Background and previous archaeological work on the site

There has been no previous archaeological work undertaken on site.

Previous archaeological work on associated sites

An extensive occupation site of early Iron Age date has been identified to the west of the site, on the opposite side of the High Street (WSM 33709). The projected alignment of the Civil War defences that surrounded the town of Evesham crosses the current site from north-west to south-east (WSM 02230).

Aims

The aim of the watching brief was to observe and record archaeological deposits, and to determine their extent, state of preservation, date and type, as far as reasonably possible.

The watching brief concentrated on the footings for a new school extension which was located within the projected line of Evesham's Civil War defences.

Access to and visibility of deposits

Observation of the excavated areas was undertaken during and after machine excavation. The exposed surfaces were sufficiently clean to observe well-differentiated archaeological deposits, though any less clear may have not been identified. Selected sections were cleaned by hand.

Statement of confidence

Access to, and visibility of, deposits allowed a high degree of confidence that the aims of the project have been achieved.

Discussion

During the observation of the groundworks, no archaeological deposits were noted, nor finds recovered. The footings for the new school buildings were sunk to a depth of 1.30m, into the undisturbed geology. This natural matrix, which lay at a depth of 0.70m below the present surface, was overlain by a sterile subsoil layer (103). The subsoil was c 0.30m thick and overlain by modern deposits for the tarmac play area (100-102) and the present topsoil (105).

Conclusions

No archaeological features, layers, structures or finds were noted within the foundation trenches. There was no evidence of the Civil War ditch which has been extrapolated from documentary evidence and adjacent sites to run through this area. However, the scale of these groundworks was small in nature so the defences may indeed lie within the vicinity, as the full stratigraphic soil profile indicates that there has been no large scale landscaping in this immediate area.

An archaeological watching brief was undertaken on behalf of Diocesan Education Service at St. Mary's Roman Catholic Primary School, St Egwin's Road, Evesham, Worcestershire (NGR SP 03860 44234; HER ref WSM 47365).

The observations of the footings for a proposed new school building revealed no archaeological deposits, structures, layers nor were any artefacts recovered. The site lies within the extrapolated alignment of Evesham's Civil War defences. Although these were not identified here, they may lie within the vicinity, as the full stratigraphic soil profile observed indicates that there has been no large scale landscaping in this immediate area.






