The remains include earthworks of prehistoric settlements and field systems, earthworks of a shrunken medieval settlement, expanses of medieval arable fields, enclosure period field walls, lime kilns and limestone quarries, sheepfolds, water troughs, churn stands, etc. It is expected that the field survey will identify and record numerous other features, particularly earthworks and minor wall furniture which are not at present identified or recorded.

7 ARCHITECTURAL INTEREST

7.1 Architectural survey of roofed buildings does not form a part of this part of this project brief. Roofless and ruined structures are included. Significant roofed buildings, however, should be noted in the report so that they can be drawn to the attention of the National Park's Building Conservation Officer.

8 GEOLOGICAL AND ECOLOGICAL INTEREST

8.1 The area is complex geologically and has been mapped at 1:50,000 scale by the British Geological Survey (Sheet 60). The geology is varied, mainly due to deposits of glacial drift overlying a karst limestone landscape. A Phase I Botanical Survey has been carried out for the area and copies of these maps will be made available for inspection.

9 AIM OF WORK

- 9.1 The aims of the project are to:
 - gather sufficient information to identify and establish the extent, nature, character, condition, quality and probable date of archaeological and historical features within the survey area;
 - ii) establish the functional relationships, if any, between archaeological and historical features;
 - iii) identify any threats to archaeological and historical features and provide a basis for condition monitoring, the preparation of detailed management proposals, and, if features are being disturbed or appear to be at risk, provide appropriate management recommendations.
- 9.2 Quotations and a costed method statement for a new survey of the archaeological and historical features, including field boundaries, together with a detailed description and photographic record and report is required. It is recommended that contractors make a preliminary visual inspection of the farm to familiarise themselves with the extent and

nature of the archaeological remains and the scope of the work. The cut off for the definition of archaeological features is 1955.

10 SCOPE OF WORK

10.1 Topographic Survey

It is anticipated that most features will be surveyed by annotation and measured sketching onto 1:1,250 scale maps. Detailed, measured topographical survey is not required. Maps will be provided by the Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority.

10.2 Boundaries

The survey is to include information on field and property boundaries, recording such information as presence of banks and ditches, wall type, material and condition as well as the positions of and details of wall furniture (gate posts, sheep creeps, wall heads etc). Significant ecofacts should also be recorded.

10.3 Photographic records

General photographic recording of the farm and significant parts, together with close up photography of significant detail. A comprehensive photographic record is not anticipated but photographs should be taken with a view to aiding future condition monitoring. Coverage should use print media in the main with selected colour transparency views for presentation use. All photographic film should be exposed and processed to ensure high quality definition. Processing must be to archival standards in accordance with manufacturer's specifications. All photographs should be clearly numbered and labelled with the subject, orientation, date taken, photographer's name and cross referenced where applicable to film and negative numbers. All photographic material should be suitably packaged for storage to archival standards.

10.4 Written Accounts

A structured gazetteer of sites and numbered site components should be made to include a summary description and preliminary interpretation of extant remains (eg. location, dimensions, plan, form, function, date, sequence of development), mention of relevant documentary evidence and assessment of current condition and threats. This should also include a grading of the importance of the features based on MPP scoring. Proforma record formats should be used: examples of the proposed should be submitted with the method statement and will be subject to approval by the Archaeological Conservation Officer of the Yorkshire Dales National Park. RCHME record numbers, where these exist, are to be identified. A concordance of features and RCHME Yorkshire Dales Project records should be provided.

10.5 Excavation, Samples and Loose Finds

No excavation or sampling work is intended as part of this survey. Loose finds should be reported to the Archaeological Conservation Officer at the earliest opportunity.

10.6 Documentary Research

A basic documentary survey for the farms should be undertaken. This will include transcribing field names and boundaries from any tithe, enclosure and farm maps onto a 1:10,000 OS base and listing names in alphabetical order. Documents and sources consulted should be listed. Such information as is known to the Yorkshire Dales National Park will be made available. Copies of the 1st edition OS 6" map and also 2nd edition 25" maps where available will be provided.

10.7 Aerial Photographs

The area has recently been plotted by the RCHME and the results of the Yorkshire Dales Project plotting will be made available. No new aerial photography is proposed but some has been undertaken since the Yorkshire Dales Project was completed. These, which number less than ten, are to be assessed as part of the Project. Copies of oblique and vertical 1:10,000 scale aerial photographs held by the YDNP will be made available for inspection by the successful contractor and during the quotation period, together with full extracts from the Yorkshire Dales Project database.

11 PRODUCT

11.1 Archive

The contractor shall be expected to properly order and index the full archive record (paper, magnetic and plastic media) for the project in line with the standards set by the National Archaeological Record and to deposit the archive, suitably securely packaged, with the National Park Authority. The archive should consist of the following:

Copies of relevant documentary material arranged to date sequence:

Bibliographic sources;

Cartographic sources;

Pictorial sources.

Set of Field and Final Ink Drawings.

Photographs:

Negatives;

Prints;

Colour transparencies.

Written accounts/pro formae gazetteers:

Site components;

Individual contexts where applicable.

Structured catalogues and indices:

Documentary material;

Field and final ink drawings;

Photographs.

Project Management Records.

As well as written records, the gazetteer and other appropriate data should also be formatted for use in a computerised database system, supplied formatted for use as ASCII files, on 3.5" disks for use in an IBM-PC compatible microcomputer or as otherwise agreed with the Archaeological Conservation Officer.

11.2 Report

Two copies (1 bound, 1 unbound) of an illustrated and typed A4 report should be provided. A copy of the report should also be supplied, formatted as an ASCII file, on 3.5" disks for use in an IBM-PC compatible microcomputer.

The report should assemble and summarise the available evidence for the archaeological and historical monuments of the farms in an ordered form, synthesise the data, and comment on the quality and reliability of the evidence. It should include a contents list, acknowledgments, executive summary, background to the project, survey methodology and procedures, a summary gazetteer of sites and site components incorporating a description, interpretation, form, condition, measurements and illustrative material as appropriate, a list of the archive contents and bibliography. It should also contain a copy of the brief and the approved method statement as well as an indication of any departure

from the methods statement. Copies of appropriate archive drawings and photographs should be incorporated.

11.3 Summary

A summary of the results should be prepared for publication in CBA Forum or other appropriate journal or monograph as agreed with the Archaeological Conservation Officer. A presentation at a day school on archaeology in the Yorkshire Dales or the CBA Yorkshire symposium may be required. Copyright of the records and archive will pass to the Yorkshire Dales National Park on payment of the final invoice.

12 METHODOLOGY

- 12.1 It is the responsibility of the Contractor to select the most appropriate survey methodology and equipment to provide the required product.
- 12.2 A costed method statement is required of the Contractor. The method statement should indicate the proposed methodologies to be adopted; the relevant experience of the organisation, key personnel and any sub-contractors; details of manpower resources to be applied to the survey; and a breakdown of costs. Particular attention should be paid to ensure that the aims and objectives of the project are directly informed by the methodologies employed and that the personnel display the appropriate levels of expertise to carry out the work. The Contractor, contractor's staff and any sub-contractors will be expected to comply with relevant Codes of Practice of the Institute of Field Archaeologists.

13 TIMETABLE AND MONITORING

13.1 The project is to start within three weeks of the issue of instructions to proceed and the final report should be submitted within five months. Monitoring of the fieldwork will be carried out by the archaeological staff of the Yorkshire Dales National Park. The Contractor is to arrange a preliminary meeting with the Archaeological Conservation Officer at the commencement of the contract and fortnightly on-site progress meetings, or as otherwise agreed, during the fieldwork stage, and at least one meeting to discuss the draft report before final submission.

APPENDIX 8: EDAS METHOD STATEMENT

FARM SURVEY, LITTLE STAINFORTH, NORTH YORKSHIRE

1 INTRODUCTION

- 1.1 A walkover archaeological survey of a 123 hectare farm estate at Little Stainforth is required, to provide baseline archaeological information for the Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority as part of its Farm Conservation Scheme. The project has been defined by a brief prepared by the Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority, dated October 1998.
- 1.2 It is possible that two additional survey areas may be added to the project, an area edged in blue on a YDNPA plan encompassing 167 hectares and an area to the south-west of Little Stainforth edged in orange, comprising 66 hectares. The survey of these areas is also defined by the YDNPA brief and this methods statement.
- 1.3 Information relating to the survey area, its ownership, and its archaeological, architectural, ecological and geological interest is covered by the YDNPA brief, and is not repeated here. It is expected that the survey area will include archaeological, architectural and historic features dating from prehistoric to modern times (pre 1955).

2 AIMS AND OBJECTIVES

- 2.1 The aims of the project are to:
 - a) gather sufficient information to identify and establish the extent, nature, character, condition, quality and probable date of archaeological and historic features within the survey area;
 - b) establish the functional relationships, if any, between the archaeological and historic features:
 - c) identify any threats to archaeological and historic features and provide a basis for condition monitoring, the preparation of detailed management proposals, and, if features are being disturbed or appear to be at risk, provide appropriate management recommendations.

3 METHODOLOGY

3.1 Wherever possible, it is proposed to adopt a similar methodology to that used by EDAS and its predecessors on other similar farm surveys in the Yorkshire Dales, namely the survey of the Swinithwaith Estate in carried out in 1995 and the Hagg and Low Oxque farm surveys undertaken in 1997. This will ensure that direct comparisons between each of the data sets can be made as appropriate.

Documentary research

- 3.2 A basic documentary survey for the area would be undertaken, in advance of any fieldwork. This research would cover cartographic material (both Ordnance Survey and historic maps and plans, such as tithe and enclosure awards), limited documentary sources, and aerial photographs. It should be noted that only documentary, cartographic and aerial photographic sources held by the North Yorkshire County Record Office and the YDNPA will be consulted. Visits to other record offices, such as the West Yorkshire Archives, could be undertaken for additional day-rate fees.
- 3.3 Other documentary sources which would be investigated would include 19th century topographical accounts and other relevant information held by local and county libraries. Listed Building descriptions and any reports of the Yorkshire Vernacular Buildings Study Group would be consulted and incorporated where appropriate.

- 3.4 Information held as part of the County Sites and Monuments Record and the National Archaeological Record would be collated and incorporated into the survey. This would cover all records of past archaeological activity including the results of the RCHME Yorkshire Dales Project.
- 3.5 All relevant information identified during the documentary research, including field names, would be transcribed onto a 1:2,500 scale map base and incorporated into the other elements of the project. Documents and sources consulted as part of the survey would be listed as an appendix to the main report. This would cover all material considered, whether or not it contained relevant information.

Topographic survey

- 3.6 A general field survey of the farm estate would be undertaken. This would examine each modern land parcel, including woodland, for any sites of archaeological, architectural or historic interest. Each identified site would be given a unique site number, sub-divided into components where appropriate, and cross-referenced to the modern OS field number.
- 3.7 All features considered to be of interest would be recorded at 1:2,500 scale by annotated and measured sketches drawn onto Ordnance Survey map bases. In addition, descriptive records incorporating location, dimensions, plan, form, function, possible date, and sequence of development would be made (see written account below). Roofless and ruined structures would be included within this survey, but roofed buildings (including barns) would not although their presence would be noted. An RCHME level 1-type survey and assessment of the roofed buildings could be accommodated within a day-rate charge if required.
- 3.8 The general archaeological survey would also record significant ecofacts, such as areas of managed woodland, pollarded elms, coppicing etc. No detailed measured survey of any earthworks or other structures would be undertaken.

Field boundary survey

- 3.9 All field and property boundaries within the survey area would be examined and classified according to their composition and form. The typology employed would be that used by BHWB/EDAS in their previous farm surveys which established a ten-fold classification, namely:
 - Type 1: Fence
 - Type 2: Hedgerow
 - Type 3: Drystone wall: two or more courses of throughstones
 - Type 4: Drystone wall: one or no courses of throughstones
 - Type 5: Drystone wall: one course of throughstones, projecting to one side only
 - Type 6: Drystone wall: one or no courses of throughstones with large boulder footings
 - Type 7: Drystone wall: one or no courses of throughstones, with a distinct batter to the lower part
 - Type 8: Drystone wall, largely collapsed, and replaced by modern fencing
 - Type 9: Drystone wall demonstrably of modern (ie. post-1945) date
 - Type 10: Other walls, including garden or ornamental walls
- 3.10 Where appropriate, any significant boundary types not covered here would be classified as a new type. Stratigraphic relationships such as butt joints and wall heads would be observed and information on wall type, type of materials and condition would be recorded, as well as the positions and details of any wall furniture such as gateways, stiles and sheep creeps. The presence of banks or ditches associated with the walls would also be recorded. The details recorded during the field boundary survey would be marked on 1:2,500 map bases.

Photographic survey

- 3.11 A general photographic survey of the more significant or important sites identified within the farm estate would be carried out, together with detailed photography of significant features, using a 35mm camera. The photographic survey would also cover typical examples of minor sites such as wall types and wall furniture, and would include record photographs of sites and features under threat or being disturbed.
- 3.12 Coverage would be primarily black and white although a number of colour transparency views and selected features would be taken for presentation purposes. Each photograph would be clearly numbered and cross referenced to a list detailing the subject, orientation, date taken, photographer's name, and film and negative numbers.
- 3.13 It should be noted that the photographic survey would be undertaken as a separate exercise after all the field survey has been completed. This will ensure adequate coverage of the best, and the most typical, identified sites and structures.

Written accounts

3.14 A structured gazetteer of sites and components would be made to include a summary description and preliminary interpretation of extant remains (for example location, dimension, plan, form, function, possible date and sequence of development), mention of any relevant documentary evidence, and an assessment of current condition, vulnerability and threats. This would also include a grading of the importance of the features based on the scoring procedures used in the Monuments Protection Programme. The gazetteer would also cross-reference any RCHME numbers as well as any Scheduled Ancient Monument, Sites and Monuments Record, Listed Building and Phase 1 Botanical Survey reference numbers. A pro forma record similar to that used by BHWB/EDAS in their previous farm surveys would be used (see appendix).

4 PRODUCT

Archive

4.1 The full archive, comprising paper, magnetic and plastic media, relating to the project would be ordered and indexed according to the standards set by the National Archaeological Record, in accordance with the YDNPA project brief.

Report

- 4.2 The final report would take the form of an illustrated and typed standard A4 document which would assemble and summarise the available evidence for the historical, archaeological and architectural features of the farm in an ordered form, synthesise the data and comment on the quality and reliability of the evidence. If additional survey areas are added to the project, data would be incorporated into a single report.
- 4.3 The report would include all those items listed in the YDNPA project brief, as well as giving an account of the current condition of the sites and any perceived or actual threats, and would provide management recommendations as appropriate. The report would be illustrated by selected monochrome photographs and appropriate maps and plans, including 1:2,500 scale plans showing identified sites and features. It is likely that the data relating to wall types and wall furniture will be presented as a separate set of plans.
- The report would also include appendices listing sites ranked according to grades of importance, condition and vulnerability, and there would be a summary table of management recommendations for ease of reference. Appendices giving concordance lists between identified site numbers and other site numbers (e.g. SMR, NMR, and RCHME Yorkshire Dales Project numbers), and Ordnance Survey field numbers, would also be provided.

- 4.5 One draft copy of the report would be made available to the National Park Authority for discussion in advance of the production of the final report, and two final copies would be produced (one bound, one unbound).
- 4.6 It is understood that the copyright of all survey and other material gathered as part of this project would pass to the National Park Authority on payment of final invoices.

5 RESOURCES AND PROGRAMMING

Staffing

- 5.1 The project would be undertaken by EDAS, who are on North Yorkshire County Council's standing list of approved archaeological contractors and who are an archaeological organisation approved by the Institute of Field Archaeologists. As noted above, EDAS and its predecessors have completed other historic landscape surveys in the Yorkshire Dales, notably the Swinithwaite Estate in Wensleydale, and The Hagg and Low Oxque in Swaledale.
- The majority of the work would be undertaken by Mr E Dennison of EDAS, and he would have overall supervision and responsibility for the project. He would be assisted by Mr S Haigh and Mr S Richardson as appropriate, both of whom were involved with the previous farm surveys.

Health and Safety, and Insurance

- 5.3 EDAS will comply with the Health and Safety at Work Act of 1974 while undertaking the project. A full copy of their Health and Safety Policy is available on request.
- The survey area is privately owned and EDAS would indemnify the landowners in respect of their legal liability for physical injury to persons or damage to property arising on site in connection with the survey, to the extent of EDAS's Public Liability Insurance Cover (£5,000,000).

Project timetable

5.5 If successful with their bid, EDAS would draw up a project timetable with the YDNPA at a preliminary project meeting although work on the documentary research would start within three weeks of commission. Further meetings will be held as appropriate, and the project would be completed by the end of the financial year (1998).

APPENDIX: SITE SURVEY GAZETTEER

The pro forma gazetteer would provide details of each site or component of archaeological or historic interest occurring within the survey area. The following explains the terms that would be used.

Each identifiable site or component would be allocated a unique number. Each site would be based on a coherent unit, such as an earthwork. A site may be divided into individual recognisable components. Site or component reference numbers would be used throughout the report and accompanying drawings.

The **Location** section identifies the site or component and provides sufficient information for it to be readily located.

- i) **Site name and location:** a descriptive name of the individual site or component, followed by a description giving the location of the site or component in relation to other sites or components, topographic and other features within the survey area.
- ii) **Grid reference:** the national grid reference (NGR) of the site or component given as an 8 figure reference (i.e. to the nearest 10 metres). The NGR is qualified as to whether it is accurate, centred, approximate or linear. It should be noted that for linear site or components, the quoted NGR would only relate to the survey area and may not be their full extent.
- iii) **Height (AOD):** the height in metres, to the nearest whole metre, above Ordnance Datum of each site or component. For some site or components a height range may be given.
- iv) OS field no: the OS field number(s) of the land parcel in which the site lies.
- v) **Parish:** the modern parish within which the site or component is located.

The **Concordance** section gives details of any other reference or other numbers the site or component has been allocated in other sources.

- NMR no: the reference number used by the RCHME in their National Monuments Record database.
- ii) **RCHME YDP No:** the reference number used by the RCHME in their Yorkshire Dales Project database.
- iii) **LB No and Grade:** the number used by the Department of National Heritage in their List of Buildings of Special Architectural or Historic Interest together with the designated grade of importance.
- iv) **Phase 1 BS:** the number used by the Phase 1 botanical survey to identify the site.

The **Description** section provides information concerning the appearance and other aspects of each site or component within the survey area. "n/a" signifies that this information is not appropriate to a particular site or component.

- i) **Type:** the site type of the site or component, as defined by SMR or RCHME keyword lists.
- ii) **Period/Date:** the age or date of the site or component, as defined by SMR or RCHME keyword lists.
- iii) Form: the current form of the site or component, as defined by SMR or RCHME keyword lists.
- iv) **Length:** the length of a site or component, given in metres to two decimal places. For some site or components, a range of values is given.
- v) **Width:** the width of a site or component, given in metres to two decimal places. For some site or components, a range of values is given.

- vi) **Height/Depth:** the height (or depth) of a site or component, given in metres to two decimal places. For some site or components, a range of values is given.
- viii) **Materials/Land Use/Vegetation:** the materials of the which the site (if it is a building or structure) is built, and/or the land use and vegetation of the site or component.
- ix) Date inspected: the date on which the site or component was inspected by EDAS.
- x) **Date surveyed:** the date on which the site or component was surveyed in more detail.
- xi) **Date photographed:** the date on which the site or component was photographed, together with the index numbers of any photographs of the site or component recorded under the categories of Monochrome or Colour.
- xii) **Description:** a description of the site or component, to complement the information given above. This would include a simple description together with plan form, any recognisable sequence of development and an interpretative discussion, covering function and historic background where appropriate and known. Where external bibliographic or cartographic sources of information have been used, these are referenced to a specific source by number.
- xiii) **Reference:** where external bibliographic or cartographic sources of information are used in the description, these are referenced to a specific source by number which is detailed here.

The **Management** section provides basic information concerning the importance of the site, its condition and any specific threats identified for the site or component at time of inspection.

- i) **Site importance:** a grade from 1 (minor importance) to 5 (national importance), and a comment giving an indication of the importance of the site or component, based on a combination of professional judgement and criteria used by English Heritage in their Monuments Protection Programme.
- ii) **Condition:** a grade from 1 to 5, and a comment assessing the condition of the site or component at the time of the visit.

- 4 Above average Largely intact, with walls, earthworks and other features surviving to at least 50% of their estimated original height and a good proportion of original features and details recognizable.

 - 5 High The site is considered to be very vulnerable (e.g. located on an unstable slope or in an area prone to regular ploughing or agricultural improvement) and/or is actively eroding with major damage evident.
 - 4 Above average The site is considered to be at general risk with some minor damage or erosion already evident.

		location (e.g. located on a public footpath, or a building in a farmstead
		with potential for conversion, or a site potentially at risk from agricultural
