Metal detector survey and Archaeological Evaluation to the rear of Nos 1 and 2 Haugh Road, Stirling

Introduction

This metal detector survey, photographic record and archaeological evaluation of the proposed footprints of two new houses and access road was carried out for Mr Albert Stewart to satisfy the archaeological condition on the planning consent for this development, as noted by Stirling Council Archaeology Service in the condition attached to Planning Application 11/00544/FULL dated 5th September 2011. It was undertaken by the author on Wednesday 29th February and Thursday 1st March 2012, weather conditions were dry and over cast on the first day and occasionally bright and sunny on the second.

Archaeological Background (Illus 1-4)

The proposed development area comprises garden ground that lies within the approximate area of the main engagement of the Battle of Stirling Bridge (1297) as defined by the Battlefields Trust, and has not been subject to previous development. The site therefore has the potential to contain previously undiscovered archaeological objects or remains that have survived beneath the active plough-zone from the battle as well as a variety of periods in Scotland's history and prehistory. The proposed development has the potential to damage or destroy such remains. The site is marked as open ground on both Roy's Military Survey of Scotland and the 1898 Ordnance Survey map.

Photographic Survey (Illus 7 – 10)

As a first step a photographic record was made of the entire site including location shots that showed its relationship to the Wallace monument, Stirling Bridge and Stirling Castle.

Metal Detector Survey (Illus 5 and 11)

The main part of the site was gridded out on two baselines measuring 23metres in length that lay 20m apart. The entire area, including the course of the site access road, was then scanned with a Lander XDPro 100 detector in 2m wide tracks running North to South. All anomalies were located on the ground using wooden pegs which were then numbered up in sequence to match their locations as logged by a hand held GPS. A working record plan of all anomalies was maintained on site to check any apparent patterns in their distribution.

All of the detected points were concentrated in the northern part of the site and were then checked by a combination of further more detailed metal detecting and hand dug test pits. All of the anomalies recorded proved to relate to the former use of the site as a garden area behind number 1 Haugh Road. The metal detected readings all represented either iron nails, burnt aluminium foil or chicken wire. Nothing relating to the battlefield of Stirling Bridge was located.

Site Evaluation (Illus 12 – 14)

As requested by Stirling Councils archaeologist a 5% sample of the proposed footprint of the two new houses (211 square metres) was trenched by mechanical excavator. This entailed the opening of a single trench measuring 6 metres by 2 metres that was laid out on a South West to North East alignment. A dark grey brown silty clay was encountered to a depth of 0.30m below modern ground level which then overlay a compact damp yellow brown clay which appeared to be natural. No archaeological deposits or features were located.

Discussion and Conclusions

Despite this site being located at the North Western corner of the Battlefield Trust's suggested position of the English Deployments at the Battle of Stirling Bridge nothing relating to the battle was found at all. The author feels that no further archaeological work needs to take place on site prior to the development proceeding.








Illus 2 site (red dot) as shown on General Roy's Military Survey of Scotland of 1747-55 (© Trustees of National Library of Scotland)




Illus 3 Site (marked with red dot) as shown on 1898 Ordnance Survey map (© Trustees of National Library of Scotland)
